Report on 2011 Overseas 80th Division **Activities**

NCE AGAIN, I have been fortunate to represent the 80th Division overseas, as has been the case for many years. Typically, the trip begins with Memorial Day commemorative services at one of the American Military Cemeteries (A.M.C.); some in the Meuse-Argonne A.M.C. at Romagne, France; later in the Somme A.M.C. at Bony, France, both of which have graves of 80th Division soldiers from World War One.

This year's services attended were at the Brookwood Military Cemetery in the London, England area. We were hosted by the Superintendent and his wife, Craig and Lorna Rahanian, who were previously at Bonv. Brookwood is more than 500 acres in size: however. the A.M.C. located within Brookwood is one of the smaller ones.

Gravesites were adorned with both U.S. and British flags. A Color Guard of American troops from the Army. Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force performed admirably. There were many distinguished attendees, including British and American service personnel and veterans. The speaker for the occasion was U.S. Navy Admiral Melton. Other Navy participants included the Bugler, who rendered "TAPS."

I had the privilege of presenting an 80th Division wreath during the ceremony, as had been the case at Romagne and Bony in years past.

Other activities included several "tourist attractions" such as Stone Henge, the Portsmouth Historical Navy Dockyard (H.M.S. Victory) and aviation museum, the Royal Marines' Museum, and the Salisbury Cathedral, which contains one of the four copies of the Magna Carta.

In France, I was hosted in the Somme by the Stephane Bonnouvrier family. About a week was spent in the Somme, collecting battlefield artifacts and viewing battlefield sites, such as the Hindenberg Line, which passes through the A.M.C. at Bony.

Later, the Meuse-Argonne battlefields were visited. This included the A.M.C. at Romagne and the Nantillois area, where the 80th "went over the top" on the morning of 4 October, 1918 in the attack on the Bois des Ogons, which began the continuous push which led to the defeat of the Boche. There were many casualties caused in this attack; artillery, machine gun fire and poison gas took their toll. My father was wounded by an artillery shell, and went to the 80th's aid station on the Ferme de L'Etanges, on the Southern side of the Nantillois-Brieulles road.

were discussed. The Commander's Reception followed on Wednesday evening. At that time, introductions of the officers and committees were made and the new banner for the Association was unveiled. Attendees were served a reception menu of assorted cheeses, fruits and antipasto.

Thursday morning brought additional weather woes. The track of Hurricane Irene was projected with several possible scenarios, one of which included a direct target in the Richmond area. Some who had registered for the events, but had not yet arrived on site, decided to forego any attempt to travel, and several who were in attendance rapidly made arrangements to depart. Numbers for the evening events were recalculated several times during the next two days!

The men's Thursday morning business meeting included discussions regarding the replacement of Andy Adkins as Secretary/Editor. CSM (R) Doris Wollett will assume his duties as National Secretary of the 80th Division Veterans Association. Secretary Adkins reported that the current membership stands at 935, down from 1,067 members last year. He reported about 130 members were dropped; some were deceased and others failed to pay their membership fees. The association received 73 new members this past year, 60 of which were from the 80th Blue Ridge Army Reserve Association.

Sr. Vice Commander and 2012 Reunion Chair LTC Grant Porter announced that he was looking to hold the next reunion in Baltimore, MD with possible activities to include a harbor dinner cruise and a trip to the Naval Academy at Annapolis. More information will be published in the next Blue Ridge.

Secretary Adkins reported that this year's McBride Scholarship (\$500) was awarded to Erin Oswald, a senior at Lincoln High School; she sent a thank you note which Adkins read to the attendees. PNC Russell Sick, Commander of Post 40, 305th Engineer Battalion reported that Post 40 would discontinue activities and presented a check for \$300.35 to the 80th Division Veterans Association General Fund. He said that there were fewer members and there was no need to hold funds in the account any longer.

The members exited the meeting just in time to grab a quick lunch before buses departed for the visit to the museums at Fort Lee and a projected tour of the city of Petersburg, home to the 80th as they trained for WW I. Due to time constraints, however, the group was only able to view the memorabilia housed in the Quartermaster Museum at the base, followed by a short bus tour of Fort Lee. Buses returned to the hotel about five pm, in time for preparations to attend the annual Dug Out Party and just shortly before outer bands of hurricane rain began falling in the Richmond suburbs.

