Observing another man get hit by a mortar fragment, he again braved the intense enemy fire to carry the man to safety. S Sgt SCALES bravery, thoughtfulness, and devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from ARIZONA.

S Sgt BOUMBOURAS' courageous leadership and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from PENNSYLVANIA.

JOSEPH E. DOBRINESKI, 33347801, Cpl, Btry C, 315th FA Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in GERMANY on 13 March 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While registering on a position near OBER ZERF, GERMANY, Cpl DOBRINESKI'S gun section was subjected to a severe concentration of enemy artillery fire. BRUNO D. LAUDI, 32593110, Sgt (then Pvt), Btry C, 905th FA Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in LUXEMBOURG on 27 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While observing mortar and artillery fire, a severe mortar barrage was laid down in Sgt LAUDI'S area and severed vital communication lines. With disregard for personal safety he crawled through the impact area and continued his reports by radio. Sgt LAUDI'S accurate reports and courageous action were responsible for silencing the mortars and exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.
