Hyman E. Tepper, 32435556, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 6 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While consolidating newly won Dahl, Luxembourg, on 6 January 1945, a heavy artillery barrage fell in the company sector wounding a soldier near Pfc Tepper. Disregarding the danger fro enemy fire, Pfc Tepper left the shelter of his foxhole and, with the assistance of another soldier, carried the wounded man to shelter in a nearby house. His courage, bravery, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR (MISSING IN ACTION): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 500-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel ' (Missing in Action):

Auburn Calhoun, 35770695, S Sgt (then Cpl), Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 25 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During an attack on Kehmen, Luxembourg, on 25 December 1944, S Sgt Calhoun, machine gun section leader attached to an assaulting platoon, successfully emplaced his guns despite enemy small arms and artillery fire so as to effectively dery the enemy a retreat from the town. When his ammunition was expended he courageously led his men as riflemen, despite enemy efforts, to aid the attacking infantry. S Sgt Calhoun's leadership, courage, and example are commensurate with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

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were numerous casualties in Kehmen, Luxembourg, on 25 December 1944, Tec 5 Bartholomew, a litter bearer, with utter disregard for his own safety, entered the town and, despite the fierce fighting, evacuated casualties to the rear through heavy artillery and mortar fire. He made repeated trips under fire until cut off from the town by enemy troops. Lloyd E. Overholt, 35330056, Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France and Luxembourg during the period 15 August 1944, to 7 February 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 15 August 1944, to 7 February 1945, Sgt. Overholt has distinguished himself in performing his duties in a superior manner. Serving as communications sergeant with an infantry company, he has by his outstanding efficiency, resourcefulness, and untiring efforts, successfully maintained continuous wire and radio communications under combat conditions, thereby contributing materially to the successful operations of his unit. Despite the severe enemy fire directed at him he returned to the command post where the rocket launcher was used effectively in stemming the attack. Pfc Tanner's courage, aggressiveness, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Leonard J. Tavernia, &2117955, S Sgt (then Pfc), Inf, Army of the United States.
