- 1. Oberfeulen to Heiderscheid, Luxembourg.
 - a. Purpose: To move CT into position to prepare defenses and make preparations for any attack.
 - b. Distance: Approximately 6 miles.
 - c. Departed from Oberfeulen, Luxembourg, at 1015 on 6 January 1945 and arrived in Heiderscheid, Luxembourg, on 6 January 1945 at 1035.
 - d. The roads were in good shape but very slippery due to snow storms during the past week.
 - e. Remarks: Route of motor march: Oberfeulen to Heiderscheid.
- 2. Heiderscheid to Goesdorf, Luxembourg.
 - a. Purpose: To move CT into defensive positions and if so ordered to plan for attack.
 - b. Distance: Approximately 8 miles.
 - c. Departed from Heiderscheid, Luxembourg, at 1500 on 18 January 1945 and arrived at 1545 on 18 January 1945.
 - d. The roads were in good shape but slippery in most places despite the efforts of the Engineers to sprinkle sand over the main roads.
 - e. Route of motor march: Heiderscheid, Heiderscheidergrund, Goesdorf. The route from Heiderscheid to Goesdorf simulated a miniature Burma Road.
- 3. Goesdorf to Bettendorf, Luxembourg.
 - a. Purpose: To move CT into defensive positions to relieve the 4th Inf Div of their positions.
 - b. Distance: Approximately 30 miles.
 - c. Departed from Goesdorf, Luxembourg, at 1230 on 26 January 1945 and arrived at Bettendorf, Luxembourg, at 1645 on 26 January 1945.
 - d. The roads were in good shape but slippery in most parts due to intense snow storms during the past week.
 - e. Route of motor march: Goesdorf, Heiderscheid, Feulen, Ettelbruck, Diekirch, Bettendorf, Ermsdorf, Medernach. The Regtl CP was located in towns of Bettendorf, Ermsdorf and Medernach due to 4th Div not receiving orders to move.

4. Bettendorf, Luxembourg to Gilsdorf, Luxembourg.
 - a. Purpose: To move CT into relief of the 4th Inf Div defensive positions.
 - b. Distance: Approximately 10 miles.
 - c. Departed from Bettendorf, Luxembourg, at 1300 on 27 January 1945 and arrived in Gilsdorf, Luxembourg, at 1345 on 27 January 1945.
 - d. The roads were in good shape but slipperty.
 - e. Route of motor march: Medernach, Ermsdorf, Bettendorf, Gilsdorf.
5. Gilsdorf, Luxembourg to Lintgen, Luxembourg.
 - a. Purpose: To move CT in to a rest area within Division boundary.
 - b. Distance: Approximately 8 miles.
 - c. Departed from Gilsdorf, Luxembourg, at 1400 on 29 January 1945 and arrived in Lintgen, Luxembourg, at 1500 on 29 January 1945.
 - d. The roads were in good shape but slippery in most parts.
 - e. Route of motor march: Gilsdorf, Schronndweiler, Cruchten, Moesdorf, Beringen, Rollingen, Lintgen.

1. Defense of the Regimental Bridgehead north of Ringel and Tadler on 1 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Friendly action:

No change in location of unit command posts or attached units. 1st Bn reinforced by Co K of 3rd Bn and 2 plats of Co A 610 TD Bn and 1 Plat of Co C 702 Tk Bn continued to hold positions running from the high ground north of Ringel (P763478) to (P764460) with attached Co K outposting Tadler. 3rd Bn minus Co K outposted Heiderscheidergrund (P725465) with 1 reinforced plat of Co L and outposted town of Heiderscheid (P738445). 2nd Bn remained in Regtl Reserve vicinity of Heiderscheid. Regtl CP remained in Oberfeulen. Wire and radio communications to Bns and Supporting Units. 905 FA Bn reinforced fired the following concentrations: (21 concentrations)

Co C 305th Engr Bn reinforced posted guards on obstacles in Regtl Zone.

1. No change in mission. 2 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Friendly action:

2nd Bn reinforced by Co K 3rd Bn, 2 plats of Co A 610 TD Bn and 1 Plat Co C 702 Tk Bn relieved 1st Bn on position. Relief completed at 1925 hours. 1st Bn closed in Heiderscheid at 2015 and became the Reserve Bn of the Regt. 3rd Bn continued to outpost Heiderscheid and outposted Heiderscheidergrund with a reinforced plat from Co L. 905 FA Bn reinforced fired harrassing and prepared fires. No special weapons used in Regtl Zone.

1. Preparations made for attack on Goesdor, Dahl and Nocher at 060400 Jan 45 - 5 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Friendly action:

Forward Regtl CP moved to Heiderscheid and were reinforced with Co D 702 Tk Bn. Mission of 319th Inf reinforced to cross Sure River at 060400A Jan 45 and attack north and seize Goesdorf, Dahl and Nocher and prepare ground gained for defense. In addition to normal attachments Co D 702 Tk Bn attached upon receipt of Div FO #25 giving the Regt the mission of crossing the Sure River and seizing Goesdorf, Dahl and Nocher and setting up defense of ground gained. 166th Engr Bn to build bridge vicinity P722466 for crossing. Regtl FO #40 issued to all Bns, attached and supporting units covering operations for 6 Jan 45. 2nd Bn relieved by 1st Bn 317th Inf. Relief effected at 2145 with the exception of one mortar plat

1. Action of 5 January 1945 contd.

2. Friendly action (contd)

whose relief was completed at 2400 and who closed with Bn in Heiderscheid at 060300 Jan 45. Bns prepared to follow Regtl FO #40. 166th Engr Bn worked on bridge which construction was hindered by heavy enemy artillery fire. Due to hostile artillery fire it was decided to build a Treadway instead of a Bailey Bridge. One plat from Co F 2nd Bn outposted the bridge site. 319th Inf Fwd CP closed in Heiderscheid at 2145. 905 FA Bn reinforced fired the following missions:

Co C 305 Engr Bn sanded roads on axis of advance.

1. Attack and capture of Goesdorf, Dahl and Nocher on 6 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

The 1st Bn 319th Inf moved under cover of darkness across the Sure River proceeded to capture enemy at daybreak. Very little resistance was encountered and several prisoners were taken. At the same time the 3rd Bn followed the 1st Bn's advance north along the boundary of the 80th and 26th US Division with the purpose of attacking the town of Dahl from the west. 3rd Bn ran into long range machine gun rifle fire and was compelled to take a different route. Proceeded according to plan and a number of prisoners were taken from the 987th and 988th Inf Regt of the 276th Volk Grenadier Division which was identified. 2nd Bn occupied Goesdorf. Darkness halted operations. 66 Prisoners were taken during the days operation.

b. Friendly action:

Mission of the 319th Inf to carry out orders in Div FO #25. The bridge, except for one section of Treadway, was completed at 060400 and was passable for foot troops. 3d Bn (reinforced Mine Plat 319th Inf), Co C (-1 plat) 702 Tk Bn, Co A (-1 plat) 610 TD Bn (SP) crossed Sure River at point P722466 at 060400A Jan 45, with foot elements and advanced on road to Buderscheid and cut cross-country to be in position to attack Dahl. Treadway bridge completed at 060430A. 1st Bn (reinforced 1 plat Co C 702 Tk Bn, 1 plat Co A 610 TD Bn (SP)) crossed behind 3rd Bn with foot elements at 060530A Jan 45. At 0650, 1st Bn prepared to enter Goesdorf without artillery preparation. At 0825 3rd Bn foot elements were 1000 yards SW of Dahl and receiving very heavy enemy artillery and long range small arms fire from the north. 3rd Bn forces were temporarily split by this fire but Lt Col Cheston maneuvered his forces and reunited them for an attack on Dahl. Tks and TDs held up at bridge crossing and just north of crossing by a knocked out German Tk blocking the road. Crossing heavily shelled. One TD 610 TD Bn set on fire by enemy artillery setting off its ammunition. This event further hindered movement of TDs and Tks. Co C 305 Engr Bn removed enemy Tank blocking road, sanded road and removed Td from road. Tks and TDs proceeded to respective Bns. At 0950 1st Bn had nearly all of Goesdorf. Occupation of Goesdorf by 1st Bn completed 061000A. Co C 702 Tk Bn joined 1st Bn in Goesdorf. 3rd Bn placed artillery concentration on Dahl and jumped off in the attack at 1230. Co I 3rd Bn swung NW of Dahl to block any threat from that direction, Cos K and L entered town and began mopping up. At 1335 Co D 702 Tk Bn ordered to Goesdorf to aid in policing town and to remain with 2nd Bn when 2nd Bn relieved 1st Bn. Remaining Tks and TDs to report to 1st Bn in Goesdorf. 3rd Bn had town of Dahl at

1. Action of 6 January 1945 contd.

2. Friendly action contd:

061400A and were regrouping to advance on Nocher at 061520A. Co C (-1 plat) 702 Tk Bn and Co A (-1 plat) 610 TDs on way to 3rd Bn at 061400A. 2nd Bn ordered at 061500A to move from Heiderscheid to Goesdorf. 3rd Bn with Tks and TDs jumped off at 1545 to attack Nocher. At 1615 3rd Bn took up positions just north of Dahl and prepared for possible counter-attack from the north and north west. Received heavy German artillery. 1st Bn moved to Dahl and closed in town at 1700. Fwd Regtl CP moved to Goesdorf and closed at 1730. 2nd Bn foot elements closed in Goesdorf at 1800. Regtl A-T Gun Plat attached to 2nd Bn. 2nd Bn outposted Goesdorf using A-T Gun Plat and Co D 702 Tk Bn in plan. 1st and 3rd Bn prepared defensive positions with 1st Bn protecting to the west and northeast of Dahl and 3rd Bn protecting from north and northwest of Dahl. 2nd Bn posted one plat of Co F at point P728469 to guard approach to bridge. I&R Plat to send patrol from 3rd Bn 319th Inf to contact 2nd Bn 104th Inf at Buder-scheid. At 2300 I&R Plat sent a patrol to guard bridge crossing. Bns held positions for the night. Wire and radio to Bns and supporting units. Radio supplemented wire due to heavy shelling. 905 FA reinforced fired the following missions:

Co C 305 Engr Bn cleared and sanded road Heiderscheid-Heiderscheidergrund-Goesdorf-Dahl. Hand grenades used in attack on towns.

1. Defense of the Regtl Bridgehead north of Goesdorf and Dahl on 7 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

During the morning of 7 Jan 45 the enemy effected a strong counter-attack by the Gros Deutschland Brigade and the 519th Panzer Tank Bn. The attack was made on the north and northwest of Dahl. At the same time a Bn of the 226th Inf Regt attacked Goesdorf from the east. Both attacks were repulsed with very heavy losses to the enemy. During the night our artillery had taken very heavy losses to the enemy. The area around Goesdorf was well prepared by the 319th Inf and although the enemy's attack was vigorous and strong they were repulsed with heavy losses. 8 tanks and assault guns were known to be destroyed and at least 2 more were believed to have been hit. The enemy withdrew their previous positions and harassed our positions with continued mortar and artillery fire. Considerable number of deserters were taken from the 1st Bn 226th Inf. Deserters had stated of the enemy counter-attack and enabled us to prepare for it. Morale of the 226th was not good however the morale of the Gros Deutschland must be considered very good. Although it is known that elements of the 987th and 988th Inf Regt were in the vicinity of Goesdorf they did not participate in the counter-attack, also it is known that at least one Bn of 212 Inf is in the vicinity of Goesdorf. Officer PWs from the Gros Deutschland stated that a large scale attack would be made in this vicinity by several division. Exact time and place was not determined. Terrain in this area is rolling with deep ravines and draws extending to the north, northeast west and south. All infantry attacks seemed to use these

1. Action of 7 January 1945.
2. Enemy action contd:

Prisoners stated that our artillery used its time fire with good effect. Maps and documents were sent to the Div PW point for study. Civilians in this sector generally remained in their cellars due to the heavy fighting. Statements from various officers and enlisted men that had contacted some of the civilians stated that they appeared to be very cooperative.

- b. Friendly action:

Mission of the 319th CT to hold present position. 2nd Bn sent Co E reinforced by Co D 702 Tk Bn to make a reconnaissance in force from Goesdorf to Bockholz and occupy the village. At 0941 Co E moved out and at 1000 ran into small arms fire at point P738486. Co E became engaged in a fire fight with a strong enemy force. Enemy used Tks in fire fight with Co E. Co E ordered to withdraw to original position in east sector of Goesdorf. PWs taken during the engagement stated that a force estimated as a Bn reinforced with medium tanks were preparing to attack and seize town of woods and draw to east of Goesdorf with devastating effect. By 1225 the enemy had withdrawn. 3rd Bn sent a strong patrol which swept woods to the west of Dahl and contacted the 104th Inf at Buderscheid. This patrol met no enemy. One Plat of TDs from 3rd Bn sector ordered to report to the 2nd Bn in Goesdorf for a Mezd security of the town. 317th Inf sent a Plat (reinforced) to guard the bridge crossing at (P722446). Co F road block at point P729469 consisted of a rifle plat plus two (2) bazookas and one AT Gun and was reinforced by one section of 80th Rcn Tr consisting of two M-8s, two 27MM guns, two 50 cal MGs, six 30 Cal MGs and two bazookas. Regtl I&R plat maintained contact with the 2nd Bn, 104th Inf 26th Div. 2nd Bn held a perimeter defense of Goesdorf and 1st and 3rd Bn outposted Dahl. Co C 305 Engr Bn continued to maintain roads; prepared road block of 14 AT mines at P730469. Holes dug but mines not actually emplaced. Mine field covered by small arms fire of Co F platoon.

