I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR, POSTHUMOUSLY: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following named Enlisted Man:

Warren H. McKinney, 35436744, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 26 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 November 1944, S Sgt McKinney, in command of a machine gun platoon, reorganized the platoon and the remaining elements of a rifle company into a fighting unit in an attack on the enemy. Despite the fact that S Sgt McKinney and his group were greatly outnumbered, and in the face of direct enemy machine gun fire, he successfully led them in routing the enemy and capturing the objective, repulsing later enemy assaults on territory gained. The personal bravery, leadership, and loyal devotion to duty demonstrated by S Sgt McKinney exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from West Virginia.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR (OAK LEAF CLUSTER): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Silver Star previously awarded, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded the following named Enlisted Man:

William T. Smith, 38538428, S Sgt, MD, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 11 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 11 November 1944, S Sgt Smith, in company with another comrade, voluntarily advanced under an intense bombardment from enemy anti-aircraft artillery, mortar, and small arms fire in a vehicle to reach the commander of the battalion, who had become a casualty, evacuating him to safety. The personal bravery, resourcefulness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Smith are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

III. AWARD OF SILVER STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

WILLIAM J. BOYDSTUN, 0401562, Lt Col, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 28 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 28

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1944, in an enemy counterattack, Lt Col Boydstun became isolated from his men but withstood rifle fire and hand grenade attacks on his position. With utter disregard for his own safety, he infiltrated through enemy lines to secure and guide tank support for his battalion. The added tank support coupled with the reorganizations Lt Col Boydstun effected, successfully routed the enemy. His tactical knowledge, aggressive leadership, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

ELDON C. GARDNER, 01319273, 2d Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 4 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 4 December 1944, while leading his rifle platoon in an attack on the enemy, Lt Gardner assaulted an enemy truck and anti-tank gun escaping down a road covered by enemy machine guns and bordered by trenches occupied by the enemy. With utter disregard for his own safety, Lt Gardner ran directly into the face of the raking enemy fire, firing his carbine to kill the driver, and hurling hand grenades to destroy the truck and the remainder of the crew. His courage, aggressiveness, and loyal devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Iowa.

MILNOR E. GLEAVES, 01322911, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 25 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 25 November 1944, while reconnoitering enemy territory for prospective positions for the machine guns of his section, Lt Gleaves discovered an enemy pillbox, capturing seven occupants without any assistance. Later, he led a squad in an assault on another pillbox whose fire was temporarily delaying the advance of the infantry, capturing one officer and thirty seven of the enemy. His outstanding leadership, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Byron L. Hoover, 35385939, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 20 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 20 November 1944, S Sgt Hoover, serving as Intelligence Non-Commissioned Officer, preceded the infantry in an advance to secure enemy information. Upon reaching a river he discovered that the bridge across it had been destroyed. Unhesitatingly and with complete disregard for his personal safety he swam the river and penetrated deep into enemy territory to reconnoiter it to secure valuable information which contributed greatly in the successful advance of his comrades. The personal bravery, resourcefulness, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Hoover exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

Augustin E. Kruger, 6693316, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 15 September 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 15 September 1944, the rifle company in which S Sgt Kruger served as supply sergeant had expended their supply of ammunition in a determined effort to retain an established bridgehead against the enemy. With full knowledge of the dangers

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involved in attempting to supply the company S Sgt Kruger commandeered a tank to insure the ammunition getting through. Placing the ammunition on the back of the tank and riding outside the tank himself, he successfully completed the mission contributing greatly in repulsing the enemy. The courage, initiative, and loyal devotion to duty demonstrated by S Sgt Kruger exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Mid Thomas M. Martinez, 38441541, Tec 5, MD, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 26 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 November 1944, in an attack on the enemy, a request was made for treatment and evacuation of casualties. Without hesitating, Tec 5 Martinez and a companion voluntarily proceeded in their litter truck, while under intense automatic weapons, artillery, and small arms fire, to render prompt medical attention and successfully evacuate seventeen comrades, contributing greatly to the saving of the lives of these men. The personal bravery, resourcefulness, and loyal devotion to duty demonstrated by Tec 5 Martinez exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

JOHN H. SCANLON, 01295437, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 22 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 22 December 1944, with utter disregard for his personal safety, Lt Scanlon led his rifle company through mortar, direct fire weapons, and small arms fire, to successfully seize the objective. Despite wounds he received as a result of this action, he continued in the attack, accounting for the capture of sixty of the enemy. The exceptional leadership, courage, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Lt Scanlon are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

Mid Charles R. Sizemore, 35434577, Pfc, MD, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 26 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 November 1944, in an attack on the enemy a request was made for treatment and evacuation of casualties. Without hesitating, Pfc Sizemore and a companion voluntarily proceeded in their litter truck, while under intense automatic weapons, artillery, and small arms fire, to render prompt medical attention and successfully evacuate seventeen comrades, contributing greatly to the saving of the lives of these men. The personal bravery, resourcefulness, and loyal devotion to duty demonstrated by Pfc Sizemore exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from West Virginia.

ALBERT S. TOSI, 0416099, Lt Col, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 23 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 23 December 1944, Lt Col Tosi, with utter disregard for his personal safety, exposed himself to enemy fire to continue to lead his battalion in an attack on the enemy until he was seriously wounded. The leadership, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty demonstrated by Lt Col Tosi are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

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ALFRED S. VAN HOOSE, JR, 01321969, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 28 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 28 November 1944, after successfully repulsing an enemy counterattack, Lt Van Hoose was ordered to reorganize his weapons platoon into a combat patrol to contact scattered remnants of a battalion isolated behind enemy lines. With utter disregard of his personal safety, he led his men, armed with pistols and carbines, into hostile territory, and by intelligently planning an enemy ambush, twenty eight American soldiers were released from their captors and other scattered remnants of the battalion were successfully guided back to friendly lines. The exceptional leadership, initiative, and sincere devotion to duty demonstrated by Lt Van Hoose are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama.

Joseph Wercholak, 32064877, 1st Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France during the period 8 - 11 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. From 8 November 1944, to 11 November 1944, 1st Sgt Wercholak, assuming command of a company after all officers became casualties, led his company in continuous fighting with the enemy, successfully seizing all objectives, and establishing and holding a bridgehead against determined enemy efforts to destroy it. The outstanding leadership, courage, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by 1st Sgt Wercholak exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

IV. AWARD OF PURPLE HEART (OAK LEAF CLUSTER): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Purple Heart previously awarded, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded Pvt Harold A. Trafton, 6135573, Inf, for wounds received as a result of enemy action in France on 8 November 1944.
