# HELP!!

Dear Robert Murrell,

What a thrill it was this afternoon to talk with someone like you who was so nearby when I was liberated. Whether or not I am able to learn the Regiment, Battalion, or whatever sized unit it was that liberated meand locate one or two of the men that were there with me in those joyous days so long ago, just finding you has given me a great deal of comfort. As I told you on the phone, I only knew that my liberators were in the 3rd Army, and that the soldier that I had the most contact with was a Lt. J. O. Tripp - nothing more. It had snowed heavily for a short time early on that Thursday morning in Ried. Austria, but it had mostly cleared off around noon. As I told you I was a tail gunner on a B-24 bomber that had been shot down in early December, '44, and was the only American or Allied POW being held in an abandoned brick factory on 'high ground' about 250 yards from the main part of town. With me were about 50 Russian POW's and just after dawn a couple of the Ruskies came running through the building saying they had just seen American tanks 'skirting or spearheading around Ried without encountering any resistance whatsoever and heading toward the East. After hearing about the tanks (presumably from their own people) the old German guards offered to give us their rifles thinking the war was now over. However, while these guards were waiting for us to take their guns, a squad of SS men walked into the building with their machine pistols "

held at the ready" and said if any further effort was made by the guards to surrender, they would shoot everyone. So nothing happened until around 2:30 pm, when I began to hear loud automatic gunfire coming from the direction of the main part of the town. After only a very few minutes, the firing slacked off and then two P-51 Mustangs came in at fencetop level and shortly after that there was no more gunfire as white sheets were seen from my location all over town. During those almost two days I was with these men I developed a feeling of closeness just about like I had with my fellow crew members on our bomber--so you can see why I want to contact some of them if any are around and can remember these long ago events. I forgot to say that the men said they had been ambushed by a small force of SS men and Hitler Youth firing behind tombstones in a cemetery just outside Ried as they attempted to enter the town. Well, I didn't mean to get this 'wound up'. So thanks for whatever you can find out. Do you think there is any possibility that it might have been part of the 65th motorized Infantry Division that crossed the Inn river May 2nd at Scharding a few miles north of Branau and continued Eastward (according to the book, "Patton's Third Army Chronology" day by day account??

## **More Memories of Mousson Hill**

As we approached the town of Pont a Mousson under heavy artillery fire, we were told to take cover in the basement of a house in the town. After a few hours, we were called out of the houses under heavy artillery fire to help the Engineers carry the assault boats to the river. We were to become the first wave. As we hit the far bank of the river, we hit the dirt and dug slit trenches while waiting for the second wave which never came.

As the barrage on the town increased in ferocity, the rest of Company L pulled back. When we knew we were not going to be reinforced, some of us were going to swim back to the other side of the

river. Since some could not swim, we elected to stay.

The Germans countered attacked and overran our positions. We suffered heavy casualties. Some were killed and some. like myself, were wounded. The Germans marched us up the hill to a barn. Our troops saw movement on the hill and thought we were Germans and shelled us killing and wounding some G. I.s. We were moved back behind the German lines. We were placed on trains where we were strafed and bombed on our way to Frankurt. From there, we were sent to Stalag 7A in Mooseburg, Germany where I spent almost nine months before being liberated by General Patton who rode through the camp on a tank. What a beautiful sight.

# 80th Infantry Division in WWII

Recognized by the Army of the United States as one of the crack divisions in General Dwight D. Eisenhower's "Crusade in Europe," the 80th was known as the "workhorse" infantry division of Lt. General George Patton's swashbuckling Third Army.

All but one long week of the 80th (Blue Ridge) Infantry Division's 274 combat days were spent in "Blood and Guts" Patton's Army.

The exception was when the American and British Armies trapped the German Seventh Army and destroyed much of that enemy army in closing the Argentan-Falaise Gap in a long and bloody week. In this long week, the 80th was in the First Army and received its major baptism of fire liberating the French town, Argentan, from the Germans.

The 80th was praised by the commander of the V Corps in which it served in the Argentan-Falaise Gap, then Maj. General Leonard Gerow, who later became the three-star commander of the 15th Army, organized late in the war.

Several days after the 80th's victory at Argentan, the division, whose motto was "The 80th Only Moves Forward," rejoined Patton's Army in its historic drive across France, often being the point of Patton's racing columns and working much of the time in tandem with the fabulous Fourth Armored Division. To the east of Paris, Chalonssur-Marne, Bar-le-Duc, and St. Mihiel, of World War I fame, all were

liberated in short order by the 80th of War II.