The theme for this year's Dug Out Party was "Back to the 40's," with period attire suggested as the evening's dress code. Many attendees outdid themselves with their attire, but undeniably the most appropriate were Gene Hopkins' and Dr. Anthony's outfits. Always a favorite, Gene did not disappoint us when he appeared in his own Army uniform, and Dr. Anthony had raided his homestead trunks to locate a suit and straw hat that had been worn by his father. The menu for the event was typical of the Army chow line: fried chicken, meatloaf and corn on the cob.

Table decorations featured prints of 1940's war posters and ration stamps good for sodas at the side bar. A live band had been scheduled to provide music of the era, but a contingency plan was put into place with use of a stereo and CDs. Not necessarily authentic equipment, but the music was a good reminder of the time!

Dr. Anthony presented replicas of the new banner to PNC Max Schmidt and MG John P. McLaren, who in turn selected the winning tickets for the raffle. Winners were Hilda Latusek and Bob Moorhead, each of whom will receive checks for \$250. Earlier in the day, PNC

Bob Murrell donated a clock, made in the shape of the 80th patch by the late Leroy Rubino, which was also raffled. When the ticket was drawn, Bob McDonald was the winner, and the raffle netted \$225 for reunion expenses. Special thanks go to PNC Murrell and to all who supported the raffles.

Friday morning dawned with additional concerns about the approaching storm and more attendees decided not to ride it out in Virginia. By noon, as many as thirty had departed the hotel.

The men's second business meeting took place on Friday morning, during which time the slate of officers for 2011-2012 was presented. The Commanders were elected and ascended the line of succession with Dr. Lee Anthony moving into the National Commander's post; LTC Grant Porter is the Senior Vice Commander and Reunion Chairman for 2012; MG John P. McLaren is Second Vice Commander: and elected as Third Vice Commander is Jeff Wignall, son of WW II Veteran, William Wignall, who was killed in action while serving with the 80th in 1944. Reelected are the following: PNC Angelo Barone, Chaplain; Dempsey Prappas, Esq., Judge Advocate; Bruce Smith, Historian; Burt Marsh, Sergeant-at-Arms; Roger Nelson, Flag Sergeant and Service Officer. SGT Travis Edwards was appointed as Public Affairs Officer and Photographer.

Due to his recent career change, Secretary Andy Adkins had submitted his notice of resignation prior to the annual meeting to be effective at the end of the calendar year. Elected to succeed Andy is CSM (Ret) Doris Wollett, the first female Life Member of the Association. Doris assumed the duties of Secretary/ Editor effective immediately. Elected to serve on the Board of Trustees are the following: Laverne Schock, PNC Walt Spangler and Jim Christen.

Elected as Members at Large on the Executive Council for one year are: Gerald Myers, Laverne Schock, and Jeff Wignall. For two years are: Robert McDonald, Robert Moorhead and Wilcie Skaggs. For three years are: PNC Elmer Dorsten, Paul Stutts and Edmond (Pete) Herbert.

During the Ladies' Memorial Service, tribute was paid to all deceased members of the Auxiliary, with particular mention of PNP Rita Kutsch, who passed away this last year. Election of officers followed with Judy Luthman retaining the position of President. Phyllis Hanna, Vice President, will also temporarily handle the duties of Treasurer, that office having been vacated by PNP Naomi Brockman, and there were no nominees for the office. The office of Secretary was filled by Dr. Tonyia Gibbons and Cecelia Smith will be Chaplain, the position held by PNP Margaret Schock, who resigned. Kay Barone was re-elected as Sergeant at Arms.

During the afternoon, it had been anticipated that displays would be established for the Veterans and families to enjoy, but due to the anticipated hurricane, a group of re-enactors from Southern Virginia was forced to cancel their plans. However, outside of the

hotel, Jim Callear and his son Ethan, from Powhatan, VA, and an associate, Lt. Dick Baldwin from Virginia Beach, were entertaining any and all. Jim has a traveling exhibit which he provides for such events and many of the reunion attendees took advantage of handling the weapons on display. Women signed up to join the "WAVES" and some of the Veterans were given rides in the WW II vintage Jeep they had on display. There was also an opportunity to have photos taken with the equipment. At various times in the afternoon, Ethan was found in uniforms of the Army and Navy Shore Patrol. The Callears' attendance and exhibits were a pleasant addition and diversion to an otherwise gloomy day.