1. No change in mission - defense of the Regtl Bridgehead - 8 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Friendly action:

Enemy barrage directed at Goesdorf and Dahl approximately 0530 and 1st Bn reported enemy infantry approaching their position from the draw to their northeast. 2nd Bn received enemy infantry attack from the draw to the east of Goesdorf simultaneously with attack against 1st Bn. At 0630 1st Bn received enemy infantry pressure from the northwest. 1st and 2nd Bns directed artillery fire on attack forces with good effect. 3rd Bn was attacked from the northwest with infantry and tanks. The attack was preceded by enemy artillery fire. 3rd Bn, 1st Bn reinforced by fires of Co A 610 TD Bn and Co C 702 Tk Bn placed deadly fire on the enemy infantry and tanks. 8 enemy tanks known to be knocked out and an unnumbered enemy dead littered the fields. 2nd Bn reinforced by the fires of Co D 702 Td Bn and the artillery fire of the 905 FA reinforced stopped the enemy and inflicted heavy casualties on enemy personnel. By 1200 the enemy limited his activity to artillery fire. 905 FA reinforced continued to harass enemy with their fire. 1 Plat Co A 610 TD Bn was detached from 3rd Bn to be attached to 2nd Bn at Goesdorf. Due to casualties sustained by Co A 610 TD Bn, 319th Inf requested an additional plat of TDs. 1 Plat of Co B 610 TD Bn (SP) reported to Goesdorf and was attached to 3rd Bn. 2 TDs returned from 3rd Bn for repair. Maj Gen Horace L. McBride commended 319th Inf Regt (Reinf) for its determination and skill in the defense of Goesdorf and Dahl. Bns held positions for the night.

Co C 305 Engr Bn mined to front of Co L position and maintained road net in Regtl Zone. Bazooka and grenades and illuminating mortars shells used during enemy counterattack.

1. Defense of the Regtl Bridgehead on 9 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

The 987th Inf Regt moved to the vicinity of Nocker on the night of 8 Jan. The 212th Inf Regt was in line to the east of Nocker and the 226th Inf Regt is in positions vicinity of Marselen. These regiments are not up to full strength and have received a lot of replacements. Nos pecial weapons have been noted. Some PWs stated that many of the enlisted men desire to be captured since their officers and NCOs deserted them during an attack. The enemy's use of natural defenses, such as rivers and ridges and rear slope defenses, is excellent. The enemy's use of mines had increased and demolition equipment had been found in knocked out tanks. Some armored vehicles were seen but none encountered. 31 PWs taken. Information obtained of units enabled the units opposing and also the location of certain installations in their rear. Civilians contacted were very cooperative.

- b. Friendly action:

All Bns and Tks and TDs continued to hold positions. An armored enemy attack devolped in the direction of Co E position at 1400 but did not make a penetration of this position. TDs alerted but enemy armor did not close to sufficient range for effective targets. Enemy armor withdrew to east and north-east. No further enemy demonstrations occurred during the day. Wire and radio to Bns and supporting units. 905 FA Bn reinforced fired the following missions:

Co C 305th Engr Bn cleared roads of snow and sanded road.

1. Defense of the Regtl Bridgehead on 10 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Enemy used occasional artillery, mortar and Nebelwerfer fire to harrass our positions. No other activity. 3 PWs taken.

- b. Friendly action:

Bns continued to hold positions and to patrol to the east and north. Contact patrols maintained contact with the 2nd Bn 104th Inf 26th Div. Wire communications maintained under extremely hazardous and difficult conditions. 905 FA reinforced fired the following missions:

Co C 305th Engr Bn continued to maintain road net in zone of action.

SECTION VII - Battles (contd).

1. Attack and capture of Bockholz on 11 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:
 - a. Enemy action:

The 179th Artillery Regt and 179th Engineer Co were identified. Strong enemy patrols dressed in white were encountered. Occasional artillery mortar and Nebelwerfer fire fell in our area. Bockholz taken with very little resistance by a surprised and confused enemy. Houses in Bockholz booby-trapped 65 PWs taken.

- b. Friendly action:

No change in location of unit command posts or attachments. At 110700 Co E 319th Inf moved out from position with the mission of seizing Bockholz and destroying the enemy there. Advance through the woods to the east of Goesdorf Co E approached Bockholz from the southwest. By 0855, Co E had reached the high ground to the southwest of Bockholz and had no close contact with the enemy. The assault swept woods to the southeast of Dahl meeting no opposition and took up position on the high ground to the northwest of Bockholz to block from the northeast. Co E sent a plat into Bockholz when enemy artillery let up, to seize town. Met little enemy resistance and by 1150 had occupied town with 1 plat and had captured 74 EM PWs and 1 Officer PW. Co E then outposted town with plat, sent 1 plat to comb south edge of woods from Bockholz to Goesdorf and the Sure River road east to Bockholz. Co K was released and returned to 3rd Bn. Co E found the town of Bockholz heavily mined and booby trapped. 1 squad from the 319th Inf Mine Plat aided Co E to remove mines and to lay mine-fields at P753487, P758489 and P758488. Co C 305 Engr Bn laid minefield at P756484 and installed trip flares covering Co E position. Co E sent a squad to cross road at P759489 and established a block there. A squad minus placed to guard minefield at P756484. 1 Plat Co E (-) in Bockholz reinf with 1 TD Co A 610 TD Bn and 1 Section from Co 702 Tk Bn outposted town. 2 plats Co E held high ground to southwest of the town. The plat of 80th Rcn moved from position at P730470 to position P752477 and set up road block. 1 plat Co F at P730470 returned to Co in Goesdorf. 1 AT Gun left at P730470. At 1912 Co E reported that an enemy patrol attempted to infiltrate into Bockholz but Co E drove them off. Bns held positions and patrolled to the north, northeast and west. A cable laid from Goesdorf to Dahl as wire proved inadequate due to heavy shelling. 905 FA Bn fired the following missions:

Co C 305 Engr Bn continued maintenance of roads and installed AT mines and trip flares.

1. Defense of the Regtl Bridgehead on 12 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Considerable increase in artillery, mortar and Nebelwerfer fire.

No other activity.

- b. Friendly action:

No change in mission. Co E continued to hold positions vicinity of Bockholz. 905 FA fired the following missions: 5 TOT, 5 Inf, 1 enemy OP, 5 Harrassing missions and 2 Registrations.

SECTION VII - Battles (contd).

1. Defense of the Regtl Bridgehead on 13 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

2 prisoners were taken. Prisoners stated that morale was very low due to shortage and inferior quality of food; that men were given whole tobacco leaves as tobacco factory was destroyed. Usual movement in enemy rear areas observed. Very little artillery fire fell in the area.

- b. Friendly action:

One platoon of Co B 619 TD Bn (SP) relieved and rejoined its company. No other change in location of units. Battalions maintained same positions. The enemy increased his shelling of Dahl, Goesdorf and Bockholz. Wire and radio communications to Battalions and supporting units.

1. Defense of the Regtl Bridgehead on 14 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Many heavy concentrations of enemy artillery fell in our area. Enemy tanks heard in Nocher. Very little activity otherwise. 6 prisoners captured.

- b. Friendly action:

Upon division order Co D 702 Tk Bn was released from 319th Inf and reverted to 702 Tk Bn control. The Battalions, reinforced by their support weapons, continued to hold and improve present positions. Battalions and Regiment conducted patrols to the north, northeast and east. Contact maintained with adjacent units. 905 FA Bn (reinforced) fired the following missions:

1. Defense of the Regimental Bridgehead on 16 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Ten (10) barrages of nebelwerfer fire fell east of Dahl early in the morning. An enemy patrol of six men was encountered and in the ensuing fire fight one American and three Germans were killed. Sixteen bombs were dropped in the vicinity of Tadler and Bockholz by six German two motored planes. Vicinity of Nocher, Dahl Goesdorf and Heiderscheid strafed and bombed by what was believed to be American P-47's. Intermittent artillery fire fell throughout the day.