But, soon a diversion of Gasoline by Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Forces to troops north of the Third Army slowed Third Army. As a result, Patton's armored and infantry division could not continue to leapfrog one another, as they had been doing, American Blitzkrieg style, capturing roadnets, tearing the guts out of the enemy.

A Moselle River crossing soon proved extremely costly to the 80th, particularly to one of the 80th's three regiments, the 317th Infantry.

The 80th 319th Infantry successfully established a crossing of the Moselle at Toul, south of the 317th and 318th Infantries, then joined in the horrendous fight going on between the 317th and 318th versus the Germans from the city of Pont-a-Mousson and to its south.

Within several weeks, the French rains came. They came and came to flood all area streams. The rains never ceased for long during the next several months. And much of the time, in the mud, American armor bogged down. On top of that, Hitler put an expert in tank warfare over the Nazi forces waging a campaign of attrition against the Third Army. He was general of the Panzer Troops Hermann Balck. Balck's rank was that of Colonel General in the German Army.

Most 80th Division men who fought in this infantry slugfest during September, October, November and early December 1944 in Alsace-Lorraine and who also were still

living to fight in the Battle of the Bulge in Luxembourg in December 1944 and through late January 1945 have contented the Lorraine Campaign was the worst of all four campaigns of the 80th Division, even worst than the bone-chilling Ardennes (Battle of the Bulge) Campaign.

Months later in early May 1945, after the 80th had finished its role in the Battle of the Bulge, subsequently had broken through the Sieafried Line two times so two different American armored divisions could rush through it, had crossed the Main and Rhine rivers against opposition. had defeated the enemy at Kassel. Erfurt, Gera and Jena, overrunning the city of Weimar and nearby Buchenwald Concentration Camp in the process, and liberating Ebensee Concentration Camp in the Austrian Alps, the war was coming to an end. and troops of the Soviet Union from the east were in hot pursuit of the German forces in Austria, and the 80th was the Allied division which was attacking to the southeast in the Austrian Alps.

The same Col. Gen. Balck, who had conducted Hitler's horror-filled war of attrition against the American Army east of the Moselle in French Lorraine, was now on that Austrian scene as the top officer over two German armies, the sixth SS Panzer Army and the Sixth Wehmacht (non-SS) Army, both now being attacked from their east.

Balck is reported to have told his two armies that he now was going to surrender to the Americans and his troops had the option of surrendering to the Americans or to the advancing Soviets. About 60,000 SS Officers and enlisted-grade personnel surrendered to the 80th at the same time. Nobody has ever reported that any of Balck's troops waited for the advancing Soviet to take them prisoner.

The SS came in on armored motor transportation on one highway and the ordinary German Army officers and enlisted grade personnel came in on another highway on horse-drawn transportation. One reason the 80th is credited with 212, 295 prisoners-of-war is due to the surrender of these two field armies. Even without them, the division's prisoner-of-war counts in earlier combat operations was a most impressive number.

At this 80th Division Veterans Association's 81st Annual Reunion (The World War I, 80th Division was called upon three times in the great Meuse-Argonne Offensive and was ranked first among National Army Divisions by the War Department). there were more than 300 people attending, including wives, children and grandchildren of its World War II Veterans. The youngest of the veterans will be about 74. The eldest division veteran to attend is the chief chaplain of the 80th Division in World War II, is now in his 90's. Younger comrades of this highcasualty division--which had 17.087 battle casualties with 3,500 killed in action or who died of wounds inflicted by the enemy in nine months--like to say, "This chaplain was protected by the armor of God." The foregoing article was written by Col. Lou Engelke who served as a first lieutenant in the 80th Infantry Division Military Police Platoon in all four of its World War II Campaigns.

# WORLD WAR ONE MEUSE-ARGONNE OFFENSIVE

(Summary)

Originally designed to be an "isolated attack" by the British troops along the Somme River, to be followed by an American push on Meziers, over time the plan to capture a German stronghold turned into a plan for a "massive attack" by the Allied forces. From September 26, 1918 until the armistice on November 11, 1918. more than 120,000 allied soldiers on a front of 64 kilometers had engaged and decisively beaten 47 different German divisions. The allied force suffered 26,277 killed and 95,786 wounded, compared to the 130,000 German soldiers who were killed to wounded and another 26,000 German prisoners captured.

Altogether, the Meuse-Argonne offensive was the greatest American battle of World War One.
