 - Roads were in excellent condition; weather warm and clear.
- Route of motor march: Magdala, Reichsautobahn, Gera. Delay in movement caused by heavy traffic of 4th Armored Div and elements of 80th Division.
- Purpose: To continue advance to the east and assemble the combat team in vicinity of Glauchau, Germany.

Length of motor march: approximately 25 miles.

- c. Departed from vicinity Gera, Germany at 1400 on 14 April 1945; arrived vicinity Glauchau, Germany, at 1600 on 14 April 1945.
 - Route of motor march: Gera, Reichsautobahn, Glauchau.
- a. Purpose: To move to assembly area and relieve 4th armored Division in zone.

b. Length of motor march: approximately 18 miles. c. Departed from vicinity of Glauchau, Germany, at 1300 on 16 April 1945; and

b. Length of motor march: approximately 13 miles.

- c. Departed from vicinity of Naisa, Germany at 1100 on 20 April 1945; and arrived vicinity of Bamberg, Germany at 1515 on 20 April 1945.
 - d. Weather warm and bright and sunny. Roads in very good shape.

e. Route of motor march: Naisa, Podeldorf, Bamberg.

a. Purpose: To relieve 7th Infin western sector of Murnburg and guard the installations in zone.

b. Length of motor march: approximately 43 miles.

c. Departed from vicinity of Bamberg, Germany, at 1430 on 23 April 1945; and arrived vicinity of Murnburg, Germany, at 1700 on 23 April 1945.

d. Weather: clear and warm; roads were in excellent condition.

- e. Route of motor march: Bamberg, Strullendorf, Hirschaid, Altendorf, Neuses, Forchheim, Kersbach, Baiersdorf, Erlangen, Tennenlobe, Buch, Nurnburg.
 - a. Purpose: Move to vicinity of Regensburg, Germany, and assemble combat team.

b. Length of motor march: approximately 55 miles.

c. Departed from Nurnberg, Germany at 1100 on 28 April 1945; and arrived in vicinity of Dungling, Germany, at 0500 on 29 April 1945.

d. Poads in fair shape, country roads dug up by heavy traffic and rains; weather

cloudy, rainy and cool.

- e. Route of motor march: Nurnburg, Altenfurt, Feucht, Ochenbruck, UnterMunberg, Cberferreiden, Postbauer, Neumarkt, Singenthal, Batzhausen, Krampenhofen, Parsberg, Beratzhausen, Endorf, Laaben, Edlhausen, Undorf, Nittneodorf, Gross, Regensburg, Bergweinting, Ober Traubling, Kofering, Phalmassing, Dunzling. Due to heavy traffic and a change in route the combat team was delayed.
 - Purpose: To better congregate the combat team in an assembly area.

Length of motor march: approximately 13 miles.

Departed from vicinity Dunzling, Germany, at 1630 on 29 April 1945; arrived in Altheim, Germany, at 1930 on 29 April 1945.

d. Roads in fair condition; reather cloudy and cool.

e. Route of motor march: Dunzling, Paring, Schierling, Mannsdorf, Buchhausen, UberNeufharn, Iffelkofen, Ergoldsbach, Unsbach, Essenbach, Altheim.

b. Length of motor morch: approximately 13 miles.

SECTION VII - Battles.

1. 1 April 1945. Melgerhausen, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

Our troops moved from Schwarzenborn to Melgershausen without meeting any active enemy resistance. Many enemy soldiers continued to surrender; coming onto roads and into towns. The enemy held a line south of Kassel and generally along the Fulda River north and east with infantry dug in covering approaches to likely crossings. The infantry was supported by assault guns, AAA bateries and some artillery. Our troops crossed the river at night with not too much resistance from small arms. However direct fire weapons continued to fire into our positions. Our troops were well across by the close of the period. 201 prisoners were processed; most of them service troops.

b. Friendly action:

Regtl CP, 3rd Bn and Supporting Units in Melgershausen. 2nd Bn CP in Lobenhausen; 1st Bn CP in Guxhagen. Mission of 319th CT to initiate movement upon receipt of transportation to assemby area and to attack northeast with objective the high ground vicinity C290-380. The 3rd Bn and I&R Platoon continued reconnaissaince vicinity of 3rd Bn area to clean out any German stragglers. I&R Platoon picked up 10 deserters. Received orders to move by motor to assembly area and to attack to the northeast. The CT moved out with 1st Bn initiating reconnaissance of route. The Regt closed in new assembly area with 1st and 2nd Bns at 1720 and prepared for crossing of the Fulda River and attack and seize Guxhagen. Bridge on Autobahn at Guxhagen found blown but with work by Engrs was made passable for foot troops and jeeps. 1st Bn crossed the Autobahn over the Fulda River, attacked, and seized Guxhagen by 1930. 2nd Bn forced crossing vicinity Korle and entered and occupied the town after some small arms resistance. Co C 305 Engr Bn constructed a ford making the river passible for TDs. Tks and supplies to the east side of the Fulad River. At 2215 3rd Bn ordered to move to Guxhagen. Bns reorganized and 1st Bn continued advance in direction of Dornhagen. Co B 81Cml Mortar Bn supported infantry by fire on directed targets. TD and Tank Cos supported infantry by fire. Co C 305 Engr Bn constructed ford and maintained crossing at blown bridge on Autobahn vicinity Guxhagen. Weapons used during the day's actions consisted of grenades, bazookas and 4.2 WP mortars.