On Friday evening, the traditional time for PNCs and PNPs to hold their annual private dinner meetings, the other reunion attendees were invited to participate in Family Friday Night. About eighty of the folks still remaining in the hotel had opted to "dine in," and joined in the event where a seafood buffet was served. Following the dinner, CSM (Ret) Doris Wollett presented a program of slides and narration of her "story," the very personal memories of her deployment with the 80th Training Command as they spent a year in Iraq, training the Iragi soldiers and police. At times amusing and also very poignant, CSM Wollett related her experiences, both in preparing for the mission and her interaction with Iraqi people. Near the conclusion of her presentation, the PNCs returned from their private dinner and joined the other attendees for the remainder of the program. Dr. Anthony then presented CSM Wollett with her own personal replica of the new Association banner.

We were awakened by strong hurricane winds and driving rains on Saturday morning. In spite of the inclement weather, all of the people who had agreed to participate in the Memorial Service were in place. Bugler, Ron Bell, from Hopewell; Soloist, Melody Allbee, from Colonial Heights; Pianist, Bruce Marianelli from Pottsville, PA; and the contingent of Color Guard personnel from various locations, had arrived. The Color Guard included: 1st SGT John Eskandary, SSG George Newnam, SFC Joe Matthews, SSG Mallory Nebrich and SGT Shawn Blankumsee. Chaplain (COL) Todd Combee of the 80th Training Command was on hand to deliver the Invocation, Benediction, and Memorial Enlightenment.

The Officers of both the Association and Ladies Auxiliary, as well as PNCs and PNPs were escorted to their seats in procession by Virgil Myers and Laverne Schock.

The Color Guard was called upon to post the Colors. followed by prayer, music, an appropriate poem most recently used for the funeral of 80th Veteran, MOH Paul Wiedorfer, and the very special delivery of the Memorial Enlightenment by Chaplain Combee.

A portion of his message was highlighted by the lighting of five candles:

- 1. Memory: We light this first candle in memory of those who have died this past year. The times we laughed, the times we cried, and the times we served toaether.
- 2. Courage: This candle represents the courage of those who served, and the courage to confront our sorrow, to comfort one another as we deal with loss.
- 3. Faith: We light the third candle, the candle of faith. It is faith that carries us and allows us to go on in spite of the loss of a friend or loved one.
- 4. Love: The candle of love, we cherish the special place in our hearts that will always be reserved for you! We thank God for the gift your life brought to each of us.
- 5. Remembrance: The center candle is lit for each the veterans we are honoring today, each name read out loud and remembered individually.

During the service, names of those Veterans who had passed away during the past year were read and a solemn, respectful period of remembrance was observed. Mr. Bell rendered "TAPS" and Ms. Allbee led the attendees in "The National Anthem" and "Battle Hymn of the Republic." She also performed "America the Beautiful" and "Amazing Grace" as solos. Mr. Marianelli provided pre-ceremony piano selections and also the processional and recessional accompaniment.

The Memorial Wreath was borne to the front by Sergeant-at-Arms, Burt Marsh and then placed in front of the podium by Commander PNC Max Schmidt and Ladies President Judy Luthman.

At the conclusion of the Service, many took advantage of having photos taken with the Memorial Wreath. Present and exercising her photographic talents throughout the reunion functions was SSG Deborah Runkles-Jenkins, 80th Training Command, who despite suffering severe flu symptoms, continued to snap pictures for all. The National Ladies Auxiliary held their luncheon and special guest was Chaplain Todd Combee. A lunch of Italian fare, lasagna, cannoli and tiramisu, was served. The table centerpieces served as door prizes and the items raffled for the benefit of VA hospitals were distributed. Officers for the coming year were installed by PNC Angelo Barone.

As the storm continued to intensify throughout Saturday afternoon, both the hotel and reunion committee attempted to reassure attendees that the safer alternative was to remain in place, rather than trying to navigate the highways. Surrounding communities, and some from as far away as Virginia Beach, had issued evacuation orders, so as 80th people checked out, the hotel was busy registering new occupants and the halls and lobbies were filled with rain-soaked clients and their four-legged friends. Two weddings, scheduled for outdoor ceremonies, were suddenly moved indoors, so hotel personnel were kept extremely busy trying to accommodate everyone's requests.

Members of the 80th Training Command who live in the Richmond area and had registered for the Saturday evening dinner, however, were unable to traverse the neighboring streets, so there were a number of empty seats when we began the final event. A couple of those who did make it were first required to clear driveways of fallen trees before they could leave home. LTC Porter and his wife exited their front door to find a tree across the drive, blocking their garage door. Already dressed in his uniform, LTC Porter then called on his sons for assistance in splitting the tree—a real Paul Bunyon story! Others told us they dressed by flashlight, in order to get to the hotel in time for dinner.

