Historian's Report: 3rd Quarter

"HE HISTORIAN'S OFFICE remains busy as usual. We are continuing to respond to inquiries both from families of veterans and increasingly from collectors of artifacts who want to further enhance provenance for their collections.

We had the pleasure of meeting with our National Commander, Paul Stutts, and Vice Commander Brian Faulconer at the Roanoke Airport Sheraton Hotel in order to work on the planning for the August 2018 reunion. Everyone should remember that we are all contributing to the history of the 80th Division as we commemorate the memory of those who have passed.

We note that there are those within our group who have serious medical problems; we pray that God will be with them in this hour of trial.

I was very happy yesterday; a couple from Beckley, West Virginia drove to Roanoke to obtain information about the gentlemen's father. We were able to provide two unit pic-

tures of his father's company; one at Camp Lee and the other in France. We also were able to provide a transcribed partial diary from another member of his father's company, as well as the "History of the 317th Infantry". It is great to see people who are so interested in maintaining their family's military history with the 80th.

I have just received a letter with a few items which belonged to a WWI veteran who was gassed in France during WWI. Unfortunately, the letter reads, "there isn't anyone on this side of the family who is interested in these items, which I do not understand but young people are only interested in the here and now."

These two reactions are in today's world both understandable and expected.

We are looking forward to the reunion of August 2018; this will be our nearest reunion to the commemoration of one century of history since the Armistice of "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month 1918".

The 80th Training Command, Celebrating a Centennial Legacy

RANSITIONING FROM THE 80th Infantry Division to the 80th Airborne Division to the 80th Division (Institutional Training), the 80th Training Command (The Army School System) commemorates its 100th anniversary in 2017.

Evolving in more than just its name, the 80th TC continues to be a lethal, capable and combat ready Army Reserve unit that stands on the foundation of 100 years of dedication and service, starting with World War I.

Established in August 1917 at Camp Lee, now known as Fort Lee, the unit was given the nickname the "Blue Ridge Division" because of Soldiers who were primarily draftees were from Virginia, West Virginia and Pennsylvania. The Soldiers stood with mismatched uniforms with one distinct thing - a unit should patch with three blue mountain peaks affectionately representing the only states with the Blue Ridge Mountains.

"My dad served in WWI under the 80th. He started in 1917. He was wounded on April 4, 1918 when shrapnel hit him. He was eventually discharged in 1919," said Navy Capt. retired Lee S. Anthony, an 80th Division Veterans Association member and son of Pvt. Lee Hill Anthony, a WWI veteran.

His father's service in the Army and to the country propelled Anthony to take an active part in memorializing the 80th's involvement in WWI.

"I found stacks and stacks of papers from WWI, and I knew I had to do something with them. I gathered all the information and wrote a book that includes everything about the 80th's involvement in WWI. I even included a few pictures of my dad with my uncle who served in the Navy during WWI," added Anthony.

During World War I, the 80th Division, comprised of four regiments, two field artillery units, and one machine gun battalion, reached full strength with 23,000 Soldiers and distinguished themselves near the Artois sector with heavy action in the Somme Offensive of 1918 and in the Meuse-Argonne. During the Meuse Argonne campaign, the 80th Division was the only unit that saw action during each phase of the offensive for a total of three times.

Fast forward 100 years.

Soldiers, veterans, retirees and civilians from the 80th TC and the 80th Division Veterans Association gathered to celebrate the centennial anniversary of the agency that formed from the legacy of those men in 1917.

Maj. Gen. A.C. Roper, the commanding general of the 80th TC, at the time of the dinner, served as a guest speaker. He highlighted the importance of paying homage to the past and was honored to be a part of the 80th's legacy. "It's a perfect night to honor the past and the 100 years of service, and to talk about the present as we transform for the future," he said.

"It's the DNA of Soldiers like Pvt. Lee Hill Anthony who served with Company F, 317th Infantry Regiment, 80th Division who fought valiantly during WWI and was very well decorated by earning the Purple Heart, the Victory Medal with 3 battle clasps and a host of other awards.

