I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

JOSEPH C. SNYDER, 01822325, 1st Lt, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic service in Luxembourg on 24 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. As reconnaissance platoon leader, Lt Snyder has rendered invaluable aid to his tark destroyer battalion by the efficient and thorough reconnaissance which he has made in locating firing positions and routes of approach for the tank destroyers. On 24 January 1945, as he was recommoitering for a gun position well forward in the battle section, he was wounded by enemy fire. With the mission as his chief thought, he reported all the vital information he had obtained to the battalion command post before he permitted the medical detachment to evacuate him. His courage, skill, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest ideals of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Illinois.

Vernon Spenler, 37677106, S Sgt (then Pfc), Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Germany on 12 February 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the assault on the Siegfried Line near Wallendorf, Germany, on 12 February 1945, when his platoon was halted by a German outpost, Sgt Spenler talked the enemy into surrendering. By capturing these soldiers the platoon was able to flank and capture three enemy pillboxes with a minimum of casualties. S Sgt Spenler's courage, initiative, and devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Iowa.

Eugene M. Strickland, 34669920, Tec 5, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic service in Luxembourg on 6 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 6 January 1945, Tec 5 Strickland, serving as a member of a forward observer party attached to an infantry company, found that the entire unit was surrounded by the enemy near Goesdorf, Germany, and was receiving intense enemy mortar and artillery fire coupled with small arms fire on all sides. With utter disregard for his own personal safety, Tec 5 Strickland remained at his radio and by sending fire missions to the firing batteries, aided the company to safely withdraw to a better position. The bravery, skill, and courageous devotion to duty displayed by Tec 5 Strickland are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from North Carolina.

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Fred D. Suttle, 37709378, Cpl, Armd, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 18 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 18 January 1945, during the fierco fighting at Dahl, Luxembourg, the tank in which Cpl Suttle served as gunner was hit three times by enemy artillery, seriously wounding two of the crew. Despite the intense artillery falling all about the area, Cpl Suttle ordered the tank to be moved to a covered position and saw that the wounded were evacuated. His courage and devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Colorado.

Warren M. Toler, 35438059, Pvt, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Germany on 16 March 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 16 March 1945, Pvt Toler, as a member of an artillery forward observer party, had dismounted with his party to clear a road block from their path in a heavily wooded area near Weiskirchen, Germany, when the enemy ambushed them, killing two men and wounding the other. Although still under enemy fire, P#t Toler carried the wounded man to safety and, not being able to obtain aid, returned to the scene alone to find that the enemy had withdrawn. Pvt Toler's bravery under fire and devotion to duty are commensurate with the highest ideals of the armed forces of the United States: Entered military service from West Virginia.

FRANK M. TOWNSEND, 01176826, 2d Lt, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic service in Germany on 21 February 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While serving as an artillery forward observer near Lahr, Germany, Lt Townsend voluntarily advanced ahead of the company to which he was attached in order to locate mortars, whose fire was delaying the attack. Disregarding the small arms fire and the danger of being captured, he and his radio operator infiltrated the enemy lines and, after finding the mortars, registered accurate fire which destroyed the position. On another occasion, while crossing the Main River, he and his radio operator located German artillery positions which he destroyed by accurately adjusting artillery fire on them. It Townsend's courage, initiative, and sincere devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

Joseph C. Vitolo, 32822925, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Germany on 16 March 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 16 March 1945, Pfc Vitolo was serving as an assistant radio operator at an artillery forward observation post in Berger, Germany, when an enemy artillery shell hit the observation post, MAL wounding the radio operator and another soldier who was outside the house. Desplite the fact that he was under enemy observation, Pfc Vitolo ran to the aid of the wounded man and carried him to safety, utterly disregarding the severe shell fire directed at him. His courage, initiative, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

James F. Whitaker, 34011700, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Germany on 7 February 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the difficult crossing of the Our River and the assault into the Siegfried Line near Hoesdorf.

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Germany, the supply problem for the advance elements became critical, as all attempts to build a bridge across the river had been thwarted by the swift river and heavy enemy artillery fire. S Sgt Whitaker, an anti-tank squad leader, worked for three successive nights carrying supplies across the river in an assault boat, completely disregarding the darger from enemy fire. His courage, initiative, and sincere devotion to buty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Georgia.

- W. C. Womack, 38119157, Cpl, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic service in Gormany during the period 10 13 February 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 10 13 February 1945, Cpl Womack, an artillery wire chief, realizing the vit 1 need for wire communication across the Our River to the infantry troops assaulting the Siegfried Line, established a forwar! switching central in the town of Wallendorf, Gormany. Although under enemy artillery fire, Col Womack maintained wire communication with the infantry liaison officers and battalions throughout the entire operation. The courage, initiative, and devotion to duty displayed by Cpl Womack exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.