- b. Friendly action:

Battalions continued to improve present positions. Preparations made to comply with Division Field Order #26 which had the mission for the 319th Inf to attack and seize Nocher and the high ground vicinity Masseler. 905 FA (reinforced) fired the following missions:

1. Preparations of attack on 18 Jan 45 made. Defended Regtl Bridgehead on 17 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Considerable activity in Nocher. Tanks, men and vehicles moving about. Slight patrol activity in our sector. 2 mortar barrages reported in vicinity of Dahl. 2 prisoners taken.

SECTION VII - Battles (contd)

1. Action of 17 January 1945, continued.

a. Friendly action:

Preparations made for 3rd Battalion's attack on Nocher. Battalions and supporting units held present positions. 3rd Bn 317th Inf moved into Goesdorf under cover of darkness and organized a perimeter defense of the town. Regiment and Battalions patrolled vigorously to the north, northeast and east to determine enemy dispositions. 905 FA fired the following missions:

6 infantry targets 4 harrassing missions

2 registrations 12 preparations on counterbattery.

Co C 305 Engr Bn continued to maintain roads and the Mine Platoon 319th Inf cleared the Regtl zone of mines.

1. Attack and capture of Nocher, Luxembourg, on 18 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

Interrogation of prisoners indicated the presence of the 212th Regt, 79th German Division and the 179th FA Regt on our front. This regiment relieved the 986th and 987th Regts on the night of 13-14 January 1945. The enemy continued to mine all roads and towns with AT and AP mines as they were forced back. Heavy concentrations of heavy caliber artillery fell in our sector throughout the day. No civilians encountered. 178 prisoners taken.

b. Friendly action:

80th Rcn Troop and one plat of Co D 702 Tk Bn attached to 319th Inf. Mission of 319 CT to attack and seize Nocher and the high ground vicinity Masseler. 3rd Bn reinforced with Co G 2nd Bn; 1 plat Co C 702 Tk Bn; 1 plat Co A 610 TD Bn; 1 plat Co C 305 Engr Bn. 1st Bn reinforced with 1 plat Co A 610 TD Bn; 1 plat Co C 702 Tk Bn; Mine Plat 319th Inf. 2nd Bn (- G Co) reinforced with 1 plat Co A 610 TD Bn; 1 plat Co C 702 Tk Bn. 3rd Bn jumped off in the attack at 180700 Jan 45 on Nocher minus any artillery preparation to effect the element of surprise. 1st and 2nd Bns remained in position. The foot troops of 3rd Bn advanced on Nocher in two columns. Co K had the mission of blocking any hostile approaches to the town from the west and northwest at point P730512, I and L Cos with Co G in reserve approached the town from the southeast with the mission of seizing and occupying Nocher. At 0740, I and L Cos reached the southeast edge of town and Co K advanced to the northeast edge of woods at P730510 meeting no opposition. Enemy artillery opened up on Dahl with a heavy concentration. The Tks and TDs of 3rd Bn had been ordered to joint 3rd Bn at 0740. 2nd Bn ordered to leave Co E in position at Bockholz to support by fire 1st Bn when 1st Bn moved out; the remainder of 2nd Bn to move to Dahl. At 0820, 3rd Bn minus Co K occupied Nocher and received heavy enemy shelling. Co K held up by enemy in dug-in positions at P730512. The CO of Co K directed artillery fire on dug-in enemy. The movement of the Tks and TDs was hampered by direct hostile fire, enemy mine fields and large snow drifts. At 0915 1 Plat of TDs had reached Nocher. By 0935 2nd Bn (-) had completed move to Dahl; Co K prepared to move against enemy positions. 1 Bn of 317th Inf vicinity Ringel prepared to place fire on high ground just west of Masseler commencing 1115 to support the attack of the 1st Bn (reinforced) on this high ground. 1st Bn foot troops jumped off with Cos A and C as the assault companies and Co B in reserve. Progress was slow due to deep snow and poor visibility. At 1215 3rd Bn had taken the following positions: Co L protecting Nocher from the north and northeast, Co I from the east and south, Co G from the west and north. Enemy shelled all positions. At 1225 leading elements of 1st Bn at P730495; heavy hostile shelling in Dahl. At 1410

Co C located at P758498 and receiving heavy small arms fire from draw to the north; Co A at P758496 receiving small arms fire from the east and Co B located at P750496. 1 plat of Co I sent out to contact Co K and made contact but were cut off by enemy infiltration. The Plat of Co I joined Co K. At 1500 Co K was about 300 yards east and southeast of road junction P729512 and had a stiff fight with the enemy. 3rd Bn shifted positions with Co L protecting from north, Co I from the east, Co G (-1 plat) from the west. 1 plat Co G tied in with Co K. Co K held position. Ammunition for Co K hand carried - a half track used to get additional ammunition up to TDs and Tks. 1st Bn ordered back to Dahl and by 1930 the Bn had occupied positions with Co A defending from the east, Co B from the north and Co C from the south. 2nd Bn outposted Dahl defending from the outskirts. The 80th Recon Troop patrolled between Dahl and Nocher on the flanks by dismounted patrols. Contact maintained with 104th Inf and with the 317th Inf. Bns maintained positions for the night. The enemy continued to shell Nocher and Dahl. Wire and radio communications were maintained but interrupted by heavy hostile shelling. 905 FA (reinforced) fired the following missions:

Co C 305th Engr Bn reinforced by the Mine Plat 319th Inf swept roads of mines, cleared roads of snow. Grenades, bazookas used in cleaning up Nocher.

1. Defense of the Regimental sector on 19 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Enemy continued to withdraw to the north and east covering their withdrawal with strong rear guard action. Several concentrations of heavy caliber artillery fell in vicinity of Dahl and Nocher. Very little tactical information of value had been obtained from the prisoners.

- b. Friendly action:

No change in location of unit command posts. Mission of 519th Inf to hold and improve present positions. At 190837A January 45 Co K continued attack against enemy held positions and by 1030 occupied all buildings east of the Road Junction P729512. They found one building heavily booby trapped. Regt received word from Division not to push on the north or east but to hold and improve present positions. One plat from Co K made contact between Co K and 3rd Bn in Nocher. Trip flares were installed vicinity Nocher. Co G released by 3rd Bn and returned to 2nd Bn in Dahl closing at 1900. 1st Bn continued to hold present positions. 905 FA Bn fired the following missions:

2. Narrative account of friendly action:

Battalions continued to hold positions. Trip flares installed vicinity Nocher by 3rd Bn with assistance of Co D 305 Engr Bn. At 1028 Co K had fire fight with approximately 30 enemy but the enemy withdrew. Contact maintained with 317th Inf on our right and with 28th Cav on left through attached 80th Rcn Troop. Battalions conducted partrolling to the north, east and west of positions. 905 FA Bn fired the following missions:

