I. AV.RD OF SILVER STAR, POSTHUMOUSLY: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following named

Harold B. Bowers, 35223810, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 23 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 23 December 1944, after an assault on an enemy position near Ettelbruck, Luxembourg, two wounded men were left lying in a position exposed to enemy fire. Pfc Bowers, with a companion, voluntarily crawled to the men and after rendering first aid, dragged one of the men to safety. His courage, initiative, and constant devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

Sylvester M. Anderson, 36260240, T Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 24 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 24 December 1944, when it was discovered that the forward elements of a rifle battalion were isolated during the attack on Welscheid, Luxembourg, T Sgt Anderson and a compunion volunteered to infiltrate the enemy lines to lead the units to safety. Despite constant artillery and small arms fire, he and his comrade made contact and successfully returned to reunite the battalion without the loss of a single man. The courage, leadership, and zealous devotion to duty displayed by T Sgt Anderson exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Lawrence F. Christenson, 39232156, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 15 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 15 January 1945, the squad in which Pfc Christenson served as an automatic rifleman was ordered to flank a rifle company to repel an enemy threat. In this movement all but Pfc Christenson and another member of the squad became casualties due to heavy artillery fire. Undaunted, the two men assumed positions in a shell crater and effectively halted the enemy with flanking fire. Istimating t

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strength, Pfc Christenson delayed them while his comrade departed and returned with reinforcements, repulsing the enemy. His bravery, determination, and constant devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

MICHAEL DAMKOWITCH, JR, 01308483, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 24 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 24 December 1944, when it was discovered that the forward elements of a rifle battalion were isolated during the attack on Welscheid, Luxembourg, Lt Damkowitch and a companion volunteered to infiltrate the enemy lines to lead the units to safety. Despite constant artillery and small arms fire, he and his comrade made contact and successfully returned to reunite the battalion without the loss of a single man. The courage, leadership, and zealous devotion to duty displayed by Lt Damkowitch exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Harley C. Eaton, 20411815, Pfc, MD, army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 21 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the fighting in Burscheid, Luxembourg, on 21 January 1945, a wounded man was lying helplessly in an exposed position. Voluntarily, Pfc Eaton, an aid man, endeavored to evacuate the casualty. Twice driven back by the intensity of enemy fire, he reached the soldier on the third attempt and, although painfully wounded twice during this action, he succeeded in carrying the injured man to safety despite the constant heavy fire. He then returned to the platoon and administered first aid to all casualties before treating his own wounds. The bravery, initiative, and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Eaton exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Georgia.

John F. Flynn, 33304762, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 24 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During an enemy attack against Heiderscheid, Luxembourg, on 24 December 1944, S Sgt Flynn, in spite of the severe action, removed a fifty calibre machine gun from an exposed one quarter ton truck and put it into action in a house, destroying an enemy half track and killing enemy infantrymen. As ammunition supply became critical, he again left the cover of his position and supplied the embattled infantrymen with enough ammunition to repel the German attack. The courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Flynn are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Arturo Herrera, 38581794, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 15 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States, On 15 January 1945, the squad in which Pvt Herrera served as a rifleman was ordered to flank a rifle company to repel an enemy threat. In this movement all but Pvt Herrera and another member of the squad became casualties from heavy artillery fire. Undaunted, the two men assumed positions in a shell crater and effectively halted the cremy with flanking fire. Then with complete disregard for

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Pvt Herrera proceeded to cross a ravine despite intense fire directed at him and after procuring reinforcements returned to repulse the enemy. His bravery, determination, and constant devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Mexico.

ARTHUR G. HOLLAND, JR, 01325496, 2d Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 26 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. In the attack against Stavoll, France, on 26 November 1944, Lt Holland, forward observer for a cannon company, braved small arms and direct artillery fire to destroy in succession a house protecting enemy infantry and a road block delaying friendly troops. Although wounded, he continued with the forward elements and on one occasion he evacuated eight casualties to safety. Throughout the engagement he protected the infantry by directing effective cannon fire upon the enemy. The bravery, perseverance, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Lt Holland are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Salvador T. Lemos, 39277882, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 9 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Serving as a field artillory wire corporal on 9 November 1944, near St Jure, France, Pfc Lemos was painfully wounded in the face by a shell fragment, but refusing medical aid, he continued maintaining communication with forward limison. That night, learning of his superior officer's need for maps, Pfc Lemos, although having had only temporary first aid, secured the necessary maps and, because the limison group had moved in his absence, searched determinedly throughout the night to find and deliver the maps early the following morning. His courage, initiative, and constant devotion to Juty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Jerome F. Moorman, 37693519, Pvt, MD, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 23 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 23 December 1944, after an assault on an enemy position near Ettelbruck, Luxembourg, two wounled men were left lying in a position exposed to enemy fire. Pvt Moorman, with a companion, volunturily crawled to the men and after rendering first aid, dragged one of the men to safety. His courage, initiative, and constant devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Iowa.

