VI. AWARD OF SILVER STAR, POSTHUMOUSLY: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following named personnel:

ROBERT J. THOMAS, JR, 01283339, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 28 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. In an attack upon the enemy on 28 November 1944, troops commanded by Lt Thomas were seriously delayed in advancing due to an intense concentration of artillery, mortar, and small arms fire. With complete disregard for his own safety, Lt Thomas organized an assault on the strongly held enemy outpost which had the tactical advantage of good observation of the attacking forces. Assuming a commanding position in front of his troops, Lt Thomas, by personal example, inspired the men to close with the enemy. Thirty enemy were killed or wounded when the outpost was successfully gained but this action also cost Lt Thomas his life. His leadership, bravery, and unselfish devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

VII. AMARD OF SILVER STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

Robert J. Martin, 35241730, Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 24 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 24 December 1944, while on duty at the company command post, Sgt Martin and five comrades, constituting the headquarters personnel, were assaulted on a flank by a German thrust supported by tanks and artillery fire. Realizing the gravity of the situation and the importance of the position held, the command group of six men were organized and instructed to withhold fire until the enemy was within seventy five yards. Although under direct 88mm fire, Sgt Martin moved from the shelter of buildings, into full view of the enemy, firing his rifle, and hurling hand granades which contributed greatly to the successful repulsion of the enemy assault. His courage, aggressiveness, and devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

John F. McLarney, Jr, 33004817, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Belgium on 26 December 1944, in connection with military oper ions against an enemy of the United States. Farticipating in an assault on enemy held woods on 26 December 1944, S Sgt McLarney, without hesitation, assumed command of a rifle company when the company commander was temporarily stunned by shell concussion. Leading the attack into the heavily defended

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woods, he personally silenced two machine gun positions by effectively firing his rifle at close range directly into the employments. After the woods had been cleared, S Sgt McLarney capably organized an adequate defense, retaining complete control of the situation until the company commander had sufficiently recovered to resume command. His courage, leadership, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Maryland.

Arthur L. Michael, 34882581, Pfc, Inf, army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 28 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 28 November 1944, Pfc Michael was serving as company runner when his commanding officer was injured by shrapnel. With full knowledge that all evacuation routes to the rear were under enemy observation and fire, Ifc Michael successfully carried his commanding officer across an open field to a place of safety despite the concentrated fire directed at them. His bravery, initiative, and unselfish devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Russell E. Mitchell, 37623759, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 22 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 22 December 1944, Pfc Mitchell, machine gun section leader, participated in a rifle company assault designed to seize and hold a strongly fortified enemy village. Prior to entry into the town, the company was subjected to a heavy concentration of machine gun fire originating from enemy positions on a hill to the left flank of the company. After directing the crew of a machine gun to concentrate continuous fire on the enemy until the assaulting platoons could consolidate their positions, the machine gunners firing the weapon were both wounded. With utter disregard for his own safety Pfc Mitchell advanced into the raking enemy fire to reach the gun and effectively fire it to rout the enemy. His bravery, determination, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Missouri.

Rexford G. Moon, Jr, 12170055, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Belgium on 26 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 December 1944, during the course of an infantry assault, Pvt Moon, an automatic rifleman, observed two enemy soldiers armed with a Rocket Launcher, concealed behind a hay-stack and covering a road within the sector of the advance. Rushing across the open field Pvt Moon reached the haystack and began circling it to the enemy position when he discovered that his rifle had become tightly wedged and would not fire. Undeterred, he rushed the enemy Rocket Launcher Team, brandishing his useless weapon, and threatened the soldiers into surrendering. The courage, aggressiveness, and devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Moon are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

James L. Nagle, 36560215, Tec 5, FA, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 5 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During an enemy artillery barrage, which was falling about the Division Artillery OP on 5 January 1945,

Tec 5 Nagle, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, voluntarily exposed himself to this fire by proceeding to examine the area into which the rounds were falling to assist in obtaining shell reports. This information was responsible for the neutralizing of the enemy battery and the act occurred when any interruption in the operation of the Division Artillery CP would have seriously hampered artillery support of the Division effort. The courage, initiative, and constant devotion to duty displayed by Tec 5 Nagle are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Michigan.

