Reinforcements and RID's were processed through the Division Reinforcement Company (Provisional) to their respective organizations. Equipment was checked and adjustment of personal matters effected; billets were provided and hot meals served. Processing period normally approximated 18 hours including an overnight stay.

### SUBJECT: G-1 After Action Report. (Cont'd)

The Division I&E Officer and Chaplain presented the various Reinforcement groups Forld conditions with emphasis centering around for what we are fighting, the History and Forld War II Actions of the Division, and present missions and profected operations of the Command.

Incoming Reinforcements: Of many procedures of getting Reinforcements up to their assignments, this command favors the method of assignments, when possible, to the reserve Battalions. However, heavy engagements and the uneven flow of Reinforcements do not permit this accomplishment.

## 6. Special Service Activities:

A brief period of rest, during the period 7-21 December 1944 after 102 consecutive days of combat permitted the scheduling of extensive special service activities. Clubmobiles, USO stage shows, the Division Band, and motion pictures were utilized daily. Passes to Paris and Mancy were alloted to all organisations of the command, as were quotas to the XII Corps Rest Camp in Mancy, with emphasis on the personnel of the Infantry regiments.

Also, writing paper, books and magazines were extensively secured and distributed by Special Service Officers, Chaplains and Red Cross personnel.

Temporary Dury to United States: Six Officers and fifty nine enlisted men were given furloughs to their respective homes, for a 30 day period of rest, rehabilitation and recuperation.

#### 6. America Artivities;

Clubrobiles were continuously willised. Passes were authorized to Paris, Lamenbourg, and the XII Corps Rest Camp at Manoy, France. During a short holding phase during the latter part of the month, metien platures, USO shows and the Division Band were continuously scheduled.

A total of 3 officers and 56 enlisted men were returned to the United States for 30 days of rest and recuperation at their homes.

#### 7. Miscellaneous:

The Division General Court, and to a large extent the Staff Judge Advocate, operated in the forward echelon of Division Headquarters. The resultant proximity of the Court to organizations of the Division greatly facilitated attendance by witnesses and court personnel and permitted expeditious completion of trials.

#### 8. Manpower:

Extra effort, planning and assignment of Battle Fatigue cases, whom the Medical Official determined would never again be able to enter front line duty, was made to fill authorized overstrength in the Signal Company and Military Police Platoon, to fill vacancies in various Headquarters Companies, and to formulate Class II and Class V Salvage Collection and disposal teams.
