I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR, POSTHUMOUSLY: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following named Enlisted Man:

Paul U. Brinker, 35577904, Pfc, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 24 September 1944, when his machine gun position was attacked by an unknown number of the enemy. Although his position was isolated from the remainder of his unit he repulsed numerous enemy counterattacks and under heavy enemy small arms fire moved his machine gun singlehandly to a more advantageous position. He continued to protect the right flank of his company until killed by enemy machine gun fire. His superb bravery and zealous devotion to duty were commensurate with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Indiana.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR (MISSING IN ACTION): By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following named Enlisted Man (Missing in Action):

Bernard L. Broadway, 34311528, S Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallartry in action in France on 2 October 1944, when his platoon, upon capturing prisoners, was suddenly and heavily fired upon by an enemy machine gun, wounding the platoon leader and platoon sergeant. Sgt Broadway immediately assumed command and successfully routed the enemy. Although himself wounded in this action, his unfailing confidence inspired his men to carry on despite the intense hazards involved. His courageous leadership and bravery are commensurate with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from North Carolina.

III. AWARD OF SILVER STAR: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

Willie E. Gooch, 35484611, Sgt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 2 October 1944, when his platoon, upon capturing prisoners, was suddenly and heavily fired upon by an enemy machine gun, wounding the platoon leader and platoon sergeant. Although in hostile territory and in complete darkness, he assisted materially in routing the enemy and later successfully commanded the assault. His personal bravery and aggressive leadership were in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

HIRAM D. IVES, 6263687, Lt Col, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France during the period 17 - 19 September 1944, under intense enemy artillery barrage while the enemy counterattacked with tanks and Sec III GO #68 1 Nov: 44 contd.

infantry, Lt Col Ives, displaying valiant leadership, personally led his troops to the successful breaking up of the hostile attacking force, and saved the Division bridgehead. The superb courage and resourcefulness displayed by Lt Col Ives are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Maryland.

Russell G. Klages, 37406844, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. - For gallantry in action in France on 4 October 1944, while manning a light machine gun position, which had been suddenly attacked in the rear by the enemy. Despite an immediate demand to surrender under threat of enemy machine pistols, Pvt Klages assisted in turning the machine gun completely around and opened fire upon the enemy, effectively silencing them. Throughout the heavy fire fighting, Pvt Mages' coolness and courage enabled him to make his way back to his platoon which had withdrawn. His personal bravery and sincere devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Missouri.

MARION W. MEMBITT, 0535961, 2d Lt, Inf, Army of the United States."
For gallantry in action in France on 8 October 1944, while in command of an anti-tank company, Lt Merritt made his may forward to an enemy held house, and displaying cool courage and utter disregard for his personal safety, killed one enemy sniper and captured seven enemy riflement. His action provided for the uninterrupted advance of the attacking company and saved the lives of many men. Kingsley Y. Wong, 39926496, Pvt, Inf, Army of the United States. For gallantry in action in France on 4 October 1944, while manning a light machine gun position, was suddenly attacked in the rear by the enemy. Despite an immediate demand to surrender under the threat of enemy machine pistols, Pvt Wong assisted in turning the machine gun completely around and opened fire upon the enemy, effectively silencing them. Throughout the heavy fire fighting, Pvt Wong's coolness and courage enabled him to make his way back to his platoon which had withdrawn. His personal bravery and sincere devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Utah.