1. Continuation of advance to the north on 21 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of friendly action:

Received Division FO #27 with mission to continue attack to the north on Division order. Co F sent a plat reinforced by 2 squads of Engrs to sweep woods and draws of any enemy and reported mines. The plat advanced through the woods meeting no opposition and removed 12 AP mines. 2nd Bn ordered remainder of Co F to join the platoon. The terrain and deep snow hindered the assembling of the company. After assembling the company attempted to gain the high ground just east of Nocher but were held up by direct fire from the east and southeast. 1st Bn sent a patrol to make a reconnaissance in area P7549 to P7749. Patrol ran into enemy dug-in positions and the patrol was withdrawn to the battalion. Co F set up a perimeter defense and maintained position for the night. Regt and Bns conducted night patrols to the northeast northwest and east. Co C 317th Inf was ordered to relieve Co E 319th Inf vicinity Bockholz. Relief completed at 2155. Co E marched to Dahl and closed in at 2350. 905 FA Bn fired the following missions:

80th Rcn troop (reinforced by 1 plat of Co D 702 Tk Bn) relieved of attachment at 1800 and remained in Goesdorf.

1. Attack and capture of Masseler, Luxembourg, on 22 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

Enemy continued to withdraw, covering his withdrawal with occasional artillery and mortar fire and mines.

- b. Friendly action:

Co F advanced from position to the high ground and dug in positions to protect from the north and east. No opposition met during this advance. Co F maintained contact with the right flank of the 3rd Bn by patrol. Co G moved 1 plat to position from which they could cover the right flank of Co F by fire and also protect from the north and east. 1st Bn sent one plat from Co A to patrol to the high ground vicinity Masseler. The patrol met no opposition but progress was slow due to deep snow drifts. At 1155, 80th Rcn troop cleared Goesdorf. 1st Bn patrol reported no enemy action in Masseler. 1st Bn sent Co B to occupy Masseler and at 1700 Co B closed in town. 2nd Bn order to occupy high ground P765500 and P748488. 1st Plat C G reinforced with 1 section HMG outposted high ground and was accompanied by 1 plat Co E and extended west to tie in with remainder of 2nd Bn in outposted Dahl.

1. Friendly action 22 January 1945 continued.

Remainder of 1st Bn moved to Masseler and occupied the town and high ground to the west maintaining contact with Co E plat by patrol. 3rd Bn ordered Co K back to Dahl for rehabilitation. 1 plat Co I occupied former Co K position and the remainder of 3rd Bn occupied Nocher. Co C 317th Inf relieved from occupation of Bockholz at 1800 to revert to Bn control. Bns held positions for the night and patrolled to the north, northeast and east. Division FO #28 received and 319th Inf prepared to carry out mission of clearing enemy from south of Wiltz River in Regtl zone and patrol north of Wiltz River to determine enemy dispositions. 905 FA Bn fired the following missions:

Co C 305 Engr reinforced with Mine Plat 319th Inf swept roads of snow and mines.

1. Attack and capture of Kautenbach, Merkols and Alscheid, Luxembourg, on 23 January 1945.

2. Narrative account of action:

a. Enemy action:

Enemy was driven from Kautenbach which he defended fanatically. Many mines were encountered in the town. 2 prisoners were taken.

b. Friendly action:

Mission of 319th Inf to seize and occupy Kautenbach, Merkols and Alscheid. At 1230 Co F reinforced 1 plat Co G (reinforced) moved against Kautenbach. At 1220 3rd Bn moved one Co reinforced against Merkols. At 1410 Co F moved into Kautenbach meeting heavy fire from houses on the high ground to the north of the town. Co E moved to position on high ground P7451 and Co G moved to Nocher. At 1240 Co L (reinforced) advanced against Merkols. Co C moved to Dahl and Co A occupied positions on high-ground P765499. Co L crossed Wiltz River over ice and by 1600 the leading elements approached Merkols; met no enemy personnel but did run into mine fields. Engrs unable to build class 40 bridge at P741522, but did build a class 8 bridge. At 1805 Co L had secured Merkols and moved 1 plat of Co L to high ground. At 1835 Co F held lower part of Kautenbach but the enemy held the high part of the town and placed heavy automatic and rifle fire on Co F. Two plats of Co F tried to maneuver around west flank of the enemy but met heavy fire. Co F ordered to hold up for the night and resume attack early 24 Jan 45. Co L consolidated positions. Engrs reinforced swept roads of snow drifts and checked for mines. Radio reception was poor due to interception by hills. 905 FA Bn fired the following missions:

Co C 305 Engr Bn reinforced by Mine Plat 319th Inf and 1 plat 166th Engr Bn swept roads of snow and mines. Started to build Class 3 bridge at Merkols. Bazookas and grenades used throughout the advance.

SECTION VII - Battles (contd).

1. Seized and occupied Kautenbach and Alscheid, Luxembourg, on 24 January.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Enemy action:

The enemy was driven from Kautenbach which he defended fanatically. The 2nd Bn 987th Regt 276th VGD identified in Kautenbach. Railroad tunnels in vicinity used to shelter and feed troops. Officer PW from 5th Co 226th Regt 79th VGD stated that orders had been changed from withdrawal to defense. This officer knew that he was opposing the 80th Division. Prisoners stated that intensive use was made of mines. Light artillery fire encountered. 37 prisoners taken during the days action.

- b. Friendly action:

Mission of the 319th Inf was to seize and occupy Kautenbach and Alscheid. Co E jumped off in the advance on Alscheid at 240400A Jan 45. The Company advanced without any opposition. 1 plat of 166th Engr Bn built Class 8 bridge vicinity Merkols and at 0630 jeeps could use the bridge. Co F continued to fight for upper portion of Kautenbach. At 0915 Co K moved to Merkols. At 0930 Co E gained contact with the enemy in the western edge of Alscheid. At 1030 Co E occupied Alscheid and mopped up the town. The town contained many AT and AP mines. Enemy artillery fell in the town. The Engrs were notified to reinforce the bridge at Merkols to a Class 10 bridge. At 1330 Co K closed in Merkols. Co C sent a patrol to search out woods to the east of Dahl. At 1720 Co E reported Alscheid clear of enemy; Co E continued to meet strong enemy resistance. At 1740 bridge at Merkols reported reinforced. Co G moved out for Alscheid from Merkols at 1715. At 2020 Co G closed in Alscheid and Co F reported town of Kautenbach clear of enemy. Contact established and maintained between units in Alscheid and Kautenbach. Tks and TDs remained south of Wiltz River. 905 FA reinforced fired the following missions:

Co C 305 Engr Bn cleared roads of snow and mines. Reconnoitered for bridge sites. Worked on ford vicinity bridge at Merkols crossing. Mine Plat 319th Inf attached to 2nd Bn swept road from Merkols to Alscheid and cleared streets and houses in Alscheid of mines and booby traps. Grenades and bazookas used in town fighting. 3rd Bn CP moved to Merkols and 2nd Bn Forward CP moved to Nocher. Other unit CPs no change.