1. 2 April 1945. Guxhagen, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

Our troops continued their attack to the north. The enemy infantry held strong points and road blocks in the vicinity of towns and on the roads but did not seem to have enough men to cover all of their front. In some places we went forward with no resistance; in other areas our troops met strong resistance. The enemy seemed to have little artillery or mortar but did use assault guns, tanks, and all types of antiaircraft guns as artillery. Only elements of the 61st

Regiment represented the regular infantry divisons in our sector. In CT Bohne were stragglers from all units. Home Guards, Engineer Replacements, a Convalescent Company and representatives of eight different AAA Units were among the 262 prisoners taken. By the end of the period the enemy was still resisting stubbornly in the towns they held. Enemy tanks could be heard in the vicinity of towns to the north of our positions.

b. Friendly action: Co B 81st Cml Bn attached. Regtl CP, 905 FA Bn, Co C 305 Med Bn, Co C 305 Engr Bn, Co C 702d Tk Bn, Co C 811 TD Bn in Guxhagen; 1st Bn CP in Dornhagen; 2nd and 3rd Bn CPs in Wallrode. Mission of the 319th CT to attack to the northeast and seize and occupy the high ground east of Kassel blocking retreating enemy elements from Kassel. 319th Inf continued to advance by crossing TDs and Tks at a ford located at H221889. 1st Bn sent two companies to seize Dorhagen and received small arms fire. The town was captured prior to 0800 and 1st Bn prepared to probed woods to the east of the town. 2nd Bn engaged in a fire fight on the outskirts of Albshausen. The town was taken and 2nd Bn moved on to advance on Wellerode. By 1230 the leading elements of Companies E and F had reached H263935 where they stopped momentarily to reorganize. 3rd Bn ordered to proceed to Wallrode and to continue on northeast through woods to Vollmarshausen. 1st Bn experienced trouble with an enemy road block consisting of Tanks and AT guns located vicinity H237962. Co C was able to maneuver around this road block and knock it out. Co B cleared Denahausen and Ditterhausen and Co A started to establish a road block north of road junction H243974. 2nd Bn entered Wellerode with only slight opposition and reported the town clear at 1600. 3rd Bn entered Vallmarshausen and met small arms fire from the northwest section of the town. The fighting in this town was slow and tedious work due to the size of the town. The fighting in this town necessitated the flushing out of the enemy. The Tanks and TDs continued to give fine support to the infantry. 905 FA Bn fired in support of the infantry and displaced forward to support the advance situation. Co C 305 Engr Bn continued to maintain bridge and ford thus enabling supply and evacuation to proceed in normal manner. 81st Cml Bn supported the infantry by firing HE and WP on call. Wire and roadio communications to Bns and supporting units. Weapons used during the day's action consisted of grenades, bazookas and 4.2 mortar.

1. 3 April 1945. Crumbach, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

The enemy continued to defend in the northern edges of the Vollmarshausen outskirts and generally through Crumbach and Waldau. The enemy resistance in these areas stiffened considerably, the enemy using tanks to support his infantry. In Vollmarshausen the enemy counterattacked with five tanks from the northwest but were beaten off. Our troops advanced through Crumbach, Ochshausen and Waldau with little resistance later in the period but could hear enemy tank movement to their front. At the end of the period the enemy had fallen back to Niederkaufungen, Oberkaufungem, Heiligenrode, Saundenhausen, and the east bank of the Fulda River north of Waldau. Enemy tanks

were still active to the north and northwest. 195 prioners passed through our cage. Only a few were from an infantry division. Most of them were AA personnel used as infantry

b. Friendly action:

No change in attachments. Regtl CP and supporting units moved to Crumbach; 1st Bn CP in Waldau; 2nd Bn CP, 3rd Bn CP in Vallmarshausen. 905 FA and 315 FA Bn CPs in Crumbach. Mission of 319th CT to continue attack to the northeast. 3rd Bn continued to mop up Vollmarshausen while 2nd Bn closed in the southern part of the town at 0200. 3rd Bn meeting mostly sniper opposition. Planned a coordinated attack of the three Bns at 1330 with 2nd Bn advancing on Ochshausen and 3rd Bn to occupy high ground the northeast of the town; 1st Bn to fire into Crumbach. 1st Bn asked permission to attack Crumbach prior to 1330 as there was evidence that the Germans were pul ling out of the town. Permission granted and 1st Bn attacked and seiz ed Crumbach by 1330 and sent one platoon of Co C to Berghaushausen. 1st Bn ordered to continue on to Waldau. 2nd Bn attacked Ochshausen with Co G holding the high ground to the north and Co E entering the town from the south. By 1430 2nd Bn moved Co F into Ochshausen to complete mopping up the town. 3rd Bn held Hill 233 (H280994) extending to the sourtheast. Co C swept airfield located vicinity H2399 capturing some prisoners and uncovering a huge airplane factory. 2nd Bn ordered to continue to the north and west and come in on the right of 1st Bn. 1st Bn ordered to continue to the north, swing west to the Fulda River and hold southeast position Kassel. This mission completed by 2nd Bn at 2145. 1st Bn experienced trouble in mopping up the airstrip. 3rd Bn continued to hold the high ground and set up a road block at crossroads C272010 consisting of a platoon reinforced with bazookas. 905 FA reinforced by fires of the 315th FA Bn continued to support the advance of the infantry. Co B 81st Cml Bn fired with effect on the towns in the path of the infantry. Co C 702 Tk Bn, Co C 811 TD Bn supported the infantry by seeking out enemy tanks and infantry and destroying them. Co C 305 Engr Bn maintained supply route. Weapons used during the day's operations consisted of 4.2 Cml mortars fired WP; Artillery fired WP; bazookas and grenades.

- 1. 4 April 1945. Crumbach, Germany.
- 2. Narrative account of action:

The enemy fought stubbornly for every foot of ground.

At least 15 enemy tanks were seen in the area to the east of Kassel.

in our zone of action. Fullmen from Kassel with no infantry training whatsoever were issued stalian rifles and ammunition and given a sector along the east bank of the Fulda River east of Kassel to defend. By the end of the period the enemy had fallen back from Saundershausen and our troops had cleared all of the area to the south bounded by the Autobahn and the Fulad River. The enemy held Niderkaufungen, Oberkaufungen, Heilingenrode, and the high ground north and east of these towns at the end of the period. 403 prisoners passed through our cage during the period.

SECTION VII - Battles (contd).

b. Friendly action: Co D 702 Tk Bn released from attachment. 2nd Bn CP in Saunderhausen; Co C 305 Med Bn CP in Crumbach; others no change. Mission of the 319th CT to continue advance to the northeast. Later received Division FO #36 directing our advance to the east. Co C ordered to by-pass resistance at airfield and join the Bn at Waldau and continue north with the Bn to clean out the area just south of the 2nd Bn to the river. Co B sent up along the east bank of the Fulda River to clean out that area. Div ordered the 319th Inf to contact elements of the 318th Inf who held the west side of the bridge at C241037. Co A and Co F advanced to contact elements of the 318th Inf and made contact. The 318th Inf left a force to secure the bridge. 2nd Bn ordered to seize Sanderhausen and completed this mission at 1230 meeting no opposition. 1st Bn continued to clean out it's sector. 3rd Bn continued to maintain a road block 150 yards southwest of the crossroads at C272010. The enemy shelled this cross orad periodically. 2nd and 3rd Bns received a counterattack by infantry and tanks but this was dispersed by accurately placed artillery fire. Received orders to assemble Bns upon relief by elements of 317th and 318th Inf. The 317th Inf effected relief of the 2nd Bn in Sanderhausen at 1905 and the 2nd Bn assembled at C263031. 1st Bn relieved by elements of 318th Inf and 1st Bn closed in assembly area C260007 at 1815. The Regt received the mission to advance to the eastfrom present positions. A Bn and SU CO meeting held and the plan of attack presented. 3rd Bn assembled vicinity CR 272010 preparatory to jumping off 050615B Apr 45. The 80th Recon Troop continued to reconnoiter the left flank of the Regt. Co D 702 Tk Bn cleaned out small pocket of enemy at the airfield. Co D 702 Tk Bn released from attachment at 1405 and reverted to their Bn. The Tks and TDs and artillery supported the advance of the infantry. Co C 305 Engr Bn checked roads in Regtl Zone.

