The following is a report from Dr. Lee S. Anthony who visited the battlefield of World War One. whose father was a WW I Veteran and a member of our Association.

By way of reporting on my recent activities, let me say that I am truly honored to serve as the 80th

Division representative to that area of France in which the "Blue Ridge" soldiers fought, were wounded and died during October-November of 1918. I note that the 80th Division also covered Eastern France in WW II.

As part of my activities, I obtained eight nylon U.S. flags, measuring 5"X8", from a source on the internet; a company in Texas. Our local U.S. representative's office was not able to supply these flags, which were to be flown over the U.S. Capital in September as "no flags were available".

A presentation certificate was printed for each flag. (In English and French) I was met at CDG Airport in France by a retired Phy-

sician, Dr. Licien Houllermare, and the mayor of Fleville, M. Damien Georges. They had driven for three hours to get to the airport, and then we three drove to Chatel-Chehery, where quarters were waiting for me at the Chateau. The chateau was operated by the HUET family, Simone and Jacques. They had pictures of the damage to the chateau during WW I, and stories of the underground shelter.

Dr. Lucien Houllermare and his wife were most hospitable. They had me up to their house once or twice a day for coffee and breakfast and/or dinner, almost totally using produce from their garden. Lucien was kind enough to give me both walking and auto tours of the surrounding country. The walking tour was a rather thorough across the Sqt. York battlefield in which he and his son killed 25 enemy soldiers, Captured a number of machine guns (probably about ten), and 132 prisoners, A monument is erected to Sgt. York and is in front of the Chatel-Chehery mairie.

The auto tours included a trip to the location of Major Whittlesy's "Lost Battalion" of the 77th Infantry Division. We also went on to a German cemetery near Nantillois. The presentation schedule is as follows:

In addition to the French, we had a retired French Two-star General at most of the ceremonies. The U.S. Army provided the commanding General of the 5th Corps,

as well as the 1st Division Color Guard, rifle squad, bugler, and the divisional Sgt. Major, all transported from basis bases in Germany.

We also had a contingent of four Army Officers from Fort Leaven worth, KS, headed by LTC Taylor V. Beattie. Col. Beatty had visited the Sgt. York area 9 times, and writes (Professionally) of the Sgt. York and the "Lost Battalion" episodes. Also fro Ft. Levenworth were Major Carl Hughs, Major Terry Connelly, and Major Dick Cole.

We met Frederick Caster, Curator of the future Meuse-Argonne museum. M. Casters' girlfriend, Lisa M. Budreau of St. Anthony's College, Oxford, U.K., is the coordinator of the American We saw Superintendent Phil Rivers of the American Cemetery at Romaign, whose ceremonies at the cemetery went extremely well. The assistant to Super. Rivers is Graig Rahanian, who has a very impressive background with the military. His wife, Lora, is a truly outstanding individual, whose intellect, warmth, charm and "Savoir-faire" cannot be exceeded. Craig and Lora had the "group of five" over to their quarters for two most enjoyable visits.

I will emphasize this trip was cold. Neither the Army types nor I wore overcoats. Therefore we were standing in the weather whose temperature was 0 degrees Celsius, with winds kicking up to 30 miles per hour. I cheated by wearing sweaters beneath my uniform. (It still fits.)

McBride Scholarship Fund

At the business meeting of the Association held in Hampton, VA this year, it was brought out, that we have enough money in the fund, to carry the annual scholarships, another 14 years (including the interest during those years).

When you think the U.S. isn't thought well of all over the world, read this editorial from a Romanian Newspaper.

AN ODE TO AMERICA

Why are Americans so united? They don't resemble one another even if you paint them! They speak all the languages of the world and from an astonishing mixture of civilizations. Some of them are nearly extinct, others are incompatible with one another, and in matters of religious beliefs, not even God can count how many they are.

Still, the American tragedy turned three million people into a hand put on the heart. Nobody rushed to accuse the White House, the army, the secret services that they only a bunch of losers. Nobody rushed to empty their bank accounts. Nobody rushed the streets nearby to gape about. The Americans volunteered to donate blood and to give a helping hand. After the first moments of panic, they raised the flag on the smoking ruins, putting on T-shirts, caps and ties in the color of the national flag. They placed flags on buildings and cars as if in every place and on every car a minister or president was passing. On every occasion they started singing their traditional song: "God Bless America!" Silent as a rock, I watched the charity broadcast on Saturday once, twice, three times, on different TV channels. There was Clint Eastwood, Willie Nelson, Robert de Niro, Julia Roberts, Cassius Clay, Jack Nicholson, Bruce Springsteen, Silvester Stalone, James Wood, and many others whom no film or producer could ever bring together. The American's solidarity spirit turned them into a choir. Actually, choir is not the word. What you could hear was the heavy artillery of the American soul. What neither George W. Bush, nor Bill Clinton, nor Colin Powell could say without facing the risk of stumbling over words and sounds, was being heard in a great and unmistakable way in this charity concert.

I don't know how it happened that all this obsessive singing didn't sound croaky, nationalist, or ostentations! It made you green with envy because you weren't able to sing for your country without the risk of being considered chauvinist, ridiculous, or suspected of whoknows-what mean interest.

I watched the live broadcast and the rerun for hours listening to the story of the guy who went down one hundred floors with a woman in a wheelchair without knowing who she was, or of the Californian hockey player, who fought with the terrorists and prevented the plane from hitting that which would have killed other hundreds or thousands of people. How on earth were they able to bow before a fellow human?

For the Battle of the Bulge Veterans, Christmas Has a Different Effect.

This is a little late but I feel it still has the interest that we all can relate to. Thanks goes to Jim Phillips for sending it in.

My wife and I were strolling through the malls and heard the Christmas music and saw many busy shoppers and excited faces.

For thousands of veterans like me the Christmas season brings back heartbreaking memories of the past.

Fifty-seven years ago at Christmas time, we were about to enter the "Jaws of Hell" that would scar our lives forever. We don't think of the snow forts we built as children or the fun we had playing in the snow.

For me and thousands of veterans of the Battle of the Bulge in 1944, we had to exist in the snowcovered fields in Belgium and Luxembourg. It was one of the worst winters in European history. The casualties were double the casualties of the Civil War, counting both sides. To see my friends in pain and dying, to see frozen bodies of dead GI's piled up to be taken to God knows where is hard to forget. They will never see another snowfall or sleep in a warm bed. For many of those who survived, they get little comfort or understanding.

When I see a big, beautiful spruce tree, in my mind I look for snipers. You can never forget the whine of bullets or the screaming or the sounds of shells exploding or the night you tried to rest or sleep in a foxhole in the bitter cold, while losing control of your bowels. This is the price you pay for being one of the lucky ones.

Our minds are not what they used to be, and we say and do things that sometimes are not understood this time of year.

Many of our service people this Christmas are in harms way and have a heavy heart. Those who are lucky enough to come home will have memories they will have to live with for the rest of their lives. Tucker Miller Harrisburg
