SUBJECT: Comments of the Commanding Officer on After Action Report for month of February 1945.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D. C.

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1. Recommendations and comments concurred in.

2. If the present policy of attaching Tank Destroyers and Tanks to the Direct Support Battalion as reinforcing artillery is to be continued it is strongly recommended that the T/O and T/E of the Direct Support Battalions be changed to include several additional staff officers (Liaison Officers) plus extra communications and survey personnel, and additional radios, wire communication equipment and fire control instruments to handle these attachments. The officers would serve as artillery instructors and supervisors and the added personnel and equipment would be used to the in and control such attachments. Under present T/O's the Tanks and Tank Destroyers lack the necessary personnel and experience to satisfactorily perform their secondary role. Hence there is a heavy drain on the personnel and facilities of the Direct Support Battalion often at a cost to its efficiency which multifies the gains of added fire power from Tank Destroyers and Tanks.

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This period was outstanding in that the Division breached the Siegfried Line and fought for the first time on German soil. During the first five days of the month activity of this battalion was confined to check registrations, a few observed missions and normal harassing fires. On 6 February the Division pushed off across the Our River after a 40 minute preparation and 25 minutes of accompanying fires.

A Corps Counter-battery phase was fired in addition to the Division Artillery Preparation. The fire plan for the Combat Team included fires from our two reinforcing Artillery Battalions, one a medium, a platoon of 4.2 Chemical mortars, a company of Self-propelled 70mm Tank Destroyers and a platoon of quad 50 caliber Anti-Aircraft machine guns. The preparation was successful in that little resistance was encountered, although the rapid current of the swollen river and the wooded rough terrain were great handicaps.

Daily local preparations were fired to support the advance of the Infantry until the 18th of February when a bridge was finally thrown across the river permitting the commitment of tanks and tank destroyers. On this date a Corps and Division Artillery Preparation was fired for the expansion and joining of the various bridgeheads across the Our River. Rapid progress was made and resistance localized into a series of strong points and rear guard actions.

No further preparation as such was fired during the remainder of the period since the Infantry adopted new tactics of night infiltration and daylight mop-up. Prior to the night jump offs a series of harassing fires on suspected strong points were fired over a period of several hours before the jump off. The Infantry plan was quite successful and much ground was taken with comparatively light losses.

On the 25th of February the 4th Armored Division was committed and advanced rapidly to the Northeast. This battalion was given a general support mission reinforcing the fires of the 313th Field Artillery Battalion until the end of the period.


Remarks and Comments

The permanent defenses of the Siegfried Line in our sector consisted chiefly of bunkers and pill boxes which were used primarily as troop shelter. In no instance was firing from these bunkers reported, all resistance coming from outside dug in positions. Many covered firing pits were encountered in the Infantry advance through the forest at the site of the river crossing.

Lack of good maps and photos made accurate locations of Infantry front lines difficult during the initial phase of the operation resulting in poor close-in support of the Infantry. Many identification rounds were fired for orientation purposes. Later in the period when night infiltrations were made high-burst identification rounds marked objectives and gave direction to patrols.

Quite a few precision adjustments were made on point targets such as dugouts, tanks, and observation posts, with best results obtained by using the highest possible powder charge with its lower probable error. Direct hits were made without excessive ammunition expenditure. Two tanks were set on fire in this manner. Excellent results were obtained using White Phosphorus shell as an indendiary for building destruction. High Explosive was used for adjustment changing to White Phosphorus for effect after applying necessary corrections for the difference in weight of projectiles.

Our many and varied attachments during this period were more of a hindrance than help most of the time. One light and one medium Field Artillery Battalion are more than enough reinforcing Artillery for a direct support battalion during



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any operation. The 4.2 Chemical mortars, although doing excellent work on several smoke and high explosive missions, are difficult to keep in firing positions where they can be utilized to best advantage. The rocket mounted tanks with their terrific fire power can not be used for close in support and because of their short range are also difficult to keep in firing position. Better use of them could be made if supervised by the advance Infantry battalions. Tanks and Tank Destroyers when used in their secondary roll as Artillery are good harassing weapons but are a burden on a direct support battalion. The 155 SP gun is an excellent weapon but can not be efficiently controlled by a direct support battalion when used in its primary roll. When all the above are given to a battalion at one time it is physically impossible to utilize each effectively and efficiently resulting in a great loss of available fire power.

