

Mild and dry summer weather was encountered throughout the period covered by the above listed marches. Due to the dry weather all roads covered during marches were easily traversable, including secondary ones, though all were extremely dusty, particularly during the motor marches.



7. Battles.

a. "Mopping-up Operations in ST SUZANNE - SILLE-le-GUILLAUME".

From both S-2 and S-3 standpoint there is actually but little information to record concerning this operation. The enemy forces encountered consisted of only small, scattered and badly disorganized elements committed to rearguard actions. For this they depended almost entirely on harassing measures such as sniper fire, mined road blocks and booby traps. A small amount of enemy artillery was received which proved to be ineffective.

French civilians proved their happiness over the arrival of American forces by aiding us in every way possible. It is very likely that our casualties were greatly reduced due to the information provided by civilians on enemy activities and their whereabouts. In SILLE-le-GUILLAUME they were also instrumental in turning over to military authorities fifty tons of enemy wheat.


At 2000, 9 August CT 318 moved from the assembly area West of VAIGES to a final assembly area one-half mile Northeast of CHAMMES. While enroute to this area, sniper fire caused the first casualty from enemy action for the Combat Team. At 0900, 10 August the CT advanced on ST SUZANNE with the 1st Battalion leading, 3d Battalion following, and 2d Battalion in reserve. By 1018, 10 August information reached Headquarters that the 1st Battalion had occupied the town, having encountered little resistance.

The mission of taking SILLE-le-GUILLAUME, thirteen miles to the North, was assigned the CT immediately after the occupation of ST SUZANNE. At 1300, 10 August Col MC LAUGH issued orders for the CT to begin the advance on its next objective at 1500, with the 1st Battalion, plus one platoon 702d Tank Battalion (Separate), and one platoon 6101 TB Battalion (Towed), one platoon Cannon Company, and one platoon 633d AA Battalion, as advance guard; the main body, consisting of the remainder of the Combat Team, to follow at one thousand yards. During this march several road blocks were encountered, one of which was defended by an anti-tank gun (SP). Also, light enemy small arms fire, plus some artillery, was received from the high ground just North of VOUTRE. Our own artillery assisted in driving the enemy to the North, allowing the Regiment to proceed through VOUTRE without further opposition.

At 1200, 11 August 1944 the report reached Headquarters that SILLE-le-GUILLAUME had been captured and the occupation completed.

The high, rolling hills and thickly wooded sections of this area afforded excellent defensive opportunities had the enemy been able to take advantage of them. Fortunately though, he was not. Instead, due to his shortage in both men and equipment, maintaining contact with the enemy presented a more difficult problem than that of driving him from our assigned sector.

A total of 27 PWs were taken during this operation and were identified as being from the 9th Pz Div, 286th, 352d and 908th Inf Divs. This does



not mean that the full force, or even parts, of these divisions opposed the advance of CT 318, but does give further indication of the state of disorganization and scattering of forces of the enemy, brought about as a result of recent American victories in NORMANDY.

The Regiment suffered five casualties during the operation; one EM killed by sniper fire, three EM wounded by a mine, and one officer wounded by a booby trap.

Even though the enemy action in this engagement was comparatively slight, it did serve to show the close coordination existing within the Combat Team and with the next higher echelon. The smooth and efficient functioning of all elements of the command not only gave proof of the detailed and proper planning on the part of all concerned, but also caused a feeling of added confidence throughout the Team.

Col HARRY D. MC HUGH was Regimental commander for this engagement.

During this operation the Regiment was a part of XX Corps, U.S. Army.

b. "Battle of ARGENTAN".

318th Infantry participated in the battle of ARGENTAN for three days - 18th, 19th and 20th of August 1944. Here, for the first time, the Regiment came up against the determined resistance of a strong enemy force in well prepared defensive positions.

The capture of ARGENTAN and adjacent high ground to the North would complete the encirclement of German forces in the FALAISE-ARGENTAN trap, and this was the mission assigned to CT 318.

Enemy forces in the CT's sector were estimated at 2000-2500 men; at least 35 tanks (most of them Mark V Panthers, armed with 75mm long barrel gun); at least 11 105mm field howitzers; and 19 AA guns.