SAMUEL F. RESEIGNE, 0456257, Capt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 23 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 23 December 1944, in an infantry battalion assault on an enemy held town the company commander of the reserve rifle company became a convalty. Capt Reseigne was given command of the company and ordered to attack on the left flank of the battalion in order to relieve the pressure on the two assaulting companies. Organizing and orienting the men, he then personally led them forward in the attack. Immediately after his troops entered the outskirts of the town, Capt Reseigne was wounded by shrapnel from a direct fire weapon. Refusing to be evacuated, he continued under fierce enemy fire in advance of the assault. As occupation of the town could not be completed before dark, a strategic withdrawal was ordered. Only after he had arranged for this withdrawal did he permit his evacuation. The bravery, leadership, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Capt Reseigne exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

John W. Smolos, 33757152, Pfc, Armd, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 24 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During an engagement with the enemy on 24 December 1944, the tank in which Pfc Smolos was a member was strafed by enemy aircraft, wounding a comrade who was on the outside of the tank. Members of the crew, seeing the helpless condition of the injured soldier, began to dismount from the tank to assist him when enemy planes suddenly strafed again, inflicting serious injuries to Ffc Smolos. With atter disregard for his own safety and despite his wounds Pfc Smolos crawled to where his comrade lay and aided his movement to a place of safety. His courage, determination, and unselfish devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

John H. Thurman, 39722111, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 28 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 28 November 1944, Pfc Thurman, while on patrol duty, ambushed three enemy riflemen escorting twenty eight captured American soldiers to German headquarters. Armed with a .45 cal. pistol he killed one guard and engaged a second guard who had ineffectively fired at him point blank. In the ensuing struggle Pfc Thurman succeeded in killing his assailant while other members of the patrol were eliminating the third guard. He then led the freed prisoners back to the safety of their battalien. The courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Ifc Thurman are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Henry E. Zinn, 15078976, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 13 September 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 13 September 1944, heavy artillery fire made it necessary for the plateen in which S Sgt Zinn served to move their mortars to the rear of an adjoining company. At this time all but one of the wounded were evacuated. Lefusing to leave their injured comrade, S Sgt Zinn and another non-commissioned officer remained behind and later when fifteen of the enemy attempted to take the position the three men fired on them, killing three, wounding one, and criving the other eleven into friendly troops where they were annihilated. The courage, resourcefulness, and sincere devotion to luty displayed by S Sgt Zinn exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from West Virginia.

VIII. So much of Section IV, General Orders Number 56, this Headquarters, dated 14 October 1944, pertaining to the Award of the Purple Heart, as reads "Pvt Nunzic J. 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XI: The following units of the Division are cited for their extraordinary heroism, gallantry, determination and esprit de corps in overcoming hazardous and difficult conditions against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium and Luxembourg:

313TH FIELD ARTILLERY BATTALION: The 313th Field Artillery Battalion is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy on 12 - 21 September 1944.

The 313th Field Artillery Battalion supported the attack of the 317th Infantry Regiment in the crossing of the Moselle River the morning of 12 September 1944. At 1800 on that date the 313th Field Artillery Battalion crossed the Moselle to positions in vicinity of Bezaumont. That night and the following four days the forces that crossed the river were repeatedly attacked by tanks and infantry supported by artillery, mortars, and machine guns. These attacks were in all cases repulsed, on two occasions only after penetration of the firing positions of the 313th Field Artillery Battalion.

On 14 September 1944 the situation became critical. An attack by enemy infantry and tanks, supported by heavy concentrations of mortar and artillery was directed against our lines. This attack succeeded in penetrating deep into our positions.

Without hesitation, and based upon a sound plan, all men of the 313th Field Artillery Battalion, including Service Battery and Headquarters personnel, except the minimum necessary to serve the pieces, were deployed as infantry. Making use of bazookas, machine guns, carbines and their primary weapons the 313th Field Artillery Battalion from their defensive positions repulsed the attack without the loss of materiel. Two enemy tanks were destroyed in this action.

The 313th Field Artillery Battalion was the only artillery unit east of the Moselle River during the period 12 - 16 September 1944. During these four days the battery positions were repeatedly subjected to small arms, machine gun, mortar and artillery fire.

During the early morning hours of 16 September 1944 an attack, by tanks and infantry, directed principally against the left (North) of the front lines was repulsed by the infantry supported by 313th Field Artillery Battalion and other Artillery with the Division (from positions West of the Moselle), but only after the enemy had infiltrated to the rear of the 313th Field Artillery Battalion, and some infantry elements had been forced back across the river.

The 313th Field Artillery Battalion distinguished itself in battle by extraordinary heroism, exhibited such gallantry, determination, and esprit de corps as to set it apart and above units participating in the same engagement.

The magnificent courage, and devotion to duty displayed by all members of the 313th Field Artillery Battalion are a credit and inspiration to the armed forces of the United States.

