I. AWARD OF AIR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Air Medal previously awarded, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded the following named personnel:

Frederick Budge, 12095640, Tec 3, FA, Army of the United States. For meritorious achievement in Germany on 9 February 1945, while participating in aerial flights in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 9 February 1945, an infantry battalion was isolated across the unbridged Our River opposite Hoesdorf, Luxembourg. Tec 3 Budge volunteered to accompany a liaison pilot and assist in dropping desperately needed supplies to this isolated unit. The flight was extremely hazardous due to the low visibility over the Siegfried Line and the closeness of the enemy to the narrow occupied ground. Tec 3 Budge accompanied the pilot on two such flights despite heavy concentrations of machine gun, anti-aircraft, and small arms fire, and successfully delivered one hundred sixty pounds of ammunition, rations, signal equipment, and medical supplies to the beleagured unit.