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SECTION II

1 February 1945 - 28 February 1945: '

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During the period of 1 February 1945 to 7 February 1945, 314th Field Artillery Battalion was in direct support of the 318th Infantry Regiment which had the mission of defending along the Our River from 975420 to 985396 (Sheet 1 1). "A" Company, 811 Tank Destroyer Battalion, First Platoon, 558 Field Artillery Battalion, "B" Company, 702 Tank Battalion and one Platoon 91 Chemical Mortars were attached to this Battalion and the 974 Field Artillery Battalion were reinforcing our fires. All were surveyed in so as to coordinate their fires. Five ground Observation Posts were established and manned twenty-four hours a day. The manning of these Observation Posts was shared between 314th Field Artillery Battalion and the 974th Field Artillery Battalion. From 8 February 1945 to 22 February 1945 the Combat Team 318 had a mission of crossing the Our River and attacking and destroying the Seigfried line. The 974th Field Artillery Battalion, one Platoon 91 Chemical Mortars, one Platoon of "B" Company 702 Tank Battalion equipped with rockets and one Platoon of 558th Field Artillery Battalion were attached to 314th Field Artillery Battalion. The self-propelled guns of the 558th Field Artillery Battalion were used for direct laying on pill boxes or fortified houses that were holding up the advance of Combat Team 318. From 23 February 1945 to 28 February 1945 the Combat Team 318 was given the mission of defending the bridgehead across the Our River while the Fourth Armored Division passed through. This was an aggressive defense, pushing forward without interfering with the movement of the Fourth Armored Division.

Air Observation was coordinated during the period with the reinforcing Field Artillery Battalion in such a way that air observation was continuous, weather permitting.

Each Infantry Company of 318th Infantry Regiment had a Forward Observer with it at all times during the period. The first part of the period the Observers had to work in thickly wooded areas and were unable to accurately locate enemy targets. As a result it was necessary to cover large areas with artillery fire in order to help the advance of the Infantry Unit. During the actual crossing of the Our River Observation Posts were manned on the high ground above the river. Observers adjusted smoke in front of pill boxes that were able to observe the actual crossing. This hindered the enemy's adjustment of fire upon the crossing site and helped our Infantry in crossing. These Observation Posts were kept in operation until the Infantry had advanced beyond observation.

In order for Forward Observers to report their location while in wooded areas when their Infantry Units were advancing at a steady pace, they had to stop and set up their radios and then report. In this kind of a situation they had to be given good protection by the Infantry for when they dropped behind to set up radios they were harrassed by enemy snipers.

When the Infantry got into open country it was found that the gulleys were covered by artillery fire. If the Observer stayed with the Company Commander he was pinned down most of the time and was of little use to the Infantry. When he was given protection and went to high ground he was able to give his Infantry all the artillery support needed and also kept his own organization informed of the progress of the troops.

Maps of 1/50000 and 1/25000 meter grid were issued to us in large enough quantities to satisfy the needs of the Battalion but the attached units were not issued them by

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their parent organizatic and we had to supply them. When we have many Units attached as we had during this period the normal issue of maps is entirely inadequate.

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Supply functions throughout the period were satisfactory. Reports are rendered by respective classifications.

CLASS I

Rations have been issued satisfactorily with the exception of condiments.

CLASS II

Clothing issues have been satisfactory with the exception of field jackets and various size shoes. Equipment issues have improved but shortages still exist in such items as scotch tape, acetate and other expendable items required for use in battalion fire direction. Due to the number of forward observation teams employed there is considerable use of BA 40 batteries for our radios and the issues have been inadequate.

CLASS III

Requirements have been met satisfactorily.

CLASS V

Ammunition resupply has been very satisfactory. A number of primers on the 25 pounder ammunition have been found defective.

MOTOR NOTES

There is a critical shortage of hot patches for tire repair and shortages still exist in tires and tubes for 1/4 ton and 2-1/2 ton vehicles. Replacements for worn tire chains have been requisitioned but these have been only partially replaced.

MEDICAL NOTES

Medical supply and evacuation has been very satisfactory.

Recommendations:

1. That the issue of green vegetables be increased and that condiments be issued more often and in larger quantities.

2. That the allowance of BA 40 radio batteries be increased to Field Artillery Battalions.

3. That expendables such as acetate and scotch tape be issued more often and in larger quantities.

4. That tire chains be made available.

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SECTION IV

1 February 1945 - 28 February 1945:

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Administrative matter handled thru message center during the month amounted to approximately 750 items.

All schedules on administrative reports were maintained during the period thru normal message center channels despite adverse weather and poor road conditions.

Monthly receipt of mail amounted to approximately 3000 letters and 200 packages. Personnel of the Battalion purchased approximately \$7,500.00 worth of money orders and \$375.00 worth of air mail stamps and envelopes through the Battalion Mail Clerk.



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