1. Defense of Regimental Bridgehead on 25 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:
 - a. Enemy action:

No aggressive enemy activity. 35 prisoners were captured.
 - b. Friendly action:

Attachments: 2nd Bn 318th Inf; Co B 610 TD Bn and Co B 91st Cml Bn released from attachment. 1st Bn 318th Inf vicinity Dahl. 2nd Bn sent a patrol to the east to determine enemy disposition east of Clerf River to town of Consthum. The patrol, a reinforced platoon, crossed the Clerf River at 1100 and worked its way toward the town. The patrol sent a squad to the western edge of the town and they found enemy dug-in positions around the perimeter of the town. The patrol was called back to the Bn when it was learned that the 5th Division would send its Rcn Troop to reconnoiter Consthum and vicinity. At 1610 the 2nd Bn patrol returned. At 1650 2nd Bn 318th Inf was attached to 319th Inf and relieved our units on position by 260130A Jan 45. 3rd Bn assembled in Merkols; 1st Bn moved to Dahl. Received orders from 80th Div to move by motor to vicinity Larochette and become attached to 4th Div. 905 FA and 512 FA fired the following missions:

1. Relief of 8th Inf and 1st Bn 12th Inf with two Bns on 26 January 1945.
2. Narrative account of action:

- a. Friendly action:

319th Inf (reinforced) attached to 4th Inf Div. 2nd Bn 318th Inf released of attachment. Regtl CP vicinity Kewelbach, 2nd Bn vicinity Eppeldorf, 1st Bn vicinity Moestroff, 3rd Bn vicinity Longsdorf, Co C 305 Med Bn and Co C 305 Engr Bn vicinity Ermsdorf, Co C 702 Tk Bn vicinity Bettendorf, 905 FA Bn vicinity Diekirch. Mission of 319th CT to relieve the 8th Inf and 1st Bn 12th Inf with two Bns. The advance party of the 319th CT left Goesdorf at 0740 for 4th Div CP at Fels. At the 4th Div CP, a change in route was received and a new assembly point designated. The command group consisted of the Regtl, Bn and Company COs left for the new area at 1214. Regtl CP, 3rd Bn, Co C 305 Med Bn, Co C 305 Engr Bn, Co A 91st Cml Bn CPs vicinity of Gilsdorf; 2nd Bn CP vicinity Bettendorf, Co B 633 AAA Bn (AW) vicinity Diekirch, 905 FA moved to Gilsdorf. Mission of the 319th CT to maintain and improve present positions. The 319th Inf (reinforced) held a line running generally from Feuhren exclusive southeast to Reisdorf inclusive with the 3rd Bn on the left and the 1st Bn on the right; the 2nd Bn was in reserve in Bettendorf. Narrative Account of Action:

1 January 1945:

Eight (8) PWs taken, identified from Engr Plat, Regtl Hq Co, 7th Co, and the 14th Co of the 208th Inf Regt in KEMMEN. Enemy incapable of launching a big offensive in this sector now.

Regiment remained in defensive positions. Regtl CP located in NIEDERFEULEN. 3d Bn in Regtl Reserve. Co K manning five road blocks on main roads coming into NIEDERFEULEN. 1st and 3d Bn CP's located in NIEDERFEULEN. 2d & 1st Bns on line, 2d on left and 1st on the right. Contact made by 2d Bn with 319th Inf, 1st Bn maintaining contact with 318th Inf. All three Bns maintained contact by foot patrols. Had communications with three Bns, higher headquarters, 318th Inf and 319th Inf.

Regt remained in defensive positions. Orders received to push one company of 1st Bn North and outpost the MARK River in Vic WELSCHEID. This move to be coordinated with 1st Bn 318th Inf who are to move North on the right flank. Co B to make the move under cover of darkness. Received Artillery and mortar fire throughout day. Maintained contact by patrols and wire with all units including 318th Inf and 319th Inf.

3 January 1945:

Enemy patrols very active in right portion of Regtl sector. Visibility very poor. Civilians report type of German soldiers in BOURSCHEID varies from poor to fair.

Co B completed ordered movement at 0315. 318th Inf 1st Bn was not able to take objective, having met MG and small arms fire. B Co received artillery and mortar fire throughout day. Communications with all units. One platoon of 3d Bn sent to reinforce right flank of 2d Bn.

4 January 1945:

2 PWs taken today stated that chow for the 6th Co, 208th Regt, was served between 1930 and 2030, 3 Jan. Distance between foxholes in HRL irregular. Strength of 6th Co Approx 35 men, located in KEMMEN; also an unidentified Co there, with Approx strength of 40-50 men. Enemy not capable of launching a big offensive in this sector now.

Regtl CP located in NIEDERFEULEN. 1st & 3d Bn CP's also located NIEDERFEULEN. Co E received a very large concentration of mortar and artillery fire at 1630; following this the enemy was observed digging in approximately 1000 yards to the front of B Co. From this location the enemy advanced starting at 1700. Because of very effective artillery fire, enemy withdrew. Active patrolling was carried on throughout the night.

5 January 1945:

No change in enemy front lines. Arty and increased mortar fell throughout Regtl sector; enemy patrols were aggressive during the period; flare activity in sector. Increased motor vehicle, horse-drawn vehicle and foot movement Obsvd

traveling from NE to SW into MURDEN. No PWs taken. Enemy not capable of launching a large scale attack in this sector at this time.

Regtl CP remained in NIEDERFEULEN. Ordered 1st Bn to relieve 3d Bn from road blocks and move into reserve. 3d Bn closed in at 1500 to Vic RINGEL to relieve 2d Bn 319th Inf. 3d Bn closed in new position at 2200. 2d Bn remained in position prepared to attack Northeast on order this headquarters. Received intermittent artillery and mortar fire throughout day.

6 January 1945:

Enemy patrols very active throughout the early morning, attempting to draw fire and determine location of our automatic weapons. No change in enemy front lines.

80th Inf Div (Reinf) crossed SURE River Vic HEIDERSCHIEDERGRUND 060400 seized high ground Vic NOCHER and MASSELER. 317th Inf (less 1st Bn, Div Res) with Co A 702d Tk Bn, Co B 610th TD Bn, two plats Co A 305th Engr (C) Bn attached advanced on order, seized high ground Northeast and S of KEMMEN. Assisted advance 318th Inf by fire on high ground Vic BOUNSCHEID. 3d Bn (Reinf) Vic RINGEL assisted by fire attack 319th Inf. Cross SURE River Vic HEIDERSCHIEDERGRUND and continued attack North on order. 1st Bn moved on Div order from Vic NIEDERFEULEN to Vic HEIDERSCHIED. Crossed IF NIEDERFEULEN 1015. 2d & 3d Bns remained in positions throughout day awaiting Div order to attack.

7 January 1945:

Light Arty and mortar fire fell in Regtl area. Increased vehicular and foot movement in Vic of GOESDORF. Indications of counterattack on Div left front. Enemy patrol captured two (2) 3d Bn men in their foxholes. No PWs taken.

Moved Reserve Platoon Co B 610th TD Bn from NIEDERFEULEN to HEIDERSCHIED. 1st Bn remained in Div Res. 2d Bn remained in defensive position SW of KEMMEN making plans to seize KEMMEN and high ground NE & E of town. 3d Bn remained in defensive position, prepared to support 319th Inf by fire. Regtl CP moved from NIEDERFEULEN to HEIDERSCHIED under cover of darkness.