20-25 of the enemy's tanks covered all main roads leading into the town, and the others were in position just East and Northeast of it. Enemy troops were well dug in on the high ground Northeast of ARGENTAN and 20mm guns mounted on half-tracks were used for ground defenses. Barbed wire entanglements and mines indicated the state of preparedness of this position. The terrain added to the enemy's defenses being, for the most part, typical hedgerow country with several wide open spaces which permitted good fields of fire for tanks.

The Regiment went into position at 2210, 17 August preparatory for its attack on ARGENTAN the following morning. The Regimental CP was located near the town of UROU-sur-CRENNE, Southeast of ARGENTAN, throughout the engagement.

The original plan of attack was for the Regiment to attack due North, moving in column of Battalions, with the 1st Battalion leading. Once the high ground Northeast of the town was taken, the Regiment was to move Southwest and capture the town.

At 0700, 18 August 1944 the Regiment moved North across the lime departure. After A and B Companies were held up 100 yards North of the road by tanks, MG and rifle fire, C Company was committed on the 1st Battalion right flank. It, too, was held up and the Battalion withdrew South of the highway after it began receiving heavy artillery and tank fire from its left flank.

The next day the plan of attack was changed, with the 2d Battalion attacking Northwest toward the town under cover of a three battalion artillery concentration; the 3d Battalion moved due North. As on the first day, the attack made no progress.

On the third day of the operation the same general plan of attack as used the preceding day was followed, except that the 317th Infantry made the attack to the North and gave some assistance to our 2d Battalion attacking ARGENTAN. It was not known beforehand, but during the night 19-20 August the bulk of enemy forces in our sector had been withdrawn, leaving behind only small numbers for rearguard action. As a result of this withdrawal, our 2d Battalion was able to enter ARGENTAN by 1000, 20 August and clear it of all resistance by 1500 the same day. The town and adjacent high ground to the North was therupon outposted, thus completing the Regiment's assigned mission in this area.

The assistance of Company A, 60 TD Battalion and Company B, 702 Tank Battalion in neutralizing enemy tanks was of great importance in making the operation a success. However, had it not been for the concentration of four battalions of artillery, which kept up an almost constant barrage on the enemy's positions, our occupation of ARGENTAN would have been considerably delayed.

250 PWs were taken by 318th during the ARGENTAN engagement. These were identified as being from remnants of the following units: 33d Pz Regt, 116th Pz Div; 10th Pz Regt, 2d Pz Div; 10th SS Pz Regt, 10th SS Pz Div; 228th Signal Bn and 60th Pz Gr Regt, 116th Pz Div; 987th and 988th Inf and 276th Arty Regts, 276th Inf Div; 80th Light AAA Assault Bn (Air Force); 98th Light AAA Assault Bn (GAF); 16th Bicycle Bn (Air Force).

Except for a few short tank sorties the enemy made no counter-attacks during the operation, in spite of the fact that for the first two days the Regiment was unable to make any progress. After giving the retreat order, during night 19-20 August, the enemy withdrew to the Northeast in the direction of GRENNES, taking all tanks and other vehicles that were in running condition, and demolishing the rest.

As a result of the three days' battle the Regiment had a total of 416 casualties of whom 303 were wounded, 77 killed and 36 missing in action. Among those killed, both on the first day of action, were Major Norris, Regt'l S-2; and Lt Col Lindell, 1st Battalion Commander.

Col HARRY D. MC HUGH was Regimental Commander during the battle.

For this operation the Regiment was a part of XV Corps, U.S. Army.

c. "Move From ARGENTAN to BAR LE DUC".

During the period 21-31 August 1944 318th Infantry moved through

FRANCE with but few contacts with the enemy.

After having suffered the defeat of the ARGENTAN-FALAISE trap, where his losses in both men and equipment were tremendous, the enemy withdrew rather hastily to the East without being able to organize other than perfunctory rear-guard resistance.

The Regiment moved to ARGENTAN 20 August and on the following day from there to MEDAVY where it remained in a rest period until 25 August.

