All marches during May were to change positions in support of the tactical situation.

- 1 May Mettenbach, Germany to Aichbachpran, Germany, 4 miles, weather cloudy, roads fair.
- 2 May Aichbachpran, Germany to Aresing, Germany, 59 miles, weather cloudy, with fair roads.
- 4 May Aresing, Germany to Mauerkirchen, Austria, 40 miles, weather cloudy, roads good.
- 5 May Mauerkirchen, Austria to Sierning, Austria, weather cloudy, with some rain, roads good.
- 6 May Sierning, Austria to Wimsbach, Austria, 27 miles, weather cloudy, with fair roads.

7. Battles: 1. The Enemy:

1 May - The 905th Field Artillery Battalion reinforced by the fires of the 315th Field Artillery Battalion continued in direct support of the 319th Infantry Regiment. Rapid advances during the last days of April had taken the infantry elements to the banks of the Isar River southeast of Essenbach. Enemy units identified in the zone of the 80th Infantry Division were the 36th VG and the 416th Infantry Divisions. We enemy artillery was reported. The last artillery round fired in the European War by the 905th Field Artillery Battalien was in the preparation for the 2nd Battalien in their attack acress the Isar River toward Niedaichbach, Germany. The town was taken with very slight resistance and at the same time the 1st Battalion took Niedviehbach, Germany. Infantry elements reported the capture of prisoners with back-dated discharge papers.

2 May - The 905th Field Artillery Battalien crossed the Isar River by bridge and supported the meterised infantry column moving to the southeast. A road block supported ed by an estimated 150 enemy infantry was reduced.

4 May - The 905th Field Artillery Battalion crossed the Inn River at Braunau. Austria.

5 May - The 905th Field Artillery Battalian moved to the vicinity of Sierning. Austria and took over the military government of the town. Approximately two thousand prisoners of war were assembled and placed in the 905th Prisoner of War Enclosure. The effect of the disintegration of the German government was shown upon the number of enemy seldiers surrendering on the 80th Infantry Division front.

6-31 May (inclusive) - The 905th Field Artillery Battalien moved to Wimsbach, Austria where it remained for the rest of the month. When Vell Day came on 9 May, the 905th Field Artillery Battalien was engaged in moving prisoners of war and displaced personnel to previously designated areas. At the end of the month a prisoner of war camp was established near Lambach. Austria.

2. Action:

1 May - The 905th Field Artillery Battalion was located in Mettenbach with the Command Post at (33251480), "A" Battery at (3342614671), "B" Battery at (3368415013), "C" Battery at (3309614900), and Cannon Company, 319th Infantry located in Meosburg, attached to the 1st Battalion, 319th Infantry. 905th Field Artillery Battalien fired a preparation for the 2nd Battalien. 319th Infantry in support of an attack on Nied Aichbach, Germany across the Isar River. The preparation was fired by "B" and "C" Batteries and this preparation was the last ammunition fired in the European War by the 905th Field Artillery Battalion. 1st Battalion, 319th Infantry also crossed the Isar River and took Nied Viehbach, Germany. 905th Field Artillery Battalion furnished the infantry with trucks for a shuttle movement. Upon the return of the trucks, the 905th Field Artillery Battalien moved to Nied Aichbacheau with the Command Post located at (378114), "A" Battery at (3741011717), "B" Battery at (3789811786), "C" Battery at



7. Battles: (Continued)

(3807411934). The 94th Chemical Mortar Battalion mims Company "A" and "B" was attached to the 905th Field Artillery Battalion at this time. 315th Field Artillery Battalion reinferced the fires of the 905th Field Artillery Battalion. Both radio and wire communications were used.

2 May - During the early moraing hours, the Engineers completed a bridge across the Isar River. The 905th Field Artillery Battalien crossed and moved into an assembly area in the vicinity of Loizenkirchen, Germany. The Battalien column consisting of the 905th Field Artillery Battalien plus 94th Chemical Mortar Battalien minus Company "A" and "B". The 1st Battalien, 319th Infantry was motorized. Company "C", 94th Chemical Mortar Battalien was attached to 1st Battalien, 319th Infantry. 905th Field Artillery Battalien fellowed the motorized column. While on the move the column ran into a read block estimated to consist of 150 men. Infantry and tanks were deployed to take care of the read block. Cannon Company, 319th Infantry and Battery "A", 905th Field Artillery Battalien were put into position in case the read block became a serious obstacle. The situation cleared in a short time and the column moved on. 1st Battalien, 319th Infantry went into an assembly area in vicinity of Illbach, Germany, 2nd Battalien took up positions about Winhoring, Germany. 905th Field Artillery Battalien took up pesitions in the vicinity of Aresing, Germany with Command Post located at (61107590), "A" Battery at (6133075300), "B" Battery at (6108975764), "C" Battery at (6208076000).

3 May = The 319th Infantry went into reserve. Mission of the 905th Field Artillery Battalion remained unchanged. The 905th Field Artillery Battalion furnished 6 prime movers to the Infantry for shuttling and 6 prime movers to 80th Infantry Division to transport Primers of War. The six prime movers to 319th Infantry returned to the 905th Field Artillery Battalion prior to darkness.

4 May = The 315th Field Artillery Battalion was relieved of its reinforcing mission. The 905th Field Artillery Battalion moved as part of the 319th Combat Team to an assembly area in the vicinity of Simbach, a Inn, Germany. Upon arriving at the area the Battalion was ordered to proceed to Mauerkirch. The Battalion crossed the Inn River at Braunau, Austria and proceeded to Mauerkirch with the Command Post located at (006697), "A" Battery at (0070068260), "B" Battery at (0050068840), "C" Battery at (0060069636), The move was about 45 miles. Radio only to higher units. Wire was used to batteries and 319th Infantry.

5 May - The 905th Field Artillery Battalion displaced as part of the 319th Combat Team to vicinity of Sierling, Austria near the Steyr River. Prior to the move Cannon Company, 319th Infantry was attached to the 3rd Battalion, 319th Infantry, motorized; Company "C". 31st Chemical Mortar Battalion was attached to 2nd Battalion, 319th Infantry, The move from Mauerkirch to Sierling was about 80 miles. The 905th Field Artillery Battalion Command Post was located at (893599), "A" Battery at (8913159138), "B" Battery at (8934559406), "C" Battery at (5908159225). As the 905th Field Artillery Battalion was the only American military unit in town it was necessary to take over the military government of the town. Instructions were issued to the Bergermeister and carried out. Up until midnight about 2000 prisoners were collected and placed in the 905th Field Artillery Battalion Prisoner of War inclosure.



7. Battles: (Continued)

6 May - The mission of the 319th Infantry was again changed and they were relieved by elements of the 71st Infantry Division. The 905th Field Artillery Battalion plus Cannon Company, 319th Infantry moved as part of the 319th Combat Team to the vicinity of Wimsbach, Austria, retracing the route of the previous day by about 35 miles. The Battalion Command Post was located in Wimsbach at (585589), "A" Battery at Aichut (558577), "B" Battery at (566577), "C" Battery at Freham (568583) and Cannon Company, 319th Infantry at Berghan (565568). The 6 prime movers that were sent to the 80th Infantry Division on 3 May for the purpose of hamling Prisoners of War, returned. A detail of 30 men and efficers were left in Sierling, Austria to maintain guard over 2500 Prisoners of War.

7-6 May (inclusive) - The guard detail left in Sierling, Austria was relieved and rejoined 905th Field Artillery Battalion. All hostilities have ceased.

9-31 May (inclusive) - The 905th Field Artillery Battalian performed normal eccupation duties.