8 January 1945.

Light Arty, flare and SA activity throughout the period. Enemy patrols very active throughout the night.

Regtl CP located HEIDERSCHIED. 1st Bn Div Res at HEIDERSCHIED with Co C at HEIDERSCHIEDERGRUND with one platoon guarding bridge on SURE River. 2d Bn in defensive position SW of KEMMEN. 3d Bn in defensive position Vic TADLER. Bns continued to occupy and improve defensive positions. 3d Bn supported 319th Inf with mortar fire on MASSELER. 313th FA Bn fired forty missions in support of Regt. Co A 305th Engr (C) Bn (one plat attached 317th Inf, remainder company in support) improved roads in Regtl sector. Combat efficiency; excellent.

9 January 1945.

Light Arty, mortar, SA and flare activity NW of TADLER. Enemy patrol operating in 3d Bn area captured one (1) American prisoner. PWs taken one (1).

Regtl CP remained in HEIDERSCHIED. 3d Bn remained in Vic TADLER continued to improve and occupy defensive position. 2d Bn relieved by 1st Bn under cover of darkness. 1st Bn moved from Div Res Vic HEIDERSCHIED by foot and motor to defensive position occupied by 2d Bn SW of KEMMEN. 2d Bn moved to Vic HEIDERSCHIED in Div Res.

10 January 1945:

Increased vehicular movement Vic HORDEN and SCHEIDEL. Enemy patrols very active throughout the sector.

Regtl CP remained in HEIDERSCHEID. 1st Bn made adjustments in their defensive position under cover of darkness SW of KEHNEN. 3d Bn continued to occupy and improve their position. 313th FA Bn with Btry A 633d AAA Bn, Cn Co 317th Inf and 1st Plat Co A 91st Cml Mort Bn attached fired ninety one missions in support of Regt. Radio and wire communications with all units.

11 January 1945:

Enemy very active at night, using a listening post and patrols.

1st Bn completed adjustments of positions under cover of darkness night 10-11 Jan. 317th Inf (Reinf) continued to occupy and improve defensive positions. Regtl CP remained in HEIDERSCHEID.

12 January 1945:

Light Arty and mortar fire throughout Regtl sector. Increased movement in right portion of sector.

No changes in position. Sector quiet.

13 January 1945:

Regtl and Bn OPs gave reports of movement to the Regtl front. Enemy patrols very active.

1st Bn sent one platoon to take high ground N SCHEIDEL. Met heavy resistance when they reconnoitered high ground. Platoon outposted SCHEIDEL. 2d & 3d Bns remained unchanged.

14 January 1945:

Enemy very active with flares. Sent patrols to obtain information about bridges and fords on SURE River in Regtl sector.

Regtl CP remained in HEIDERSCHEID. 2d Bn remained in Div Res with Co F outposting area Vic bridge at HEIDERSCHEIDERGRUND. 1st Bn moved remaining two platoons forward to Vic SCHEIDEL where they dug in W & NW of town. 3d Bn remained in defensive position. Wire and radio communications with all units.

15 January 1945:

Patrols continued to reconnoiter for crossing of SURE River. Intermittent Arty and mortar fire fell in Regtl area.

317th Inf continued to occupy and improve defensive position. Communications maintained with all units.

16 January 1945:

Regt sent very active patrols out. S-2 wrote Intelligence Annex to FO #27. Very little enemy activity in our sector.

2d Bn started to relieve 3d Bn Vic TADLER at 2400. Two companies of 2d Bn had completed the change. 3d Bn moved to HEIDERSCHEID in Div Res. Co K replaced Co F outposting bridge Vic HEIDERSCHEIDERGRUND. 1st Bn remained in defensive position Vic SCHEIDEL.

17 January 1945:

Distributed Intelligence Annex to FO #28. Very active patrol plan carried out during hours of darkness.

1st Bn continued to maintain and improve defensive position. 2d Bn continued to maintain and improve defensive position. Under cover of darkness Co G moved from Vic TADLER to HEIDERSCHEID in Div Res. 3d Bn (less one reinf plat)

moved from Vic HEIDERSCHIED N to GOESDORF relieving 2d Bn 319th Inf. Closed in that area 2000 and outposted the town. One reinf plat Co K continued to guard and outpost the bridge Vic HEIDERSCHIEDERGRUND. Regt CP remained in HEIDERSCHIED.

18 January 1945:

Intermittent mortar and Arty fell throughout Regtl sector. No PWs taken. Very active patrol plan sent to the Bns. Enemy patrols very active during hours of darkness.

1st & 2d Bns supported attack 319th Inf by fire. 3d Bn continued to outpost GOESDORF. Regtl CP remained Vic HEIDERSCHIED.

19 January 1945:

Our patrols very active, and drew a great deal of fire from enemy outpost.

G Co relieved F Co, F Co moved back to HEIDERSCHIED. Bns continued to improve and occupy defensive positions. One reinf plat Co K continued to outpost and guard bridge Vic HEIDERSCHIEDERGRUND. Heavy snowfall caused telephone communications to be out about two hours in the morning.

20 January 1945:

Very active patrol plan sent to the Bns. 1st Bn patrol captured 3 PWs. At this time, the enemy is not capable of launching a large scale attack.

Regt continued to occupy and improve defensive positions. Regtl CP remained in HEIDERSCHIED.

21 January 1945:

Strong enemy resistance, consisting of direct weapons fire, nebelwerfer, Arty, mortar and SA fire, was encountered Vic NW of HOURSCHIED, to prevent our seizure of bridges across SURE River.

1st Bn seized KETMEN. 2d Bn attacked at 0600, met very heavy enemy resistance and at 1800 were fighting in DIRBACH. Orders were given for 2d Bn to withdraw under cover of darkness. 3d Bn moved at 1800 to BUDERSCHIED.

22 January 1945:-

Enemy front line in Regtl sector is at a very fluid state. Enemy resistance was encountered N side of SURE River. Intermittent Arty and mortar fire fell on troops throughout the day.

2d Bn in defensive position (close-in) Vic TADLER. 1st Bn moved to HEIDERSCHIED, 3d Bn moved to BUDERSCHIED. Received order to move Regt (Reinf) to assembly area at Wiltz. Move completed prior to 2400. Forward Regtl CP established in WILTZ.

23 January 1945:

Enemy appears to be withdrawing, with an OPL remaining to cover the withdraw. CP observed bicycle troops entering PINTSCHE.

3d Bn attacked 0730, followed by 1st & 2d Bns. 3d Bn seized ground E ESCHWEILER, occupied defensive position on high ground. 1st Bn moved to left flank 3d Bn, set up defensive position. 2d Bn Regtl Res moved from WILTZ to EPELDANGE. Regtl CP moved from WILTZ to EPELDANGE. 3d Bn attacked N from WILTZ 0730, seized ground E of ESCHWEILER. Co B 610th TD (SP) Bn claimed one Tiger Royal Tank probably destroyed.

