AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named Officers and Enlisted Men: DANIEL D. STUART, 0474197, Capt, MC, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France on 18 August 1944, and during the period 12 - 16 September 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 18 August 1944, during the Argentan Campaign, Capt Stuart, with utter disregard for his own safety, organized a temporary aid station and continued to treat and evacuate all casualties while being subjected to artillory and small arms fire. On 12 September 1944, during the initial crossing of the Moselle River, Capt Stuart made a thorough reconnaissance of all roads into Diculouard and led the collecting company into a defiladed position from which it could give maximum medical support for the river crossing. All during this phase the bridgehead was subjected to terrific enemy shelling. During the period 14 - 16 September 1944, Capt Stuart personally led. his ambulances to a battalion of friendly troops which had been isolated by the enemy and had suffered heavy casualties. Under heavy enemy fire Capt Stuart supervised the evacuation of the wounded and thereby made possible the saving of many lives which would otherwise have been lost due to lack of adequate. medical attention.
