Manuel M. Contreras, 39280329, Pfc, Co E, 318th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Germany on 3 April 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 3 April 1945, Pfc Contreras, an automatic rifleman, accompanied his squad in a flank attack against enemy machine gun positions which delayed the company advance near Kassel, Germany. Having been detected in its move the squad was fired on by machine gun and automatic weapons forcing it to take cover. 'Pfc Contreras and his squad leader, disregarding the withering fire, advanced directly into the enemy position and by assault fire killed six of the enemy and relieved their squad for a continued attack in which twelve enemy soldiers were killed and thirty five were captured. Pfc Contreras' courage, aggressiveness, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Anthony S. DiDonato, 42133505, S Sgt, Co B, 317th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 26 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 January 1945, as Pvt DiDonato's platoon pushed forward in the attack on Neidhausen, Luxembourg, they were met by severe enemy machine gun fire. Voluntarily, Pvt DiDonato assaulted the machine gun position capturing the gunner and destroying the gun. Guarding his prisoner he moved on alone into the town and in clearing six houses captured six prisoners one of whom was an officer. Pvt DiDonato's courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Joseph H. Herbert, 36598672, T Sgt, Co K, 317th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 26 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While establishing a defensive position near Wilwerwiltz, Luxembourg, on 26 January 1945, T Sgt Herbert's platoon was subjected to intense enemy machine gun fire from three sides. Ordering his men to withdraw to a more tenable position, T Sgt Herbert remained to cover the withdrawal by firing at the

enemy. While moving to the new offensive area two squads were delayed by a machine gun firing from the flank. T Sgt Herbert, disregarding the danger, advanced and captured the enemy gun crew after a fierce fire fight in which he also killed two enemy soldiers who were attempting to fire a rocket at his men. The aggressive leadership, courage, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by T Sgt Herbert exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Michigan.

James E. Hively, 15113356, S Sgt, Co E, 318th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Germany on 3 April 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the assault on Kassel, Germany, on 3 April 1945, S Sgt Hively, a rifle squad leader, accompanied another squad in clearing enemy from positions on a nearby hill. As they approached the hill withering enemy machine gun fire killed the squad leader and forced the others to take cover. S Sgt Hively, however, continued crawling toward the enemy and when but fifty yards from the objective rose to his feet and, despite the severe fire directed at him, assaulted the enemy position, killing two enemy soldiers and wounding two others. His prompt and courageous action inspired the rest of the squad to attack and in the ensuing fire fight to kill six and capture twelve enemy soldiers. S Sgt Hively's courage, aggressive leadership, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

James W. Johnson, 38463033, S Sgt, Co F, 318th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Germany on 2 April 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During an attack near Kassel, Germany, on 2 April 1945, the company in which S Sgt Johnson served as a squad leader was subjected to enemy machine gun fire from a house at the outskirts of the city. To destroy the position and permit the attack to continue S Sgt Johnson and his squad flanked the enemy position, but, on approaching from the rear, machine gun fire forced them to take cover. S Sgt Johnson, with utter disregard for his personal safety, rushed the house, firing as he ran. Eluding the intense fire directed at him he hurled two hand grenades into the building, killing four, wounding two, and forcing the rest of the enemy to surrender. S Sgt Johnson's courage, aggressiveness, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Marius H. Mills, 39929917, S Sgt (then Pfc), Co E, 318th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Germany on 3 April 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 3 April 1945, Pfc Mills, a rifle squad leader, led his squad in a flank attack against enemy machine gun positions which delayed the company advance near Kassel, Germany. Having been detected in its move the squad was fired on by machine gun and automatic weapons forcing it to take cover. S Sgt Mills and an automatic rifleman, disregarding the withering fire, advanced directly into the enemy position and by assault fire killed six of the enemy and relieved their squad for a continued attack in which twelve enemy soldiers were killed and thirty five captured. S Sgt Mills' courage, aggressiveness, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Utah.