1. Attack and capture of Goesdorf and defense of Dahl, Luxembourg, on 6, 7 and 8 January 1945.

2. Lt Col Hiram D. Ives, CO 1st Battalion, coordinated the attack on Goesdorf with his respective company commanders. Company "B", commanded by Capt William H. Scott, was the leading assault company of the Battalion. On 6 January 1945, in the attack north of the Sure River, the company had swiftly attained its objective in the overall regimental plan. Having left the line of departure below Goesdorf the company advanced to attack and clear the western and northern sectors of the town. At 1600 hours the Company Commander was ordered to organize and march to Dahl, two miles farther north, which was already under attack. Due to severe enemy interdiction of the road the company was forced to make its way over the rolling and wooded terrain, arriving at dusk. Immediate orders caused the Company Commander to relieve a 3rd Battalion unit already in established defenses in the north and northeast sectors. On 7 January 1945, the enemy launched a number of probing attacks, but, after fierce encounters, withdrew. At 0500, 8 January 1945, the enemy delivered a terrific preparatory barrage which lasted for forty-five (45) minutes. Under this cover an estimated battalion of infantry supported by tanks and other armor advanced to assault the positions of Company "B". A withering crossfire from the tanks created to assist in the enemy advance. Despite the apparent overwhelming opposition delivering a violent fire upon the attacking elements. On the right flank an estimated hostile company forced the outpost, by sheer numbers, to withdraw to a house which had become a strong-point in the defense. Despite the constant re-inforcement of enemy the men in the house were staunch in their unyielding determination to retain their position. They fought from room to room and the assault suffered a heavy attrition to no avail. In the center, because of the rolling terrain, the enemy approached to within one hundred and fifty (150) yards of the defense and were effective for only in that sector was there any perilous threat to the defenses. Save for the squad leader all the defenders were hit, but the enemy force also lost the initiative due to casualties in the severe fire fight. Almost simultaneously both sides rushed reserves to that questionable sector. Company B committed its reserve platoon, and as hostile forces were repeatedly pushed into that possible weakpoint, the situation again became critical. The Co Hqs section and all available men were rushed to the threatened flank, and through a fierce and determined fight succeeded in driving the enemy from its hard won positions. Because of the determined defense by the hard pressed men of Company "B" and the heavy attrition that the losing attack cost the enemy attempted a withdrawal under smoke cover. The prevailing winds dispersed the smoke screen and the firm resolve of every effective man in the company instilled panic into the enemy causing a disorderly rout. A murderous and concentrated barrage of artillery, mortar macking un and rifle fire pursued the retreating ranks.

SECTION VIII - Commanding Officers in Important Engagements (contd).

1. Attack and capture of Dahl, Luxembourg, on 6 January 1945.

2. Lt Col Elliott B. Cheston, CO 3rd Battalion, coordinated the attack on Dahl, Luxembourg with his respective company commanders as part of the overall plan of the regiment. At 0825 the leading assault company was 1000 yards southwest of the town and receiving very heavy enemy artillery and long range small arms fire from the north. The 3rd Bn forces were temporarily split by this fire but Col Cheston maneuvered his forces and reunited them for an attack. 3rd Bn placed artillery concentration on Dahl and jumped off in the attack at 1230. Co I, commanded by Capt Leroy swung NW of Dahl to block any threat from that direction while Co K commanded by Capt Smith and Co L commanded by Capt Moe entered the town and began mopping up. 3rd Bn had town of Dahl at 061400A and were regrouped.

1. Attack and capture of Bockholz, Luxembourg, on 11 January 1945.

2. 1st Lt Zach L. Majors, CO of Company "E", coordinated the attack and capture of Bockholz. At 110700A the company moved out from position with the mission of attacking and destroying the enemy therein. Advancing through the woods to the east of Goesdorf Co E approached the town from the southwest. By 0855 Co E had reached the high ground the southwest and had not close contact with the enemy. Co E sent a patrol into Bockholz when enemy artillery let up, to seize the town. Met little enemy resistance and by 1150 had occupied town with 1 platoon and had captured 74 prisoners. Co E then outposted the town with 1 platoon and sent one platoon to comb south edge of woods from Bockholz to Goesdorf. Upon reconnoitering the town it was found to be heavily mined and booby trapped.

1. Attack and capture of Nocker, Luxembourg, on 18 January 1945.

2. Lt Col Elliott B. Cheston, CO 3rd Bn, with the mission of attacking and seizing Nocker, coordinated the attack with his company commanders and the CO of Company G (atchd). 3rd Bn jumped off in the attack at 180700 minus any artillery preparation to effect the element of surprise. The foot troops of 3rd Bn advanced on Nocker in two columns, Co K had the mission of blocking any hostile approaches to the town from the west and northwest, Cos I and L approached the town from the southeast with the mission of seizing the town; Co G (atchd) in reserve. At 0740 Cos I and L reached the southeast edge of town and Co K advanced to the northeast edge of woods meeting no opposition. The Tks and TDs of the 3rd Bn had ordered to join them at 0740. At 0820 3rd Bn, minus Co K, occupied Nocker and received heavy enemy shelling. Co K held up by enemy dug-in positions. At 1215, under the direction of Col Cheston, the 3rd Bn units had taken the following positions: Co L protecting Nocker from the north and northeast, Co I from the east and south, Co G from the west and north. Enemy shelled all positions. At 1500 Co K was about 300 yards east and southeast of the town and had a stiff fight with the enemy. At 191030 Jan 45 Co K continued attack against enemy held positions and by 1030 occupied all buildings east of the road junction leading into Nocker.

1. Attack and capture of Merkols, Luxembourg, on 23 January 1945.

2. Capt Norman A. Moe, CO, of Company L, upon receiving orders from his immediate CO, drew up plans to attack Merkols. At 1220 Co L moved toward the town, had crossed the Wiltz River over ice and by 1600 the leading elements approached the town, meeting no enemy personnel, but running into mine fields. At 1805 Co L had secured Merkols and moved one platoon the high ground. Upon the arrival of nightfall consolidated positions.

1. Attack and capture of Kautenbach, Luxembourg, on 23-24 January 1945.

2. Capt William H. Chamberlain, CO, of Company F, upon receipt of orders from his Bn CO, drew up plans for the attack on Kautenbach. At 1230 Co F reinforced moved against Kautenbach and at 1410 approached the outskirts of the town meeting heavy fire from houses on the high ground to the north. At 1835, after an afternoon of hard fighting, the company had secured the lower part of Kautenbach but the enemy held the high part of the town and placed heavy automatic and rifle fire upon them. Two plats were directed to try and maneuver around west flank of the enemy but met heavy fire. Co F ordered to hold positions for the night and resume the attack early 24 Jan 45. At daybreak on 24 Jan 45 the company continued their fight for Kautenbach. Heavy enemy resistance was encountered during the day and at 2020 the town was reported clear of the enemy.

1. Attack and capture of Alscheid, Luxembourg, on 24 January 1945.

2. 1st Lt Zach L. Majors, CO Company E, upon receipt of orders from his Bn CO drew up plans for the attack on Alscheid. At 0400 Company E jumped off in advance on the town meeting no opposition. At 0930 contact was gained with the enemy in the western edge of the town and at 1030, after a bitter fire fight, the town was occupied and the company began mopping up the town. At 1740 the town was reported clear of the enemy