George J. Murphy, 35386C14, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 26 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 December 1944, near Kehmen, Luxembourg, S Sgt Murphy, a battalion reconnaissance sergeant, observed an enemy flanking movement and of his own volition crawled forward to warn the commanders of the endangered companies. He then organized a group of soldiers and placed them to protect an exposed flank and assumed command of one rifle company whose commander had been evacuated. Refusing to return to his company, S Sgt Murphy, in spite of intense small arms and mortar fire, crawled forward to the Battalion OP to give the commander a clear picture of the situation. His courage, leadership, and constant devotion to duty are

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with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

Wallace J. Walter, 13100598; Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 1 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 1 November 1944, Sgt Walter, during the assault on Letricourt, France, became separated from the squad in which he served as an assistant squad leader. In searching for his unit in the heavy morning fog, he suddenly came upon eight Germans and after shooting a rifle grenade into their midst he assaulted, killing three and capturing the remaining five. While conducting his prisoners rearward Sgt Walter was painfully wounded but, undeterred, accomplished his mission before accepting medical aid. His courage, aggressiveness, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Pedro B. Yrigollen, 38442712, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 27 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. While advancing on Hosingen, Luxembourg, on 27 January 1945, Pfc Yrigollen, an assistant automatic rifleman, was wounded severely yet continued to fight and when isolated with a small group of men he assumed command and led them on to capture six prisoners and finally to withdraw taking all the wounded with him in an orderly manner. The courage, leadership, and zealous devotion to duty displayed by Pfc Yrigollen exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Mexico.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, lated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded the following named personnel:

Gaza E. Antalik, 32920893, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 28 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 28 November 1944, the battalion command post of which Pvt Antalik was the security guard was threatened by a counterattack by enemy forces who had infiltrated our lines. Pvt Antalik became immediately aware of the langerous situation, opened fire on the approaching enemy, killing one and driving the others from the vicinity. His courage, alertness, and unwavering devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Otto H. Barclay, 35386030, S Sgt, MD, Army of the United States. For meritoricus service in France during the period 19 August 1944, to 30 September 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

Joseph H. Beck, 33348520, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 10 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 10 November 1944, a strong enemy attack compelled the withdrawal of the company which S Sgt Beck, machine gun squad leader, was supporting. During the operation the forward rifle platoon was subjected to flanking fire from enemy machine guns. With utter disregard for his own safety, S Sgt Beck neutralized the threat to the platoon and covered the withdrawal of his own section by operating one machine gun himself. When assured that all the men were under cover, he carried the machine gun and assisted a wounded squad leader to safety. His leadership, courage, and sincere devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Charles O. Busalacchi, 36828981, Pvt, MD, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 18 and 19 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 18 and 19 January 1945, Pvt Busalacchi entered a town which had only been partially cleared of enemy and, at the risk of his own life, removed a badly wounded man from a tank which was being subjected to intense enemy fire. He later assisted in the removal of forty casualties from the same town over a road that was being heavily shelled. His courage and tireless devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

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Frank E. Butler, 36295167, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 26 December 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 December 1944, while Pvt Butler was serving as a messenger with an infantry rifle company, his platoon was temporarily delayed by intense fire from enemy machine guns. With total disregard for his own safety, Pvt Butler and a companion advanced some two hundred yards to an enemy observation post, opened fire, and killed, wounded, or captured all the enemy in that vicinity. The outstanding bravery, initiative, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Butler are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Leon Clifton, 35359270, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in France on 26 November 1944, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 26 November 1944, in the Bois de Valmont sector, the enemy directed heavy artillery and mortar fire on S Sgt Clifton and his machine gun section. Many casualties were suffered, and since there were no medical personnel present S Sgt Clifton, though wounded, alministered first aid to his men and evacuated all casualties before seeking medical treatment for himself. The courage and zealous devotion to duty displayed by S Sgt Clifton are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Indiana.

LAURENCE E. DEGNER, Oll71115, Capt, FA, Army of the United States. For meritorious service in France and Luxembourg during the period 7 August 1944, to 11 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Albert J. Gladish, 33570800, Pvt, MD, Army of the United States. For heroic achievement in Luxembourg on 21 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 21 January 1945, while serving as an aid man with the assaulting infantry platoon, Pvt Gladish discovered a wounded American soldier some seventy five yards below the position where he and his comrades were temporarily halted by heavy enemy artillery fire. Without regard for his own safety, Pvt Gladish went to the aid of the wounded man, evacuated him to a safe position, and administered medical attention. The outstanding bravery and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Pvt Gladish are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

OSWALD H. LINCK, 0326651, Maj, FA, Army of the United States. For heroic service in France and Luxembourg during the period 1 December 1944, to 25 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. During the period 1 December 1944, to 25 January 1945, Maj Linck distinguished himself in performing his duties as Battalion S-3 in a courageous manner. Under combat conditions he maintained a high standard of efficiency in the operation of the Fire Direction Center. His capable supervision was greatly responsible for the timely and accurate artillery fire delivered in support of advancing infantry units and in repulsing strong enemy attacks. The leadership, bravery, and sincere devotion to duty displayed by Maj Linck exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Maryland.

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William J. McConnell, 33323332, Tec 3, MD, Army of the United States. For meritorious service in France and Luxembourg during the period 20 August 1944, to 27 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

WALTER A. NICHOLS, 01304556, 1st Lt, Inf, Army of the United States. For meritorious service in France, Belgium, and Luxembourg during the period 6 August 1944, to 31 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Joseph A. Paduano, 31346292, Cpl, MD, Army of the United States. For meritorious service in France and Luxembourg during the period 25 November 1944, to 27 January 1945, in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Massachusetts.
