I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

Glenn Heath, 34043994, Pfc, MD, Army of the United States: For heroic achievement in France on 11 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 11 November 1944, while evacuating patients from an infantry battalion aid station, the ambulance of which Pfc Heath was assistant driver became mired in heavy ground in an area covered by enemy fire directed against advancing tanks. With utter disregard for the enemy barrage, Pfc Heath fastened a tow rope to a passing tank and thereby succeeded in evacuating his patients and vehicle. His courage, initiative, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Sander Jacobs, 42016191, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 4 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 4 December 1944, during the course of an infantry platoon assault, the platoon leader was seriously wounded in an advanced and exposed position, heavily covered by enemy machine gun and small arms fire. Pvt Jacobs, platoon runner, shuttled back and forth, with utter disregard for his own safety, serving as liaison between the wounded officer and the rest of the platoon to deliver orders and report on the course of the assault. The courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Jacobs exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Howard J. Jeschke, 15105136, Sgt, Cav, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 24 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 23 November 1944, the 1st platoon of a reconnaissance unit had the mission of reconnaissance to the regimental front. It advanced to a town without contacting enemy forces but was delayed for the night because of blown bridges. The next morning, after the platoon leader had left to make a personal reconnaissance of the river for a crossing site, an enemy combat patrol heavily armed with automatic weapons and bazookas opened fire on the platoon. Despite the unavoidable confusion, Sgt Jeschke quickly organized his section and engaged the enemy while the remainder of the platoon was being reorganized by the platoon sergeant. Although outnumbered, the section effectively routed the enemy. The courage, leadership, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Sgt Jeschke are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Indiana.

Arthur H. Kuhn, 36629909, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 4 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 4 December 1944, in an attack by a rifle company against strong enemy positions, the company assault platoons, while crossing an open field, were subjected to a heavy artillery concentration, causing casualties. Pfc Kuhn, a rifleman in the supporting platoon, observing the casualties among the forward elements of the company, fearlessly, and without thought of personal safety, ran into the intense and continuing concentration to administer first aid to three wounded comrades and carried a fourth to the cover of a defilade. The courage, resourcefulness, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Kuhn are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Illinois.

JOHN H. SCANLON, 01295437, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France en 4 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 4 December 1944, while leading his company in an assault on the enemy, Lt Scanlon discovered that a platoon of the company had attacked in an area outside the company sector while the reserve platoon had been committed on an emergency mission. Continuing the attack with his one remaining platoon, against heavy enemy resistance, he successfully led them in seizing the objective. The leadership, initiative, and devotion to duty displayed by Lt Scanlon exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

Floyd M. Shaw, 38209207, Pfc, MD, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 11 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 11 November 1944, while evacuating patients from an infantry battalion aid station, the ambulance driven by Pfc Shaw became mired in heavy ground in an area covered by enemy fire directed against advancing tanks. With utter disregard for the enemy barrage, Pfc Shaw fastened a tow rope to a passing tank and thereby succeeded in evacuating his patients and vehicle. His courage, initiative, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Louis Spino, 35386422, T Sgt (then S Sgt), Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 15 September 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 15 September 1944, T Sgt (then S Sgt) Spino, squad leader of a 57mm anti-tank gun crew, ignoring the danger from direct 88mm fire, led his men in successfully destroying an enemy tank. During the encounter two of his men were wounded. Despite the heavy artillery fire T Sgt (then S Sgt) Spino administered first aid and personally evacuated the two injured men. His courage, leadership, and sincere devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from West Virginia.

Paul F. Stader, 15105038, Sgt, Cav, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 24 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 24 November 1944, the 1st platoon of a reconnaissance unit had the mission of reconnai

Despite a heavy concentration of enemy mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire, Pvt Taylor, voluntarily and without hesitation, proceeded to administer medical aid to the injured of both platoons. The courage, aggressiveness, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Taylor exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Connecticut.
