I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR (OAK LEAF CLUSTER): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded the following named personnel:

Warren L. March, 33185334, Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Sgt March, Wire Chief of a Communications Platoon, hand laid wire across muddy fields and impassable forest trails keeping abreast with the attacking troops despite heavy artillery and small arms fire. His actions afforded an uninterrupted means of communication, aiding considerably in the successful culmination of the assault. The bravery, resourcefulness, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Sgt March are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Floyd R. McConnell, 37630800, Tec 5, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Tec 5 McConnell, Lineman in a Communications Platoon, hand laid wire across muddy fields and impassable trails keeping abreast with the attacking troops despite heavy artillery and small arms fire. His actions afforded an uninterrupted means of communication, aiding considerably in the successful culmination of the assault. The bravery, resourcefulness, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Tec 5 McConnell are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Missouri.

James E. Sturgill, 33214384, Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Sgt Sturgill, Squad Leader in an Ammunition and Pioneer Platoon, led his men in hand carrying ammunition on many occasions to the attacking companies while under intense enemy fire, thus enabling the battalion to continue the attack and to seize the objective. The courage, leadership, and devotion to duty displayed by Sgt Sturgill exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Virginia.

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James A. Stutts, 34707387, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Pfc Stutts, a member of an Ammunition and Pioneer Platoon, hand laid wire across muddy fields and impassable forest trails keeping abreast with the attacking troops despite heavy artillery and small arms fire. His actions afforded an uninterrupted means of communication, aiding considerably in the successful culmination of the assault. The bravery, resourcefulness, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Stutts are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

Edward F. Herber, 38401180, Cpl, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France during the period 6 August 1944, to 30 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 6 August 1944, to 30 November 1944, Cpl Herber has distinguished himself in performing his duties as Field Wire Chief in a superior manner. His personal courage and constant service have contributed substantially to the efficient operation of the wire communications of the battalion he served. On several occasions, without regard for personal safety, he has exposed himself to raking enemy fire in installing and repairing wire communications. The bravery, leadership, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Cpl Herber are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Robert G. Lucas, 35434658, Tec 4, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 21 September 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 21 September 1944, Tec 4 Lucas, accompanying the Regimental Commander as a radio operator, encountered enemy action while visiting the battalion and became separated from his superior officer. Upon returning to the Regimental CP for instructions, he learned that the battalion had been isolated due to enemy activities. After giving all the information on the situation which he knew, Tec 4 Lucas volunteered to guide a supply train to the detached battalion. Under cover of darkness he successfully led the train to the battalion area by a wooded trail difficult to follow under ideal conditions. His skill, courage, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from West Virginia.

Robert J. Marks, 33197761, Sgt, Cav, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 5 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. The platoon in which Sgt Marks served was involved in a mounted reconnaissance mission on 5 December 1944, but was making slow progress due to enemy emplaced on the commanding terrain. In an effort to obtain observation and to determine locations of enemy artillery and lighter guns, Sgt Marks and a companion volunteered to proceed on foot. In spite of enemy observation and artillery and small arms fire they discovered an enemy observation post and emplacements. This information was

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reported to a friendly artillery observer who directed effective fire on the enemy installations. The courage, initiative, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Sgt Marks exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Washington, D. C.

George W. McCoy, 32193186, Pfc, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 5 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 5 January 1945, the gun position of the battery in which Pfc McCoy served was being shelled by enemy artillery. One round ignited powder charges on a tractor loaded with 155mm projectiles and powder charges. Pfc McCoy, together with a comrade, with utter disregard for his safety, immediately rushed from his shelter and succeeded in extinguishing the blaze thereby saving from possible destruction critical materiel and the lives of many comrades. The courage, determination, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Pfc McCoy are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Washington, D. C.