"That DNA runs through this command today from WWI when Commander Cronkhite recognized his men with the statement, the 80th 'only moves forward.' That motto has been carried with the Division since 1918 and still prominently displayed in our headquarters."

Despite the 80th being deactivated at Camp Lee on June 26, 1919, the end of WWI did not mark the end of the 80th. The unit would once again support another major operation approximately 17 years later.

"I was drafted on August 9, 1944, and sent to Florida to complete my basic training. I was there through December of 1944 and not a month after my training, I was heading toward Liverpool," said Burt Marsh, a World War II Veteran assigned to Company M, 319th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division.

"I remember when we pulled out of port, I looked at the Statue of Liberty. My first thought was I would never see her again," Marsh added.

Although in his early 90s, Marsh vividly remembered his time serving during WWII. "The first of February 1945, I remember wading through water up to my knees in pitch black during the middle of the night. We tried to cross the river, but there was heavy artillery so we fell back. The next night we tried again and were successful," he said.

Marsh's years of service and multiple excursions to Germany and France were part of the 80th's mission in WWII. During this time, the Division landed at Normandy and fought its way across Northern France, Belgium and Germany. At the war's end, the 80th had served more than 277 days of combat and had captured 200,000 enemy troops.

During his speech, Roper gave special thanks to the five WWII Veterans in attendance and highlighted the importance of the unit continuing to focus on "only moving forward."

"As an Army, we must change. The enemies that threaten our Country has changed. Our way of life has changed. Technology has changed. We must be more efficient than ever before. The 80th has changed through the years. 100 years, and it continues to change and transform. Embrace change," Roper added.

Even though the Division transitioned to the 80th Training Command in October 2008, the unit continues to uphold the lineage of support in contingency operations from the 80th Division.

Two of the 80th units were called to service in support of Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm. In 1990, the 424th Truck Company deployed to Kuwait and Iraq, and the 3-318th Infantry One Station Unit Training was mobilized at Fort Eustis, Va., to train Individual Ready Reserve Soldiers for onward movement.

The 80th also supported Operation Enduring Freedom in 2004 by deploying 29 Soldiers to setup Institutional training programs for the Afghan Army for Quartermaster, Ordinance, Engineers and Transportation military occupational specialties in Afghanistan. A year later more than 750 80th Soldiers mobilized and deployed to

Iraq in support of Operational Iraqi Freedom, the largest deployment of 80th Division Soldiers since WWII.

"From WWI to WWII and through all of our Nation's battles and even today in the Middle East, we have Soldiers that are serving. The 80th is always providing well trained and ready forces to defend our Nation's way of life," Roper said.

Today, the 80th Training Command (TASS) trains multi-component Soldiers in 12 career military fields for combat support and combat service support, including engineering, health services, supply, and information operations.

The 80th TC consists of three training division multiple brigades, battalions, training centers, regional and hightech training sites, noncommissioned officer academies, a training relationship with a unit in Hawaii and a support relationship with a unit in Germany.

Over the past century, the Soldiers of the 80th Division earned more than 1,144 medals and citations including 31 Purple Hearts, 469 Bronze Stars, 84 Combat Infantry Badges and 187 Combat Action Badges.

"Excellence comes out of the little things, and the little things make big things. Leaders must lead by example. The Soldiers of the 80th have excelled in battle and they've excelled in peace," said Roper. "The 80th has left an enduring legacy that continues ... today."






















Charles Faulconer, Sr: WWII Veterans Celebrate 80th Division's Centennial

ALKING THROUGH A pasture he'd first encountered more than 60 years earlier, Charles Faulconer Sr. paused, looked at a nearby German village, and turned to face a hill.

"This is it," he told his family members in 2011, pointing up the hill. "My foxhole was right up there."

With the help of his family, Faulconer, a 91-year-old World War II veteran who fought in the Battle of the Bulge, soon found his former foxhole near the Luxembourg-Germany border. Faulconer had dug the trench in the midst of a downpour, digging parallel to the frontline to help shield himself from the elements. Doing this was against Army regulations, but it did make the foxhole easier to locate decades later: his was

the only one running that direction. This story was one of many recounted two weeks ago as part of the centennial celebration of the United States Army's 80th Division. Organized by the 80th Division Veterans Association and held at the Midlothian DoubleTree hotel, the event honored those who have served with the 80th since it was established 100 years ago.

