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

Flag Protection Amendment

(S. J. Res 40)

As I had given a brief report at the National Business Meeting in Harrisburg, PA., I felt it would be in the beat interest of all our members to give a brief synopsis for those who were not in attendance;

Nine years ago, by a vote of 371 vs 43 in the House of representatives and 91 vs 9 in the Senate, Congress passed "The Flag Protection Act of 1989." Later that year the Supreme Court decision (Texas vs Johnson) ruled and struck down federal and state flag protection laws in 1989. The Supreme Court followed suit the following year and ruled the Flag Protection Act of 1989 was also unconstitutional. In no uncertain terms the flag from desecration violated the First Amendment guarantee of freedom of speech. Further, the court strongly implied that no statute could be crafted to coexist with the First Amendment, because desecrating the flag represented a ligament point of view that deserved constitutional protection.

Last year the House of representatives passed a bill prohibiting desecration of the flag by an overwhelming vote of 310 vs 114.

Senator Orrin Hatch (R-Utah) and Max Cleveland (D-Georgia) introduced Senate Joint Resolution 40 on February 4, this year that would grant Congress the "power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the "United States". If the resolution passes the Senate with at least a two-thirds majority, it would then be

sent to the various state legislatures for ratification. A similar amendment failed to pass in 1995 by three (3) votes 64 vs 36. Senate will need 67 votes in favor to pass. PLEASE, contact your Senators by phone, or mail to express your voice for a "YES" vote.

If passed by the Senate - it would then be sent to the various state legislatures for ratification. These fourths, or 38, of the States must then approve the amendment for it to become law.

The above was taken from various articles in the various veterans magazines. In July 1998 issue of the American Legion magazine there was a breakdown of those Senators who support, and some who have not made a commitment.

Out of the Past...

How optimism and hope for a new break through by the American army could be sustained despite such sacrifices to the autumn's hardships is partially explained by the subsequent performance of Wood's division. Even without Wood, even after the long weeks of fighting in the vanguard that had left its men and machines as much in need of rest as its old leader, the 4th Armored persisted. When December came, most of the General Eddy's XII Corps paused to take a breath-but the 4th Armored did not relent in its exploitation of the defeat of the Panzer Lehr counterattack, seeking to drive into and beyond Sarre-Union, across the ground over which Bayerlein's panzers had advanced. Together with the 101st Regiment of the 26th Division on its left, CCB fought its way into Sarre-Union on 1 December. It drove back the 25th Panzer Grenadier Division despite a stiffening of tanks from both Panzer Lehr and the 11th Panzer Division. Through the battle for the industrial town seesawed for a while-the Germans rolled in again on 2 December and the 104th Infantry had committed to the battle-as soon as the place was secure, on 4 December General Gaffey sent CCA thrusting northward again. His next objective was Rohrbach-les-Bitche, a road junction behind the German positions farther west facing the bulk of the XXII Corps, and also astride the line of retreat of the Germans facing southward against the XV Corps of the Seventh Army.

At the village of Binning, on the main road from Sarre-Union to Rohrbach, the Germans proved to have massed more than enough artillery to discourage assault. The ground as usual, was too soft for tanks to move cross country, so Abe Abrams, again commanding the advance, shifted to a secondary road a little to the west, approaching Rohrbach through the village of Singling and thereby outflanking Bining, Gaffey directed CCB toward Singling as well. When Abrams opened the attack against the latter village, on the morning of 6 December, he soon found himself stymied yet again, by a combination of the Bitche complex of the Maginot Line and German artillery on hills to the north, plus tanks and assault gunsfixed and mobile defenses formidably coordinated. At nightfall American tanks and armored infantry fought into the village, but enemy guns made their position intolerable. Most leaders and formations would have subsided before this parade of frustrations; Abrams and the 4th Armored were different. Amidst a noisy furor of battle at Singling, a company of light tanks with an attached segment of the Yankee Division's 328th Infantry sidled off to Bining and captured it by indirection after all. The 4th Armored therefore departed for rest and refitting, but it had opened a path for its replacement. Roderick Allen's new 12th Armored, to drive into Rohrbach on 10 December.

The effect was to hasten a general enemy withdrawal before a renewed XII Corps offensive begun on 4 December, and thus to strengthen the American impres-

sion that strain and casualties of the past two month might be about to pay dividends. Baade's 35th Division in the corps center had led off without artillery preparation, followed by Grow's 6th Armored and McBride's 80th Infantry farther west with a preparatory blasting by the guns. The immediate aim was to cross the Sarre River and, in the process, to capture the industrial city of Sarrequemines, which straddles the river. Surprise in the center and artillery preparation on the left were equally effective, no doubt because the opposition, the 17th SS Panzer Grenadier Division, had been drained since Normandy beyond even the capacity of German leadership to rehabilitate it without prolonged rest and retraining. While McBride's 80th Infantry captured high ground around Farebersviller on the corps flank, both Grow's 6th Armored and Baade's 35th closed up to the Sarre by the end of 6 December. Predictably, house-to-house fighting in Sarreguemines presented the most difficult problems of the attack; but it was less to clear the western portion of the city than to allow Paul's 26th Division to disentangle itself from Sarre-Union and close up on Baade's right that the advance paused at the river.