1. 5 April 1945. Crumbach, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

The enemy consisting of elements from NCO Schol Eisenach and bolstered by elements of 593rd G Regt defended Heiligenrode, Niederkaufungen, Oberkaufungen, and Windhausen. NCO School Eisenach had three tanks and an unidentified tank unit had four tanks in support of the enemy infantry. Our attack with artillery and air support pushed the enemy north and northeast towars Uschlag, Escherode and Nieste. After our troops had taken Windhausen and held a roadblock on the road junction just north of the village, the enemy counterattacked with two tiger tanks and approximately fifty infantry. This attack was beaten off by our infantry and artillery. One emmy tank was knocked out and twelve enemy infantry killed. Reconnaissance at the end of the period north of Oberkaufungen and Heiligenrode encountered no enemy howiever enemy activity was heard in the vicinity of Nieste. 212 prisoners were taken during the period.

SECTION VII' - Battles (conta).

Friendly action: No change in attachments. Regtl CP and Supporting Units no change. 2nd Bn CP in Heilegenrode. 3rd Bn CP in Oberkaufungen. 1st Bn in Neiderkaugungen. Mission to continue advance to the east. This order rescinded by VOCG and the Bns ordered to hold up advance and be prepared to move on orders. 3rd Bn jumped off at 0615 to advance on Neiderkaufungen and Oberkaufungen. Co K moved against Neiderkaufungen from the northwest meeting armored opposition. Cos I and L moved against Oberkaufungen from the southwest meeting small ams fire from the town. Artillery placed on armor in Co K's section and TDs brought in position to fire in support of the infantry. Co K entered their town at 1210 and proceeded to mopp up. Cos I and L entered the town of Oberkaufungen at 1050 against small arms and automatic weapons. At 0820 the 2nd Bn had entered the town with Cos G and F from the west and Co E from the southeast. This maneuver bottled up the Germans in the town and 2nd Bn had captured Heiligenrode by 1230. 1st Bn was committed at 1205 to come on the north of 3rd Bn and advance to the east while 3rd Bn continued to mop up, clearing their towns by 1315. A large column of enemy personnel and vehicles moving toward Nieste and Excherode. was reported by Regt to higher Hqs and the Air Corps straffed it with good effect. The Regt had broken through the enemy and began b push to the east when ordered to hold up advance by Division and to be prepared to move by Motor to a new area. The Bns held positions for the night as follows: 3rd Bn in Oberkaufungen, 2nd Bn in Heiligienrode, 1st Bn (- Co B) in Neiderkaufungen and Co B at C307030. The 76th Div to relieve CT 319 prior to the CT 319 moving from this area. Enemy armor very active throughout the Regtl Sector. The Artillery supported the infantry in its advance by firing preparation and missions on call. The Tanks and TDs operated with the Infantry support by close-in fire.

1. 6 April 1945. Crumbach, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Our troops were help up in the positions they held pending relief and possible movement to a new sector. In the first part of the period our patrols searched out to the front in the right and left of our sector but lost contact with the enemy. No contact wad made with the enemy during the period. Only three rounds from approximately 75mm direct fire weapons fell in our area. 66 prisoners went through our cage. They consisted of stragglers, deserters and questionable civilians.

b. Friendly action:
Co B 81st Cml Bn detached and attached to 905 FA Bn. Mission to move forward assembly area. 2nd Bn moved from Hielegenrode and assembled in Ochshausen. 1st Bn having been completely relieved by elements of 76th Div assembled Co B in Niederkaufungen with the rest of the Bn. Regtl FO #55 was issued to all Bns and supporting units.covering motor movement to new assembly area vicinity Friedrichwerth.

SECTION VIT - Battles (conta).

1. 7 April 1945. Gotha, Germany.

Narrative account of friendly action: CT 319 CP, 3rd Bn CP and 805 FA Bn in Gotha. Other units on the road. Mission to assemble in Gotha and maintain law and order in the city. CT 319 moved by motor from vicinity Crumbach to forward assembly area vicinity Friedrichwerth. While enroute the CT was ordered to continue to the east and assemble the CT in Gotha. Due to the late arrival of the trucks to move the CT the 3rd Bn did not close in Gotha until 2130 and the 1st and 2nd Bns were still on the road. Wire communications to 3rd Bn and Division.

1. 8 April 1945. Gotha, Germany.

2. Narrative account of friendly action: The CT closed in Gotha by 0400. The Bns outposted the city with 1st Bn generally in the north sector; 2nd Bn in the west sector; 3rd Bn in the south sector. CT 319 relieved guards of the 3rd Bn 355th Inf on installations in the city. Relieved guard on PW Camp but the 4th Armd Div relieved our guards and accepted responsibility for the enclosure. The CT relieved 4th Armd elements on west and south sectors of Gotha as of 1400. One Section of Co C 811 TD Bn attached to 80th Recon Troop. The CT devoted time to rehabiliting and reequipping personnel. Wire communications to Bns and supporting units.

 9 April 1945. Gotha, Germany.
 Narrative account of friendly action: No change in mission. Continued to maintain law and order in Gotha and to rehabilitate and reequip personnel.