Lewis W. Purdy, 35217818, Pvt, Co F, 318th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Germany on 2 April 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the course of an assault on Kassel, Germany, on 2 April 1945, Pvt Purdy and two companions were assigned the task of checking a wooden building to the flank of the company's route of advance. As they approached the building they were fired on from a second story window. Disregarding the intense fire Pvt Purdy assaulted the building, firing his rifle as he ran, and, when within five yards of the building, hurled a hand grenade through a window killing one and wounding another enemy machine gumner. Entering the building, he fought his way to the second floor, killing one and capturing three more of the enemy. His courageous aggressiveness, initiative, and devotion to duty eliminated a dangerous enemy strongpoint and exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

Walter L. Romero, 38676358, Cpl, AT Co, 317th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg during the period 24 - 26 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the attack on Kehmen, Luxembourg, during the period 24 - 26 December 1944, Cpl Romero, a platoon runner, distinguished himself by gallant action in carrying out his duties under intense enemy fire and severe weather conditions. On 24 December 1944, he guided his platoon through deep snows to their defensive positions despite the enemy fire. On 25 December 1944, he acted as an observer for an attached tank unit and while constantly under fire relayed fire missions to the tank commander. On 26 December 1944, when his platoon was subjected to devastating enemy machine gun fire he guided a friendly tank to a position from which it destroyed the enemy machine gun and permitted the rifle-

For gallantry in action in Germany on 10 April 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. In preparation for the attack into Erfurt, Germany, on 10 April 1945, Pfc Steadman and three other riflemen were given the mission of reconnoitering a crossroad in the company route of advance. As they approached the crossroad severe enemy fire from an automatic weapon forced them to take cover. In order to locate the hidden gun Pfc Steadman rose to his feet and advanced until fired at again by the enemy. Having located its position he crawled closer, again rose to his feet despite the intense fire and hurled a grenade, destroying the gun and crew. Pfc Steadman's aggressive courage, initiative, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Virginia.

Gaylord A. Towne, 37751391, Sgt, Co I, 318th Infantry, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Germany on 31 March 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 31 March 1945, the rifle company in which Sgt Towne served as squad leader was delayed in its attack on Nieder Mollrich, Germany, by intense mortar and automatic weapons fire from concealed positions within its sector. Sgt Towne voluntarily crawled over three hundred yards and despite the heavy concentration of mortar and artillery fire directed at him located and returned to give the enemy gun positions which were neutralized by artillery fire. Sgt Towne's courage, initiative, skill, and devotion to duty enabled the company to gain its objective and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kansas.

S Sgt Crain volunteered to drive his tank through intense enemy fire to the everturned tank in an attempt to rescue the men. Arriving at the scene of the accident it was found that rescue was impossible. S Sgt Crain's tank was hit by rocket fire, but was undamaged. He coelly turned his tank on the narrow icy road and drove to safety despite the increased fire aimed at his tank. The courage, initiative, and devotion to his comrades and to duty displayed by S Sgt Crain exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Heavy enemy machine gun fire forced the patrol to withdraw from the river bank leaving two wounded men behind. Lt Slotchiver, despite the intense enemy fire and the exposed terrain, descended to the men and carried one of them to safety and necessary medical aid. Lt Slotchiver's courage, initiative, and loyal devetion to his men and to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from South Carolina.

Norman Spradlin, 35644560, Cpl, 311th Tank Destroyer Battalion, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Germany on 17 March 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 17 March 1945, while supporting friendly infantry troops in capturing and destroying enemy pillboxes near Beurig, Germany, Cpl Spradlin, as gunner of a tank destroyer crew, volunteered to attempt the capture and destruction of a pillbox which delayed the infantry troops. Exposed to small arms and direct anti-tank fire the tank destroyer moved to within one hundred yards of the pillbox which it destroyed by firing into the embrasures. The destruction of this strongpoint by Cpl Spradlin and his comrades made possible the capture and destruction of three supporting pillboxes. Cpl Spradlin's courage, initiative, and devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

MILTON STILL, 01057270, 1st Lt, 702d Tank Battalion, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 7 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 7 January 1945, during a foray into enemy held territory near Goesdorf, Luxembourg, a tank in the platoon commanded by Lt Still overturned on an icy road trapping its occupants. Lt Still voluntarily led his tank through intense enemy fire to the overturned tank in an attempt to rescue the men. Arriving at the scene of the accident it was found that rescue was impossible. Lt Still's tank was hit by rocket fire, but was undamaged. He returned to friendly lines with the knowledge that everything possible had been attempted for the rescue of his men. The courage, initiative, and devotion to his men and to duty displayed by Lt Still exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.