At 0500, 25 August 318th began its move to the Eastern part of FRANCE with a trip of 280 miles the first day, and went into a concentration area at COLLEMPIERRES, 5 miles Southwest of SENS at 0130, 26 August. Except for one mishap, which turned out not to be fatal, the first day's motor march through FRANCE was uneventful. Civilian populations of the many towns through which we passed turned out almost en masse to cheer us on our way and, in addition to their cheers and smiles of welcome, gifts of fruit, eggs, wine and cognac were heaped on everyone at all points. (Since the drinking of intoxicants while on the march was forbidden, these latter two items, in order not to offend the friendly French people, were always accepted and appropriately disposed of between towns.)

The one mishap encountered, and without mention of which a recording of this particular move would be incomplete, concerned a German half-track that had been salvaged from the ruins of ARGENTAN by the Regimental S-2. This vehicle had been taken from ARGENTAN to the rest area near MEDAVY where it had undergone a thorough grooming with the idea of relieving the S-2 section's transportation problems. Whether the grooming had been insufficient or the half-track belatedly envisioned 'derFuehrer's wrath if caught working for the Americans is not known; at any rate, after sailing along smoothly for a matter of fifty or sixty miles, it suddenly balked, refusing to budge further except for a few yards at a time. The half-track had failed to take into consideration, however, the perseverance of one Lt Henry Mimier, Assistant S-2 who, at this juncture, took over the half-track with the avowed purpose of making it transport its burden the remainder of the trip. The vehicle and crew were, of course, left far, far behind. After an absence of two days, during which the Regiment continued its Eastward march, serious doubt began to creep into the minds of those concerned as to the probability of ever seeing again either the half-track or its crew; but, late that same day, they hove into sight - without having suffered a single casualty. How they managed it remains a mystery which only Lt Mimier can, and won't explain. During a move on the very next night however, the poor half-track balked again and this time, had to be abandoned.

On the 27th and 28th of August 1944, the 318th crossed the SEINE, AUBE and MARNE RIVERS. The enemy had blown the bridges across all these Rivers ahead of the Regiment and elected to resist our crossing of the AUBE and MARNE RIVERS. Since no resistance was offered at the SEINE, crossing it presented no difficulties, as it proved to be fordable.

Only at the crossing of the AUBE and MARNE RIVERS did the enemy try to fight an organized delaying action, employing, at the AUBE, the 1016th Homeguard Battalion and elements of the 301st G-A Signal School Regiment. Caliber

of personnel of these units was very poor, being either too young or too old, and with insufficient training. In the MARNE RIVER and Canal crossing, the opposition was formed by the CT Chalons; elements of the 126th Inf Regt, 48th Inf Div; elements of the 759th Homeguard Inf Bn, and of the 301st Signal School Regt. This rearguard action was the more determined of the two, but was comparatively weak and without adequate support of artillery or other heavy weapons. No tanks at all were seen and, in only one instance were enemy planes sighted. While crossing the AUBE RIVER and Canal, four ME 109s flew over but did no damage, due to quick action of the AA gunners of the attached 633d AAA Bn.

At 2320, 28 August 318th closed into an area one mile North of LES GRANDES LOGES where it remained until 0915, 30 August. At 0830, 29 August two enemy planes flew over, bombing and strafing friendly installations adjacent to the Regimental CP.

While in this location reconnaissance parties of the Regiment discovered, and captured without resistance, huge quantities of enemy material and equipment, including gasoline, large numbers of German guns, food train, etc.

From LES GRANDES LOGES the 318th moved Southeast 42 miles to REVIGNY and from there to BAR LE DUC, where it arrived before midnight 31 August. Between REVIGNY and BAR LE DUC roads were mined and bridges blown - sure signs of a retreat wise and battle weary outfit. There was, however, little or no open resistance, due largely to the FFI having in many towns cleared our path of stragglers and snipers.

While making this trip across FRANCE the Regiment took a total of 86 PWs; in one instance, at REVIGNY, a group of 27 enemy soldiers gave up without resistance. For the entire period 5-31 August 1944 the Regiment took 363 PWs, 9 of which were officers. 52 enemy dead were buried.

During this period 5-31 August 1944 the Regiment suffered a total of 423 casualties, of which 290 were wounded, 100 killed and 33 missing in action.