1. 10 April 1945. Gamstadt, Germany.

Narrative account of friendly action: Regtl CP and supporting units in Gamstadt. Fwd Regtl Cp, 1st and 2nd Bn CPs in Molstrof; 3rd Bn in Eischleben. Mission to move by foot and assemble CT in general area Gamstadt. CT 319 put on a 1-hour alert status during morning 10 April 1945 and received orders at 1155 to move to forward assembly area. All Bns ordered to move out. The 1st Bn movedout at 1240; 2nd Bn at 1335 and the 3rd Bn at 1335. 2nd Bn reported its area not clear of enemy necessitating deploying troops to enter Frienstadt. The Bns and CP closed in assembly area at 1815 with Regtl CP in Gamstadt; 1st Bn in Ermstadt; 2nd Bn in Frienstadt; and 3rd Bn in Kleinrettbach. CT 319 received the operations plan from Div giving C 319 the mission of advancing on Weimar from the south. Bn CO meeting held at Regtl CP and plans for complying with mission discussed. 1st and 2nd Bns ordered to move immediately to Molstrof; 3fd Bn to move to Eischleben. I&R Platoon reconnoitered route from Gamstadt to the Autobahn and reported it useable by foot troops and vehicles. The Bns closed in new forward assembly areas at 110015B April 1945. Wire and radio communications to Bns.

SECTION VII - Battles (contd).

- 11 April 1945. Eichelborn, Germany.
- Narrative account of action:
 - a. Enemy action:

There was no enemy action during the period 6-10 April 1945. The Regt was in reserve in Gotha during this period. On the 11th of April our troops moved up along the autobahn to positions south of Erfurt. Resistance from that point towards Weimar was spotty. Prisoners were taken in the woods east of Egstedt without a fight while in a woods along the autobahn the enemy set an ambush. Our troops attacked this point of resistance estimated at 75 to 80 enemy and killed or wounded half their number and took the remainder prisoner. By the end of the period our troops were south and southwest of Weimar and arrangements were being made to send an ultimatum to the city with the Burgermeister of Troistedt. Our troops took 173 prisoners during the period.

Friendly action: b.

No change in attachments. Regtl CP and 905 FA Bn CP in Eichelborn; 1st Bn CP in Passendorf; 2nd Bn CP in Troisted; 3rd Bn CP in Utzberg. Mission of 319th CT to advance on Weimar. 1st and 3rd Bns jumped off at 0900 with 3rd Bn on the left. 3rd Bn experienced some difficulty in moving due to the heavy traffic of the 4th Armd Div. 2nd Bn entered Shellroada at 1200 having met very slight resistance just west of the town. 2nd Bn ordered to move to Bechstadt-Wagn and started movement at 1045. By 1130 the traffic situation had cleared sufficiently to permit 3rd Bn to move in the attack on Rhoda at 1235. 1st Bn passed through towns of Klettbach and Hayn. The Regtl CP moved to Bechstedt Wagn. 2nd Bn ordered to follow 1st Bn axis of advance. 1st Bn continued to advance and assembled in the town of Possendorf. 2nd Bn moved by shuttle to the town of Troisted. 3rd Bn continued to the town of Utzberg. The Regtl CP and 905 FA Bn CP moved to Eichelborn. Regtl CO held a meeting with Bn COs at Troisted and discussed plans of attack on Weimar. It was decided to send the Burgomeister into the town with an ultimatum of surrender by 120830 April 1945 or the town would be subjected to devastating artillery fire. During the days operations, the tanks and TDs and artillery provided close support for the infantry. Radio communications to Bns during advance.

- 12 April 1945. Magdala, Germany.
- 2. Narrative account of action:

Enemy action:

Our ultimatum was sent into Weimar at daylight and had been accepted by the Lord Mayor by 0930. There came no hostile enemy troops in Weimar and our troops entered town at about 1030. The town was completely occupied by 1300. Two police officials of Weimar were sent to Jena to negotiate the surrender of the city. Jena would not accept the ultimatum. Our troops were ordered to take the town. The 1st Bn advancing on Jeana from the west ran into a defended enemy road block just west of Jena. The enemy used bazooka, small arms and automatic weapons. At the end of the period our troops were in position west of the town awaiting daylight to attack.

SECTION VII - Pattles (conta).