2D BATTALION, 318TH INFANTRY: The Second Battalion, 318th Infantry, is cited for outstanding performance of duty during the period 25 to 28 December 1944. The Battalion was heavily engaged with the enemy in the vicinity of Ettelbruck, Luxembourg, when it was withdrawn from the front lines for the movement to the Bastogne, Belgium area. Its effective rifle fighting strength had been reduced to two hundred men. Attacking on Christmas Day after several days without rest, the Battalion began its assault of the enemy positions encircling Bastogne, Belgium. Throughout the next four days and three nights, the depleted Battalion battled its way in freezing temperature through the strongly held woods and villages separating our troops from the besieged forces in Bastogne. The stubborn resistance of the enemy and well dug in positions required constant use of the bayonet and hand grenade in their destruction. Suffering heavy casualties, constantly exposed to raking enemy machine gun and small arms fire from flanking positions, the Battalion fought on with an unrelenting determination that overcame all obstacles, routed the enemy and established contact with the forces within Bastogne. The aggressiveness of the heroic infantrymen of the Second Battalion, 318th Infantry, reflects the finest traditions of the Army of the United States.

COMPANY A. 317TH INFANTRY: Through aggressive leadership Company A, 317th Infantry, had pushed ahead of the rest of the Battalion in the drive toward the town of Han-sur-Nied 11 November 1944, and was in sight of the one remaining bridge spanning the Nied River in this sector. Through an inferno of small arms, machine gun, 20mm and 40mm AA, 155mm artillery and direct fire from Tiger tanks, the men of Company A stormed the bridge and secured a bridgehead on the East side of the Nied River. The bridgehead was maintained until other units of the Battalion crossed the bridge and joined the battle. The subsequent capture of Han-sur-Nied could only have been accomplished through the valiant actions of Company A in seizing the bridge and maintaining the bridgehead which permitted the speedy crossing of the Nied River by the remainder of the 317th Infantry and armored units operating in that vicinity.

The courageous spirit of all members of Company A which enabled them to crush all opposition in the attainment of their objective is commensurate with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

2D BATTALION, 319TH INFANTRY: On 22 December 1944; during the attack on the southern flank of the German bridgehead in Luxembourg, the 2d Battalion, 319th Infantry, was assigned the hazardous mission of making a night march through enemy held woods and attacking, seizing and holding the Heiderscheid hill mass. During the attack on 23 December 1944, the Battalion encountered very heavy enemy resistance in the form of armor, gun emplacements, and entrenched infantry overlooking the approaches to the town from which was maintained heavy artillery, mortar, machine gun, and small arms fire. After eight hours of bitter fighting the town was cleared and preparations for its defense were made. Before defense of the town could be fully organized, the enemy launched a counteratt

eleven tanks and two hundred infantrymen. This counterattack was completely routed, seven tanks knocked out, many of the enemy infantrymen killed or wounded and the remainder forced to withdraw. Again on 24 December 1944 at 0500, the enemy launched a second fierce counterattack with eight tanks and twenty-five halftracks carrying infantry. Due to the rapidity of the attack and the superiority of numbers and weapons, the enemy was steadily gaining a foothold. Being fully cognizant of all possibilities, the Battalion Commander called for artillery on his own position. Obsessed with the desire to close with the enemy, even though exposed to artillery fire, tank fire and automatic small arms fire, the Battalion, displaying the utmost in gallantry and "esprit de corps", fought valiantly until the enemy was again beaten off and forced to withdraw. The gallant conduct of this entire Battalion afforded a great tactical advantage in seizing and holding dominating terrain. During the entire action the Battalion had no sleep and but little rest and food. The superior tactical ability, resourcefulness and tenacity of purpose of this Battalion reflects great credit upon the military services.

COMPANY G. 318TH INFANTRY: Company G, 318th Infantry Regiment, is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy on 26 December 1944. The Company attacked the main enemy line of resistance south of Bastogne, Belgium. The assault was launched with a total Company strength of forty-two men. The men had neither slept nor rested for five days and nights. Attacking the village of Grand Rue, Belgium, through snow and freezing temperatures, the Company in bitter house to house fighting soon cleared the town, capturing thirty-five prisoners. Continuing the assault, the Company entered the strongly held woods north of Grand Rue. Fighting with grim determination, the indomitable riflemen charged through the intense fire, capturing many prisoners and equipment and clearing the woods of all enemy resistance. The accomplishments of these forty-two men fighting under extremely adverse conditions included the capture of one hundred and seventy-five prisoners, two 88mm and two AT guns, the killing and wounding of many enemy soldiers, the destruction of thirty machine guns, three ammunition trucks, and the capture of large stores of food, equipment, and ammunition. The fighting courage and heroic aggressiveness displayed by the intrepid infantrymen of Company G, 318th Infantry, reflects the finest traditions of the Army of the United States.

The outstanding example set by the soldiers of these units is an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.