Bruce Marianelli provided piano selections for the attendees as they began finding their places in the ballroom for dinner. Mr. Marianelli is the son-in-law of the Barones and had accompanied them to the Reunion, graciously offering his services at the last minute when scheduled performers could not be present. Due to the early departure of so many, the seating arrangements had been altered several times, so dinner guests had to first consult charts in the hallway to determine where to sit. Updated counts for meals were submitted to the hotel staff, almost on an hourly basis.

As usual, and in his own special way, PNC Angelo Barone performed his duties as Master of Ceremonies for the Saturday dinner. It is no longer called a dinner/dance, since so very few have been staying beyond the meal to waltz or jitter-bug anymore. The Soldiers of the Training Command once again were called on to perform the posting and retiring of the Colors. Chaplain Combee also honored the Veterans and families with his Invocation and Benediction. A plated meal choice of salmon, pork or chicken was enjoyed by approximately 130 of the brave souls who had remained for the duration. PNC Max Schmidt performed one last duty of his Office by placing the Commander's Cap on Dr. Anthony and MC Barone presented the plaque of recognition and thanks to PNC Schmidt for his having served a second term as National Commander this past year.

MG John P. McLaren had been slated to be the guest speaker for the evening, and introduction of the new Commander of the 80th Training Command, MG Bill Gerety, had been anticipated. However, due to the

COMMAND SERGEANT MAJOR Doris M. Wollett is the youngest of nine children and a native of Richmond, Virginia. She graduated from Varinia High School in 1969 and enlisted in the US Army Reserves in 1977. She was a WAC, but never served in an all female battalion. The Women's Army Corps was eliminated in 1978.

During her distinguished military career, CSM Wollett held numerous supervisory and key leadership positions in several Reserve units. Notably, she was the first female CSM of a Drill Sergeant Battalion. She served a year's deployment with the 80th in Iraq with the Multi-National Security Transition Command (MNSTC-I). She last served as CSM of 8-80th, 1st Brigade 80th Training Command (TASS), demonstrating dedication and commitment to leading Soldiers under her watch.

Her civilian and military education includes all levels of the Noncommissioned Officer Education System; the ARMY Instructor Trainer Course; Total Quality Leadership Program; US Army Sergeant Major Course; and various other professional development and leadership courses.

CSM Wollett's awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit; Bronze Star Medal; Meritorious Service Medal with 2d Oak-Leaf Cluster (OLC); Army Commendation Medal with 3d OLC; Army Achievement Medal with 2d OLC; Army Good Conduct Medal; Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal with 1 Silver and 3 Bronze OLC; National Defense Service Medal with 2d OLC; Iraq Campaign Medal 2d Bronze Star; Global War on Terrorism Service Medal; Army Armed Forces Reserve Medal w/ Gold Hourglass Device; Noncommissioned Officer Professional Development Medal with Numeral 4; Army Service Medal; Army Overseas Service Medal; and the Reserve Overseas Training Medal.

The owner of the farm, Daniel Houard, our battlefield archeologist friend from Luxembourg, Jean Muller, and I explored the aid station. Jean remarked that "your father was a lucky man," because there was a tremendous crater in the middle of the aid station.

Jean is the archeologist who established the final history of three of our 80th soldiers who were killed simultaneously by a mortar shell. He prepared and donated a shadow box of personal belongings to the family which he located at the scene. He is also the planner, architect, and will be the builder of the 80th Monument at Mertzig.

He and his family graciously hosted me in their home for a week, while we performed battlefield archeology. This included detecting and digging at two sites where Sherman tanks were exploded. We found pieces of a watch, a lieutenant's bar, a trigger from the Browning .30 cal. Machine gun, and most importantly, bone frag-

ments from the one unrecovered body. Jean is sending these to JAPAK in Hawaii for DNA confirmation.

We had the privilege of participating in the "Friends of Luxembourg" tour, which Virgil Myers so ably conducts as he has done for many years. This tour is a combination of viewing battlefield sites such as Bastogne and Chaumont, and places of historical interest such as those in Luxembourg City. In addition, there is much fine food, and most importantly, there is the bond between the people of Luxembourg and those soldiers of the 80th Division who liberated them from the Nazi terror.