Friendly action: No change in attachments. Regtl CP and supporting units in Magdala. 1st Bn CP in Gottern; 2nd Bn CP in Grossschwabhausen; 3rd Bn CP in Neidersynderstedt. Mission of 319th CT to follow the 4th Armored Div. Preparations made for an attack on the city of Weimar. An ultimatum of surrender sent to the city to be answered in the affirmative by 0830 or the city would be subjected to attack. 3rd Bn was assembled in Ulla. 1st and 2nd Bns prepared to jump off in attack of the city and the 905 FA Bn reinforce by supporting fires on the town and the supporting fires of 4th Armd Div Arty prepared to support the attack. The city accepted the ultimatum and the city capitulated. 2nd Bn moved into Weimar and established law and order. 2nd Bn 317th Inf relieved 2nd Bn 319th Inf in the city of Weimar. CT 319 moved by motor to an assembly area vicinity southwest of Jena. 1st Bn moved out in attack on Jena and met some resistance. 1st Bn ran into a strongly held road block and in the fire fight that followed Capt Scott, Co B CO was killed. 1st Bn set up a perimeter defense at this point and prepared to attack the city at daylight. Wire and radio communications to Bns and supporting units.

1. 13 April 1945. West of Gera, Germany.

2. Narratice account of action:

Enemy action: At daylight our troops, 1st Bn from the west and the 2nd Bn from the south, advanced into the city of Jena. The 1st Bn met some resistance consisting of sniper fire and automatic weapons. The 2nd Bn entered the town unopposed. By 1300 the town was ours. Gera was the next objective. Friendly armor had passed on beyond the town but had not taken the town itself. Our troops closing in on the suberbs of Gera on the west side of the river received some fire from automatic weapons. The I&R halftrack and two tanks proceeded through the soutskirts to the railroad underpass. There our advance was held up by enemy infantry who had taken up positions south of the railroad embankment and in the houses. We sent an officer Prisoner of war accompanied by one of our officers under a white flag to negotiate the surrender of the city. When they reached the outskirts they were stopped by two enemy officers who refused to let them pass. Enemy planes flew over our sector and were fired upon byour ground troops. The period ended with no reported enemy activity.

b. Friendly action:
Recon Co 811 TD Bn attached. Regtl CP, supporting units and 3rd Bn CP at KO264(west of Gera). 1st and 2nd Bns enroute. 319th CT given mission of guarding bridges and moving to assembly area just west of Gera. 1st Bn patrolled to the flanks of the road block located at J676668 and prepared to continue attack on Jena at daylight. 2nd Bn ordered to clear woods southwest of Jena and attacked Jena from the south. The attack jumped off at 0730 with 1st Bn advancing against Jena from the west and 2nd Bn from the southwest through the woods. 1st Bn

met light resistance during their advance and by 1115 they entered the city. 1st Bn cleared Jena and reported bridges in the city out. 2nd Bn ordered to stop its advance and assemble troops vicinity J7360. 3rd Bn moved by motor to K0264, leaving guards at crossroads and at bridges The trucks from 3rd Bn moved to 2nd Bn and were still entoute at 2400. 1st Bn was not relieved at Jena until 2200 by elements of 317th Inf and the 1st Bn then moved by motor to Toppein and were still enroute at 2400. Recon Co 811 TD Bn made a reconnaissance in Regtl Zone. Co C 305 Engr Bn reconnoitered for crossing vicinity Jena. Weapons used during the days action consisted of bazookas and grenades.

- 1. 14 April 1945. Glauchau, Germany.
- 2. Narrative account of action:

Enemy action: The enemy still continued to resist stubbornly in defense of Gera despite our heavy shelling of the city proper. The wooded sector west of the city contained a road block at a road junction. There were nearly 100 enemy infantry with rifles and automatic weapons defending the wooded area in this sector north and south of the road running east into Gera. Few prisoners were taken by our troops. The majority of these enemy were either killed or wounded. The enemy used only rifles, automatic weapons and bazookas. There was no reported enemy artillery or martar fire. Gera was completely cleared by 1530. Over 400 prisoners were taken. Our troops started to move on after the armor and by 1900 our leading elements had closed into Glauchau. There was enemy resistance consisting of isolated groups of enemy snipes all through the zone. Some cities and villages contained no enemy what so ever while others fought tenaciously. Only our reconnaissance elements actually came in contact with the enemy by clearing the towns on both sides of the autobahn along our route. Friendly armor was actually in contact with the enemy in the cities in which we had assembled our troops by the close of the period.