The 35th and 26th attacked in tandem before sunrise on 8 December, the 35th readily crossing the Saar, General Paul's division pressing into a sector of the Maginot Line. The standard, almost immediately counterattack against the 35th, conducted by tanks and armored infantry of the 11th Panzer Division, took so harsh

a battering with the help of artillery from the Saar's west bank that in Army Group G, the enemy henceforth felt obliged to modify a nearly sacrosanct article of his doctrine. General Balck ordered that hereafter, counterattacks should be launch only at twilight, during the night, in fog or bad weather, or from the concealment of woods. American artillery should be afforded no opportunity to break up the counterattacks before they

were fairly formed.

In spite of snow and sleet, for four days the 35th Division struggled onward from the Saar River to the Blies. During the same days the Yankee Division penetrated and passed the Maginot Line, assisted by the scouring of Rohrbach by the 12th Armored. Though the 26th Division had not been in the line as long as the 35th, the autumn campaign in Lorraine had imposed on it a hard initiation into the war, and army and corps headquarters believed that Paul's troops ought to join the 4th Armored in refitting. After most of the division had gone back to Metz, the 328th Infantry remained in the battle long enough to inscribe the crossing of the German frontier into the division journal on the night of 12-13 December.

The Blies River proved a tougher barrier against Baade's 35th Division than the Saar, partly because its relatively high east

less won a bridgehead on the east shore on 12 December, but then it had to fight a battle for the town of Habkirchen so severe that the contest cost the 134th Infantry more than half its combat strength. Soldiers of the 35th Division soon came to believe, furthermore, that not only the presence of Wietersheim's Ghost Division but also the reaching of the internation frontier and the challenge of defending Germany's home soil accounted for the harder going beyond the Blies. Still, by 16 December the 35th Division and Major General Frank L. Culin, Jr's new 87th had carried the XII Corps to the outworks of the West Wall, and the opposing German lines betrayed evidence of a promising thinness. Patton's other corps, Walker's XX, was by then well established in the outer works of the West Wall. From the corp's first small encroachment into the West Wall,

when General Twaddle's 95th Division captured the two bunkers facing the Saarlautern bridge, the 95th had gone on to serious grappling with numerous bunkers and pillboxes that crowed the northern suburbs of Saarlautern.

At the morning briefing at third Army headquarters on 17 December, Patton invited Colonel Maddox to speak his mind freely about the proper course of action. Maddox proposed not a Third Army turn northward but an accelerated push eastward, into the rear of the German's in the Ardennes. Then.

he believed, Patton could break into the enemy's lines of communication and trap Rundstedt's main forces west of the Rhine. Patton agreed, but he said the plan would be too daring for the higher command. "My guess is that our offensive will be called off and we will have to go up there and save their hides."

It was 1030 the next morning 18 December that Bradley telephoned Patton and ask him to come to Eagle Tac with his G-2, G-3 and G-4 as soon as possible. Within ten minutes, Patton, Koch, Maddox, and Walter J. Muller were driving out of Nancy. At Eagle Tac in the Luxembourg state railway building. Bradley's G-2 staff displayed its situation map estimating as many as seven panzer divisions might already be charging into the Ardennes. Deferentially, with evident expectation of an explosion from his headstrong subordinate, Bradley suggested that much of the Third Army would have to follow the 10th Armored Division northward to deal with such an enemy force. To Bradley's relief. Patton by now had prepared himself for this design and reconciled himself to it. He would preferred to go on his own offensive, he said, "But what the hell, we'll still be killing Krauts."

Patton announced he would halt the 4th Armored immediately and concentrate it near Longwy starting at midnight. The 80th Infantry Division could set out for Luxembourg in the morning of 19 December. The 26th Division could be alerted to move in twenty-four hours. In fact, as soon as he left the conference, Patton telephoned Gay to stop the 4th Armored Division and the 80th in their tracks

and ready them for the northward turn. Gay should also brief Major General John Millikin of the newly arrived III Corps to prepare him to Command the movement.

On Tuesday morning at seven Patton and his staff met Millikin, Eddy of the XII Corps, and the VII Corps artillery chief to outline his plans for using the 4th Armored, 80th Infantry, and the 26th under III Corps headquarters, along with the VIII Corps which he assumed would be assigned to him, in an attack to rupture the southern flank of the German counteroffensive. He intended to drive, he said, along two of three possible axes-from the vicinity of Diekirch due north, from the vicinity of Arlon north to Bastogne, from the vicinity of Neufchateau north against the western nose of the German salient. He wanted to meet with Eisenhower at Eagle Main, Patton left a code name for each axis with Gay. The commanders were ready to move according to whichever code or codes he telephoned back from Verdun.
