As the advance came nearer to friendly lines, Sgt Norten, sensing the tactical neces sity for rapid fire, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, moved through withering enemy crossfire and made his way to a machine gun, took charge of the gun, and halted the movement by delivering devastating fire. His lartness was directly responsible for the successful repulsion of the enemy.