Friendly action:
Attached was the rocket platoon of the 702nd Tk Bn. Regtl CP, 2nd Bn and supporting units vicinity Glauchau. 1st Bn CP vicinity Crummitschau; 3rd Bn vicinity Gera. Mission of 319th CT to continue advance to the east and assemble vicinity Glauchau. When ultimatum to surrender was refused by Gera Garrison the 3rd Bn prepared to attack the city. A preparation of artillery and tank rockets was fired on the town and 3rd Bn attacked Gera from the east. 2nd Bn ordered to clean out the woods west of Gera and to seize that part of Gera west & of the Weisse Elster stream. 2nd Bn met heavy resistance from dugin infantry in the woods. 2nd Bn directed artillery on these positions with good effect. 3rd Bn entered Gera against light resistance and by 1425 reported the city cleared. Elements of 1st Bn reinforced by tanks and TDs moved against an enemy threat reported by 315th FA Bn but found no enemy. 2nd Bn moved through enemy opposition and cleared its portion of Gera. Received orders to continue advance to the east and assemble vicinity Glauchau. 317th Inf to relieve 3rd Bn and to assume responsibility of Gera and vicinity. 319th CT moved 1st and 2nd Bn and supporting units to forward assembly area and 3rd Bn remained vicinity Gera. . 1st and 2nd Bns made prepareations to clear out Crimmitschau and Glau-

SECTION VII - Battles (conta).

1. 15 April 1945. Glauchau, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:
The enemy in Glauchau chose to fight for every inch of the city. They were armed with rifles, automatic weapons and bazookas. One particularly strong point surrendered 60 officers and 200 men after we issued them an ultimatum over a loudspeaker. The city was not officially reported cleared until the close of the period. Crimmitchau was not as stubbornly defended. It was also cleared by the end of the period. Meerane was occupied by our troops. 738 prisoners were gathered from these three cities; the majority of them coming from Glauchau. Many officers were reported taken.

Friendly action:
No change in attachments. 3rd Bn CP located in Meerane. No change in mission. 1st Bn pounded Crimmitschau with artillery during the early hours of the morning starting fires in several places. At 0740 2nd Bn moved out to clear Glauchau. At 0810 3rd Bn closed in Meerane and proceede d to clear the town meeting no opposition. Both 1st and 2nd Bn experienced considerable small arms fire and bazooka fire in clearing their towns. Civilians engaged in extensive sniper fire against our troops. 2nd Bn ran into a strong defensive position in the center of Glauchau and knocked it out only after considerable difficulty. TDs and Tks were fired at buildings at point blank range to knock out enemy strongpoints. By 1220 1st Bn had moved through their town but occasional sniping was still evident. Received Div FO #37 giving 319th Inf the mission of relieving the 4th Armd Div when they established bridgehead west of Chemnitz. 1st Bn 317th began relief of 1st Bn 319th at 1915. 2nd Bn cleared Glauchau at 2400. The weapons used during the day's action consisted of rockets, 105mm WP, grenades and bazookas.

- 1. 16 April 1945. Pleissa, Germany.
- 2. Narrative account of action:
 - a. Enemy action:

Our troops moved from Glauchau and vicinity and took over defensive positions held by the elements of the 4th Armored Division west of Chemnitz. One enemy plance flew over the area occupied by Co K of the 3rd Bn driving to within a hundred feet of the ground. Several prisoners were taken; mostly Volkstrum who walked in and gave themselves up. An ultimatum sent by Division was returned through our lines unopened with the following statement signed by a German Major in substance: "For the sake of principle the General refuses to accept letters of this kind". A foolish pride that is resulting in the loss of many lives and untold property destruction.

b. Friendly action:

Regtl CD and 2nd Bn in Pleissa; 1st Bn in Wustenbrand; 3rd Bn in Kandler. Mission to assemble troops vicinity Limbach and relieve 4th Armored Div in zone. 319th 1nf relieved by elements of 317th Inf and moved by motor to assembly area and effected relief in zone as of 1515. Wire and radio communications to all Bns and supporting units.

SECTION VII - Sattles (contd)

1. 17 April 1945. Pleisa, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

The only enemy activity observed during the period was a few scattered enemy in the suburbs of Chemnitz. A patrol from the I&R Platoon consisting of five men went through the enemy lines and the suburbs to theedge of the city itself and brought back two prisoners who were able to give us valuable information. A few planes flew over the zone but did not bomb or strafe.

b. Friendly action:

Mission to move to assembly area. 4th Armored Div began relief of 319th
Inf and 319th Inf began preparation to move by motor to assembly area east of Bamberg.
Relief was not completed 17 Apr 45 so the Regt made preparations to move 18 Apr 45.

1. 18 April 1945. Pleissa, Germany.

2. Narrative account of friendly action:
Co C 811 TD Bn and Co C 702 Tk Bn released from attachment. CPs enroute.

Mission of CT 319 to move to assembly area east of Bamberg. CT 319 was relieved 180035B Apr 145 by the 14th Armd Div and 76th Inf Div. Preparations made for motor march to assembly area east of Bamberg. Leading elements of CT 319 cleared Pleissa at 181500B Apr 145. The motor march involved a move of approximately 190 miles and and the combat team was still moving at 182400B Apr 145. No communications - radio silence.

1. 19 April 1945. Naisa, Germany.

