V. During the greater part of the month, operations of the Division were characterized by rapid movement and pursuit. The processing of reinforcements and casuals, constituted, as a result, a difficult problem. The critical need for transportation by all echelons and organizations of the command, coupled with the uninterrupted and swift progress of the regiments, necessitated holding incoming personnel for longer than normal periods at the Division Reinforcement Company, until such time as the organizations were in a position to receive them. The great distance separating the Division from the Army Reinforcement installations at which reinforcements and casuals were available also added to the problems involved in maintaining the Division strength.

VIII. Special Service Activities:

During the period 7 - 10 March 1945, the only static phase experienced by the Division during the month, Clubmobiles were continuously utilized, as well as motion picture and USB shows. The Division band and orchestra were made available for concerts, reviews and special occasions. Rapid movement precluded Special Services activities other than routine supply of PX items, and of "Stars and Stripes", "Yank", and daily news summaries.

IX. Leaves, Furloughs, and Passes:

Passes were authorized to Paris. Seven day leaves and furloughs were granted to visit the US Riviera Recreational Area, in accordance with quotas allotted the Division. Several field officers were given 72 hours of temporary duty in London, England, for rest and relaxation.

A total of 8 Officers and 77 Enlisted Hen were returned to the United States for rest and recuperation at their homes.

X. APQ:

The APO operated at the Division Quartermaster Company, to permit economy of transportation and continuous delivery and receipt of mail in fast-moving situations. Administratively, it was found less satisfactory than operation at the Division Rear Echelon, since the handling of Money Orders under current postal regulations, redirectory service, and the maintenance of accurate locator records, was made more difficult by the APO's separation from the latter installation.

XI. Schools:

Feekly officer quotas were sent to the Information and Education, and Special Service Schools in Paris. Infantry CCS quotas were filled in the majority of cases. A total of six candidates have been sent to date.

XII. Miscellaneous:

The Division General, Court continued to function satisfactorily in the forward echelon of Division Headquarters.

XIII. Military Government:

The Military Government Section operated with great efficiency under all conditions. All communities occupied were organized and the Division Security Guard posted until relieved by higher headquarters. The great numbers of displaced persons as well as of liberated allied PW's uncovered, constituted the most serious problem. The normal policy was to hold such persons in place until plans could be made for appropriate evacuation and movement to the rear. Large stores of food and equipment were uncovered and placed under guard until disposition could be effected as directed by G-A, or until relieved by Higher Headquarters.