Founded as the 80th Infantry Division at what is now Fort Lee, the unit conscripted draftees from the mid-Atlantic states during World War I, earning it the nickname the "Blue Ridge Division." Through the years, the 80th has undergone inactivations, reactivations and reassignments, including for training and combat support. Today, the unit is the 80th Training Command, instructing soldiers for combat support and combat service from its headquarters in Chesterfield.

Shortly after the close of World War I, the 80th Infantry Division Veterans Association was formed, holding annual reunions every year since. While initially intended for veterans, today the association includes many family members of those who served with the 80th.

One such person is Bill Futch, a Chesterfield resident whose brother Archer fought with the 80th Division in World War II. Futch says he attends the reunions to remember his brother, who passed away two years ago.



"I felt like this was a tribute to him," said Futch, who served with the 40th Infantry Division in the Korean War. "I grew up during World War II. I was 17 when the war ended."

Attendee Lee Anthony's father served with the 80th Division during World War I and was wounded in France.

"Because of his service, I have been working with the 80th Division Veterans Association since the early 1990s," said Anthony, a past national commander of the veterans' association and a retired U.S. Naval Reservist who lives in Salem. "It's so important [for] our country to know what sacrifices have been made so that we could have liberty and continue to be free."

Faulconer saw his share of hardship during the Battle of the Bulge, the last major German offensive on the Western Front during the war. Arriving in France in January 1945, Faulconer endured freezing conditions, snow up to his knees and "Screaming Mimis," the Allied nickname for howling Nebelwerfer mortars used by the Nazis in the war. Even the vegetation Faulconer encountered was troublesome, becoming mushy and getting stuck in his shoestrings.

Charles Faulconer, Sr... continued

After an early morning crossing of the Our River by boat, Faulconer entered the town of Wallendorf when an explosion went off, pelting him with shrapnel.

"I got hit nine places, in my hand and my knee, and both [leg] tendons," said Faulconer, a native of Monroe, Virginia. "I was bedridden for over four months."

Faulconer was taken to an American hospital in Bar-le-Duc, France, before being transported to Paris and London to recuperate.

"I was in England on [Victory in Europe] Day, but I couldn't celebrate 'cause I was still bedridden," Faulconer said.

For his actions, Faulconer received the Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart and, last year, the French Legion of Honour, the highest decoration awarded in France. After the war, he went on to become postmaster of Monroe for 26 years.

Men of Faulconer's generation are fewer than they once were, with only five World War II veterans attending the reunion this year. To continue the traditions of the reunion, the association has begun courting veterans of the 80th who have served more recently, including in the Gulf War and the Global War on Terror. At a commemorative dinner on Sept. 16, 231 people attended, including several retired generals.


"We're putting the legacy of the 80th Division with the people who are living the future legacy of the 80th Division," said Paul Stutts, current national commander of the veterans association. "We're beginning to pass the torch."




Good War, Great Men.

The 313th Machine Gun Battalion of World War I

As our Nation commemorates the Centennial of World War One, a new book has been released about a machine gun battalion attached to the 80th Division during the Great War. Author Andrew J. Capets has compiled the history of the 313th Machine Gun Battalion through previously unpublished letters and journals of over a dozen members of this unit. Their story is told from the soldier's writings with historical insights provided by the author. The miserable days of long marches, muddy trenches and soaking wet uniforms were common. Being able to laugh through the misery, sharing a bottle of French wine, finding a swimming hole for the men, or sleeping in late under the warmth of the sun occasionally made it a good war.

Author Andrew J. Capets is a Lifetime Member of the 80th Division Veterans Association. He is the grandson of Private Andrew A. Capets, a former member of the 313th Machine Gun Battalion, 80th Division, A.E.F. 

"Now, I'll talk in a slow Texas drawl so's they don't know we is from Alabama."