2. Narrative account of friendly action:
Regtl CP in Naisa, 1st Bn in Lohndorf, 2nd Bn in Melkendorf, 3rd Bn in
Litzendorf, Co C 305 Engr Bn and Co C 305 Med Bn in Podeldorf, 905 FA Bn and 315
FA Bn in Schammelsdorf. Mission to move one Pn to Bamberg. CT 319 complted march
to new assembly area east of Bamberg and closed in area at 191030 Apr 15. The
order to send one Bn to Camberg to occupy the town was received and 2nd Bn alerted
to move and cleared Melkendorf at 191955B Apr 15 for Bamberg closing in the eastern
section of the city at 2215. The Bn reinforced by 80th Rcn Tp initiated reconnaissance and patrolled the city.

1. 20 April 1965. Bamberg, Germany.

2. Narrative account of friendly action:
CT 319 located in Bamberg. Mission to bivouac and occupy the city. The
remainder of the CT moved into Bamberg and immediately made plans to guard important installations, patrol the city, and in general maintain law and order. Units
rehabilitated and re-equipped personnel and devoted time to maintenace of equipment.

1. 23 April 1945. Nurnburg, Germany.
2. Narrative account of friendly action:
on 22 April 1945 319 CT (- 905 FA Bn) alerted for movement to Nurnburg
upon completion of relievement by 58th Armd FA Bn. Relief completed by 1250. On
23 April 1945 319 CT moved by motor to Nurnburg and relieved 7th Inf Regt 3d Div.
in the western section of the city. Relief completed at 1725. Guarded installations and rehabilitated and re-equipped personnel.

1. 25 April 1945. Nurnburg, Germany.

2. Narrative account of friendly action:
Mission of 319th Inf to be releived of responsibility of guarding installations and patrolling. 58th Armd FA Bn releived 319th Inf and completed at 1525. Received order to send a reconnaissance party to a forward assembly area northwest of Regensburg 26 April 1945.

1. 28-29 April 1945.

2. Narrative account of friendly action:
905 FA Bn and 315th FA Bn attached for movement. 319th CT moved out from
Nurnburg at 1200 for assembly area south of Regensberg. Due to the heavy traffic
and a change in route the CT was still on the road at 282400B April. CT 319 closed
in assembly area at 0940 with the CT CP in Dunzling Liaison was established with
CCA of the 13th Armored Div. The mission of the 319 CT to continue advance to the
southeast. The I&R of 319 CT reconnoitered routes to the south of assembly area.
Co C 811 TD Bn, Co C 702 Tk Bn and Rcn Co 811 TD Bn attached to CT 319 upon the
arrival of the CT in assembly area. 1st and 3rd Bn initiated movement to the south
by shuttle and by foot. Bns met very light resistance in the advance and captured
many prisoners and materials of war. 1st Bn closed in Ergoldsbach, 3rd Bn in Eissenbach, Co I in Altheim. 2nd Bn remained in Dunzling, Regtl CP moved to Altheim on
29 April 1945. Co C 305 Engr Bn maintained route of advances.

1. 30 April 1945. Greissenbach, Germany.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

The enemy, particularly SS troops, withdrew across the Isar River and Took up defensive positions defending likely crossing sights on the high ground south of the river. One enemy group of 10 SS soldiers attempting to infiltrate through our lines and to reach the south bank of the Isar was captured just west of Altheim. In the 1st Bn sector an enemy SP estimated 75mm fired into Weng and covered the road from Weng to Licktensee. When the 2nd Bn sent patrols to the river they received machine gun and rifle fire from enemy positions south of the Isar River. The 3rd Bn received some 120mm mortar fire in their zone. 383 prisoners were processed during the day.

b. Friendly action:

Regtl CP in Griessenbach, 1st Bn in Lichtensee, 2nd Bn in Worth and 3rd Bn no change. Mission to move to the Isar River, relieve elements of the13th Armd Div in sector, clear hostile forces north of the river in zone and determine hostile strength on south bank of river and cross if possible. 2nd Pn started to move south at 0720 and closed in Mettenbach at 1115. 1st and 2nd Bns moved out to effect a crossing of the Isar river. 1st Bn to cross vicinity Lichtensee and 2nd Bn to cross vicinity Worth. Both Bns met small arms fire as they moved down to bridges spanning the river. A SP gun covered 1st Bn area from high ground south of river. Co C 305 Engr Bn reconnoitered river for possible ferry but due to the swiftness of the current decided on assault boats. Two bridges had to be built to approach river. The Bns continued preparations for crossing with the 1st Bn to begin at 010h30B May h5. 905 FA Bn fired observed and harrassing fire on enemy dug in on south side of river. Radio to assault units and wire to Bns and supporting units. Co C 305 Engr Bn built bridges in 1st and 2nd Bn sectors.