Warren E. Messer, 34176471, Pvt, CAG, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 29 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 29 December 1944, during shelling by enemy artillery, one round ignited a two and one half ton truck loaded with ammunition, endangering other materiel and the lives of personnel occupying an adjacent building. Pvt Messer, with utter disregard for his safety, immediately rushed from a place of safety and succeeded in extinguishing the blaze thereby saving from possible destruction critical ammunition and the lives of many comrades. The courage, determination, and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Messer are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from North Carolina.

HAL C. MITCHELL, 01298000, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Belgium on 25 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 25 December 1944, Lt Mitchell aided considerably in the successful culmination of an attack on the enemy by excellent tactical employment of the rifle platoon which he led. His unhesitating assault upon an enemy machine gun position that was delaying the battalion advance resulted in immediate destruction of the gun and its crew. Supporting tanks in the assault were temporarily retarded by two enemy Rocket Launcher men until Lt Mitchell personally advanced and killed them. His bravery, leadership, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

Carter C. Pierson, 35902110, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Pvt Pierson, Lineman in a Communications Platoon, hand laid wire across muddy fields and impassable forest trails keeping abreast with the attacking troops despite heavy artillery and small arms fire. His actions afforded an uninterrupted means of communication, aiding considerably in the successful culmination of the assault. The bravery, resourcefulness, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Pierson are

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with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Indiana.

John W. Quinn, 33335707, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Pfc Quinn, a member of an Ammunition and Pioneer Platoon, hand laid wire across muddy fields and impassable forest trails keeping abreast with the attacking troops despite heavy artillery and small arms fire. His actions afforded an uninterrupted means of communication, aiding considerably in the successful culmination of the assault. The bravery, resourcefulness, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Quinn are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Charles W. Ritzrow, 35312994, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Pfc Ritzrow, a member of an Ammunition and Pioneer Platoon, hand carried ammunition on many occasions to the attacking companies while under intense enemy fire, thus enabling the battalion to continue the attack and to seize the objective. The courage, initiative, and devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Ritzrow exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.


Robert L. Rogers, 35460105, Tec 5, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 13 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 13 December 1944, a truck containing TNT, mines, gasoline, and blasting caps, was set afire by shrapnel from enemy artillery fire. With utter disregard for his own safety and despite the continued shelling, Tec 5 Rogers, with the assistance of two comrades, succeeded in removing the flaming gasoline cans and explosives from the blazing truck. Accomplishing this, he employed fire extinguishers to smother the burning vehicle and then drove it to an area hidden from enemy observation. The courage, initiative, and devotion to duty displayed by Tec 5 Rogers exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

Eugene E. Sentkowski, 36288992, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 27 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 27 November 1944, during an attack on the enemy, Pfc Sentkowski, Lineman in a Communications Platoon, hand laid wire across muddy fields and impassable forest trails keeping abreast with the attacking troops despite heavy artillery and small arms fire. His actions afforded an uninterrupted means of communication, aiding considerably in the successful culmination of the assault. The bravery, resourcefulness, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Sentkowski are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

George M. Simpson, 38676113, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Belgium on 26 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 December 1944, Pvt Simpson, an acting squad leader, was shot through the forearm while engaged in an attack on the enemy. Despite his painful injury and the use of one arm to fire his rifle, he continued to successfully lead his squad, refusing to be evacuated until the objective of the company had been gained. His bravery, aggressiveness, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

Benjamin C. Stewart, 38209231, Tec 5, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 13 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 13 December 1944, a truck containing TNT, mines, gasoline, and blasting caps, was set afire by shrapnel from enemy artillery fire. With utter disregard for his own safety and despite the continued shelling, Tec 5 Stewart, with the assistance of two comrades, attempted to extinguish the fire. While removing flaming gasoline cans he sustained second degree burns and his clothing was set afire. After his comrades had smothered his burning clothing, and despite painful hand burns, Tec 5 Stewart continued removing the explosives and succeeded in extinguishing the blazes. The courage, initiative, and devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Kenneth J. Garner, 35359256, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For meritorious service in France and Luxembourg during the period 6 August 1944, to 15 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Indiana.
