SECTION I (B)

10 May to 31 May 1945

A program of vehicle and equipment maintenance was instigated and carried out upon the cessation of hostilities. The goal was to get all motors and equipment in first-class condition. Rehabilitation of personnel was given much attention. Opportunities for showers, laundry, and athletics and recreation were made available to all. Toward the latter part of the month formal command inspections were held on all equipment and materiel to determine their cleanliness, serviceability, and shortages. Several battalion retreat ceremonies were held for the presentation of awards. Instruction in military courtesy and guard duties were held daily. A daily period of close order drill or calesthenics was conducted by each battery. On 20 May this battalion was attached to the 3rd Cavalry Group with the mission of direct support of the group. A march toward the Mur River Valley was made on 21 May but not completed. Orders were received to go into rendezvous near Tweng, Austria and await further instructions. On 31 May the battalion was still in rendezvous in the vicinity of Tweng awaiting orders.

SECTION II

1 May 1945 - 31 May 1945:

At the start of the period the 314th Field Artillery Battalion was in direct support of the 318th Combat Team and located at Moosthening, Germany (WU 5018). During the period of 1 May 1945 to 6 May 1945, the 314th Field Artillery Battalion moved from Moosthening, Germany (WU 5018) to Reisbach, Germany (WU 6008), then to Irging, Germany (WZ 8978) and then to St. Peter, Austria (WZ 9775), and at no time did the battalion have contact with the enemy.

On the 7th of May, the 314th Field Artillery Battalion left St. Peter, Austria (WZ 9775) and moved to Nieder Holzham, Austria (XU 4758) and was in bivouac there when hostilities ceased.

During the period 9 May 1945 to 20 May 1945, the 314th Field Artillery Battalion established road blocks and ran motorized patrols within its area. Civilians and PWs were checked for proper credentials. Civilians without proper credentials were evacuated to the CIC and PWs evacuated to the Division PW cage.

On 21 May 1945, the 314th Field Artillery Battalion was attached to Task Force Polk and marched to Tweng, Austria (XA 4460), where the battalion went into bivouac. Again road blocks were established with the instructions to check both civilians and PWs and to guide them to the British PW Camp of the 5th Battalion of the Northampton Regiment.

The only difficulty encountered by the guards during this period was that of displaced persons who knew nothing about passes and had to be taken to the British C.P. for proper identification. Displaced persons seemed not to be properly instructed in what they were to do. This lack of knowledge with the proper procedure for displaced persons and the language difference were the only problems at that time.

AFTER ACTION REPORT FOR MAY 1945

Supply functions during the month were generally satisfactory. Reports are rendered by respective classifications.

CLASS I

Rations issued during the last half of the period were unsatisfactory in that we did not receive full rations. The menu for three days consisted of corned beef and beans for each meal and there were no vegetables included therein. This was mainly due to our separation from division supply channels.

Recommendations:

Condiments are not issued sufficiently and in order to aid limited menus they should be issued more often and in larger amounts. Flour, baking powder, and preserves for baking are greatly desired, as well as flavoring extracts and other spices.

CLASS II

Clothing issues were unsatisfactory. There is great need of replacements for salvageable trousers and shirts, wool, O.D., cotton underwear, field jackets, helmet liners, and various size shoes. There is considerable need of replacements of equipment such as rifle belts.

CLASS III

Requirements have been met very satisfactorily.

MOTOR NOTES

The shortage of tires and tubes for 1/4-tons and 2-1/2-ton vehicles still exists, and there is critical need of hot patches for tire repairs.
