SUBJECT: After Action Report for period 6 August 1944 to 31 August 1944 inclusive. (Section II - Intelligence Operations).

TO: The Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. (Through Channels).

- 1. The first phase of the operations of this Battalion in action was a series of fast moves across France and in very few instances did the situation stabilize to the extent that proper use could be made of organized OP's. During this phase the information gained came mostly from forward observers with the infantry units. This information came either as an intelligence report direct to the S-2 or in the nature of a fire mission to the S-3. In the latter case the missions were given to the S-2 for intelligence information. Another source of information during this period was reports of French Civilians, which proved very reliable.
- 2. The S-3 and S-2 section of this Battalion are separated but close liaison does exist between them. Copies of all fire missions are sent to the S-2 section and S-2 reports are sent to S-3. In this manner the same results are obtained without interferring with the primary mission of a FDC.
- 3. The Codes in use are all established by higher head-quarters and are constant throughout the Division or Division Artillery. This Battalion has had very little success with the Slidex code, while it is a simple code, it changes too often.

SJBJECT: After Action Report for period 6 August 1944 to 31 August 1944 inclusive. (Section III - Logistics, supply procedure, problems).

TO: The Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. (Through Channels).

1. Class I: a. From 1 August 1944 to 31 August 1944 "C", "K" and 10-in-1 were available.

b. Issues were timely, no difficulties encountered.

- 2. Class II: Very few needs were noted during this period. Original issues were still combat serviceable.
- 3. Class III: Sufficient gas and oil available. Each vehicle carried surplus cans; ten per $2\frac{1}{2}$ Ton vehicle, four to six per 3/4 Ton and two per $\frac{1}{4}$ Ton.
 - 4. Class IV: No difficulties.
- 5. Class V: Some difficulties encountered at Argentan in allocations, availability and lot numbers.
- 6. Position of Service Battery: Approxmately six to ten miles to rear of the organization on entry into action. Marched as a march unit with organization.
- 7. Vehicles: a. No major difficulties encountered in spite of 60% to 100% overload.
- b. Route marking by military police of all echelons inadequate. No march units were lost but extra time was consumed to clarify situation at various points enroute.

SUBJECT: After Action Report for period 6 August 1944 to 31 August 1944 inclusive. (Section IV - Personnel and Allied Administration).

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. (Through Channels).

- 1. Strength: The Esttalion entered the period with an actual strength of thirty (30) officers, two (2) warrant officers and four hundred and eventy-two (472) enlisted men. On 14 August 1944 four (4) officer replacements were received. Eleven (11) enlisted replacements were received during the month.
- 2. Location: The Battalion Personnel Section was located with the Division Rear Echelon (Administrative Center). This echelon was usually from five to twenty-five miles back of the forward elements but telephone communication and daily messenger service were maintained. The rear echelon changed location seven times during this period due to the rapid advance of our forces.
- 3. Security: Blackout and security discipline is maintained at all times. A security guard composed of rear echelon personnel is maintained. The rear echelon has not been strafed or shelled by the enemy. However, German patrols totalling approximately twenty men were observed on two different nights. Of these, seven were captured, one killed and one known wounded by the security guard.
- 4. Equipment: The T/E makes no provisions for tentage for the Personnel Section which, to say the least, is an oversight since we have been compelled to operate out of doors. A tent was procured.
- 5. Operation: The preparation of Morning Reports was transferred from the batteries to the personnel section, the official M/R being prepared from summary reports submitted by the batteries. This is a practicable solution in the handling of these reports since it insured their prompt submission to higher headquarters. Strength figures are readily accessible and replacements are requisitioned accordingly.
