I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR (OAK LEAF CLUSTER): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded the following named Officer and Enlisted Man:

Richard O. Barnhart, 37450078, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, S Sgt Barnhart and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled foxholes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, S Sgt Barnhart and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. The outstanding bravery, perseverance, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Barnhart exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Nebraska.

JARRETT C. McCONNICO, 01017643, 1st Lt, Inf (Armd), Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 4 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 4 December 1944, Lt McConnico, platoon leader, during the course of an attack learned that the company commander of a supporting company had been wounded by mortar fire. The medics were unable to reach the injured man due to the intense enemy fire. The enemy upon seeing Lt McConnico's tank coming into view, opened up with an assortment of weapons, in an attempt to destroy it. Ignoring the shells and small arms fire, he continued on until he had reached the wounded officer, carrying and placing him in the tank. The enemy continued firing throughout, but unhesitatingly and daringly Lt McConnico returned to carry a wounded infantryman back to the tank, safely evacuating both men. The personal bravery, determination, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Lt McConnico exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR, POSTHUMOUSLY: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following named Officer and Enlisted Men:

Francis B. Ford, 35434969, T Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 2 September 1944, to 23 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 2 September 1944, to 23 November 1944, T Sgt Ford distinguished himself in his duties as platoon sergeant. While under constant enemy fire he consistently demonstrated brilliant leadership in successfully repelling numerous enemy counterattacks. He also displayed outstanding ability in leading patrols in enemy territory to procure information vital for military operations. The bravery, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by T Sgt Ford exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

Alton E. Franz, 37709376, Cpl, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, Cpl Franz and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled foxholes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, Cpl Franz and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. The outstanding bravery, perseverance, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Cpl Franz exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Colorado.

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JOSEPH F. GRADY, JR, 0133244, Capt (then 1st Lt), Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 22 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 22 November 1944, Lt Grady led his rifle company in an attack to relieve another rifle company of his battalion which had been encircled in a position far advanced into enemy lines. When the objective was reached, a diversion had been obtained which permitted the encircled company to withdraw but the order had not been received by Lt Grady and his two leading platoons. He held his position steadfastly throughout the day under heavy mortar and artillery fire and in the face of raking enemy machine gun fire. Only upon receipt of the delayed order did Lt Grady withdraw from his exposed positions. The personal courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Lt Grady exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR (MISSING IN ACTION): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named Enlisted Man (Missing in Action):

During the period 12 October 1944, to 7 November 1944, Pvt Abelaff, a scout, participated in difficult night patrol activities to successfully obtain information as to enemy strength and gun emplacements, vitally necessary to the plans of an offensive. Despite the hazards of a river crossing into enemy held ground heavily defended by automatic weapons, mines and trip wires, Pvt Abelaff completed each assigned mission, and on one occasion brought back an enemy prisoner for interrogation. The personal bravery, resourcefulness, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Abelaff are commensurate with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Edward A. Asselta, 32409799, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, Pfc Asselta and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled foxholes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, Pfc Asselta and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. The outstanding bravery, perseverance, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Asselta exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Joseph C. Clark, 34380448, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. The following day in a fire fight with the enemy a German machine gun was harassing the company with whom Tec 5 Coble served, whereupon he engaged the enemy with the machine gun mounted on his vehicle and successfully silenced the enemy's fire. The courage, initiative, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Tec 5 Coble exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Calvin B. Farris, 38628119, Cpl, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, Cpl Farris and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled fox-holes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, Cpl Farris and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. The outstanding bravery, perseverance, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Cpl Farris exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

CARL L. ISAACSON, 0540069, 2d Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 12 October 1944, to 7 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 12 October 1944, to 7 November 1944, Lt Isaacson, Patrol Leader, led his men in difficult night patrol activities to successfully obtain information as to enemy strength and gun emplacements, vitally necessary to the plans of an offensive. Despite the hazards of a river crossing into enemy held ground heavily defended by automatic weapons, mines, and trip wires, Lt Isaacson completed each assigned mission, and on one occasion brought back an enemy prisoner for interrogation. The personal bravery, leadership, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Lt Isaacson are commensurate with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Montana.

V. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named Officer and Enlisted Men:

Harry Kinnare, 39000311, S Sgt, Inf. (Armd), Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 10 September 1944, to 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 10 September 1944, to 27 November 1944, S Sgt Kinnare distinguished himself in performing his duties as a Tank Platoon Sergeant and in the absence of an officer served in the capacity of a Tank Platoon Leader. While in charge of six assault tanks in an attack, S Sgt Kinnare encountered a heavily mined road, commanding the situation, he used a map and compass, by-passed the obstacle and guided the platoon of tanks cross country to another usable road to successfully complete the assigned mission. In enemy counterattacks, under direct heavy fire from howitzers, 88mm guns, anti-tank guns, bazookas, and snipers, with total disregard for his personal safety, he assisted in repelling these assaults, accounting for two 88mm guns, three machine gun nests, two command cars, and one horse drawn artillery piece. The courage, leadership, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Kinnare exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Lyle E. Klintberg, 37736835, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, Pvt Klintberg and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled foxholes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, Pvt Klintberg and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. During the period 8 October 1944, to 8 December 1944, S Sgt Loesch, Squad Leader, led his men in many difficult patrol activities to successfully obtain information as to enemy strength and positions vitally necessary to the plans of offensives. Despite the hazards of heavy machine gun and artillery fire, he completed each assigned mission. The courage, leadership, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Loesch exemplify the finest traditions

Louis C. Romano, 33720688, Tec 4, MD, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France on 20 August 1944, and 11 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 20 August 1944, in an attack on the enemy Tec 4 Romano, with utter disregard for his own safety, ran directly into machine gun fire to give aid to a wounded comrade and safely evacuated him. On 11 November 1944, under heavy artillery fire, Tec 4 Romano moved from one wounded comrade to another to administer first aid. The personal courage, determination, and sincere devotion to duty

Nicholas F. Sagnella, 31454312, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 13 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. As a member of a forward observers field artillery liaison party, during the period 13 - 16 November 1944, Pvt Sagnella made his way through a heavy concentration of mortar and artillery fire to establish an observation post outside an enemy held town. Standing on the back of a tank, Pvt Sagnella assisted his officer in successfully directing vital artillery fire missions thereby enabling the advancing infantry to continue its progress. His exceptional courage, and unselfish devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Connecticut.

Raymond Schmidt, 36775598, Tec 5, MD, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France on 25 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 25 November 1944, Tec 5 Schmidt, an aid man attached to an infantry rifle platoon, was engaged in administering first aid on the field of battle under heavy enemy machine gun and small arms fire when he received a bullet wound in the arm. Refusing to be evacuated, he continued to expose himself to the raking fire as he moved from one injured comrade to another. He later received a second wound, this time in the chest, and again he refused medical attention but continued with his duties until the objective had been attained and the action concluded. Only then did he permit his personal evacuation. The courage, determination, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Tec 5 Schmidt exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Illinois.

William J. Smithers, 36511697, T Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, T Sgt Smithers and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled foxholes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, T Sgt Smithers and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. The outstanding bravery, perseverance, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by T Sgt Smithers exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Michigan.

Purles W. Watkins, 33548552, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 12 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 8 - 12 November 1944, in an attack on the enemy, Pfc Watkins, on his own initiative, voluntarily assumed the duties of the acting communications sergeant, who had earlier become a casualty. Without regard for personal safety, Pfc Watkins went through the entire attack under heavy artillery, mortar, and machine gun fire to successfully maintain radio communications with his battalion at all times. The courage, tireless efforts, and sincere devotion to duty

displayed by Pfc Watkins exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Maryland.

CRAWFORD W. WELCH, 01285672, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 15 - 25 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Lt Welch, rifle platoon leader assigned to an infantry rifle company on 15 November 1944, valiantly and aggressively led his platoon until he was evacuated for wounds on 25 November 1944. Through his efforts he contributed greatly to the successful assault on an enemy held fort which was exceedingly difficult due to the barbed wire entanglements, tank ditches, and intense cross fire from flanking pill boxes. After seizing the objective, Lt Welch and his platoon repelled four enemy counterattacks during which time he received a machine gun bullet wound. The courage, superior leadership, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Lt Welch exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Alfred Wieck, 39049179, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving with a rifle company, then at less than half strength, during the period 8 - 16 November 1944, Pvt Wieck and his comrades held a defensive position for five days under the difficult conditions of water filled foxholes, bitter cold, and rain, then participated in an attack against a superior enemy force, accomplishing their objective and accounting for forty enemy killed or captured. With but one day rest, Pvt Wieck and his company held and defended their ground despite intense artillery, mortar, and heavy machine gun fire from the Germans. The outstanding bravery, perseverance, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Wieck exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Fred S. Willingham, 34586200, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 16 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 16 November 1944, Pfc Willingham, automatic rifleman, participated in an assault on a heavily defended village. As his company advanced across an open field the enemy concentrated artillery, mortar, and machine gun fire upon the assaulting forces. Seeing his squad leader become a casualty, Pfc Willingham determinedly advanced, firing into the enemy emplacements with his automatic rifle. Then, in full observation of the enemy and under intense fire, he carried his wounded squad leader to a nearby shell hole, returning to join in the assault until he himself became a casualty. The outstanding courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Willingham exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama.