Looking to the future, it may be possible to arrange a week of battlefield archeology with Jean before the next Luxembourg visit in June of 2012 if there is interest in doing so among our members. If you are seriously interested, please let me know.

His writing is great and traces the 80th from the beginning of the war to the end, when all of them left to return home. A great many of the places he mentions are very familiar to me since my husband had also been in that group, and many of the letters I have mention some of the same places. If any of you would like to read them, I can send them to you to read and then return to me.



I was in that bunch, ending up the war in Austria and then going to Czechoslovakia as the article stated. After fighting in three campaigns in Europe, at the end of hostilities, I was given the job of Supply Sgt for Co "L". I got back to the States in early January 1946. I'm past 91 now, but some memories are still strong.

DEAR ANDY:

Here is my remembrance of the 80th's move from Bavaria to Marionbad. I was 3rd squad leader (Staff Sqt.), 3rd platoon. During the summer of 1945, the 80th Infantry Division moved to Czechoslovakia before being rotated back to the States. They had helped defeat the Nazis in WW II. Having served just over a year in the service, I did not have enough points to return to the States with Company K, 317th Infantry Regiment in Marionbad, Czechoslovakia. We would parade in front of the Russian barracks one day and they would parade in front of ours the next. During the time in Czechoslovakia, Chaplain Prince, a Southern Baptist, would drive over from Pilzen on Wednesday evening to conduct a service. He called it his midweek prayer service. When the 80th returned to the States I was transferred to an Antiaircraft unit.

OUT OF THE PAST...

Only Moving Forward, The 80Th Crosses The Rhine

IT HAPPENED AT the end of March 1945; in my case, it was on March 29 when the 80th Infantry Division crossed the Rhine River from Mainz to Wiesbaden. The crossing stands out, I suggest, as an event worth remembering in the division's history.

Granted, this episode may have lacked great military significance. The Rhine had been crossed and a bridgehead established three weeks earlier, before the bridge's collapse by the 9th Armored Division via the Ludendorff Bridge at Remagen. Furthermore, the war in Europe was nearing its end with the German army in broad retreat on the Eastern, Western and Italian Fronts. Yet at least two reasons made our passage across the river important.

First, the Rhine had tremendous mythical and historical meaning to Germans. Ancient legends about it abounded. They included the story of the Lorelei, the maidens whose enchanting melodies lured passing mariners to their deaths on the rocks. The river was thought of as the symbolic boundary of the country, the barrier to hostile invasion. The patriotic song "Die Wacht am Rhein," ("The Watch on the Rhine"), featured in the film "Casablanca" had approached the status of a national anthem.

Furthermore, the crossing was no easy project. The river at that point is some 300 yards wide. No bridges remained. German resistance, to be sure, was waning, but it had not ceased.

By the time I reached the Rhine, the engineers had built a one-lane Bailey bridge across its entire width. The bridge was manned, to our astonishment, by sailors of the U. S. Navy. On each shore, huge machines poured out clouds of artificial fog to hide the bridge from enemy planes. The Allies had long since gained control of the air, but I remember well that individual Luftwaffe pilots still ventured out on strafing missions.

A machine gunner was stationed about every ten yards or so along the bridge. He fired at everything he saw (or thought he saw) floating down the river. The steady rattle of gunfire intensified the dramatic atmosphere of the crossing.

So far as I know, the 80th made it over the river without resistance. From that point on, the war for most (not all) of us was little more than a series of truck rides. Yet crossing the Rhine remains for me a vivid recollection of the campaign in the ETO.

bourg, the organization that honors American Veterans who liberated their communities. He then presented a certificate, a copy of the new banner and a replica of the WW I Doughboy statue to Cecelia Smith in recognition for services rendered to Association members and reunion activities in the recent years.

Secretary Adkins was then called to the Podium where upon he presented the new Post #50 charter to LTC Porter and welcomed the 80th Blue Ridge Army Reserve Association as the newest Post of the 80th Division Veterans Association.

The Color Guard was then asked to retire the Colors for the last time during this year's events.

The program was nearing a conclusion when the final raffle drawing was remembered. The final drawing resulted in a second win for Robert Moorhead and a ticket was drawn for Dr. Sproull, neither of whom was present. Their checks for \$250 each will be mailed to them.

At the end of the night, and although the entire reunion had been subdued, it was declared a successful meeting of the Veterans, their families and friends. 
