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Commander's REPORT

As I write this article, we have just finished unpacking after a trip to eastern Germany. As I stated in the winter issue of the "Blue Ridge," we joined a group of veterans of the 76th Infantry Division and 6th Armored Division on this trip. Unfortunately only Bob Harmon, from Seattle, WA (formerly AT Co 319th) joined Ida and me to represent the 80th Division. The 76th Division had 10 people (six veterans and four dependents) and the 6th Armored had seven people (four veterans and three wives). It appears that a number of interested travelers cancelled because of the war in Iraq, and the attitude of the German government about the war.

Actually, with the exception of one incident we encountered only the greatest of hospitality and friendship in each place we visited. The exception was the village of Troistedt, where the mayor's wife (a Dr. Lenzer) delivered a prepared anti-war speech. (Not an anti-American speech), in front of an 80th Division Memorial. Yours truly delivered an answer along the line, that Americans in general don't like war any more than anyone, but sometime feel compelled to face up to an evil dictator, just like we did in WWII. If we didn't who know were the good people of Troistedt, or the inmates of nearby Buchenwald would be. The incident ended on a friendly note and better understanding of our people.

Better understanding was the purpose of the whole trip. The veterans were US Ambassadors to promote German-American relations. The US Army, Europe, specifically



the US 1st Division, acted as our host and followed the group. M.G. Jones, the Commanding General of the 1st Division greeted us in Frankfurt on our arrival. He assigned a Full Colonel to accompany the group all the way. In addition three medics were assigned, a bugler for ceremonies, a chaplain for Palm Sunday services and others from the US Army as needed. The public relations effort was a huge success.

I won't bore you with the details of each stop through Thuringia. We were joined by the U.S. Consul General, at Leipzig Mr. Burton, the President of the Thuringia State Parliament, and the Lord Mayors of the various cities visited, German military brass and the usual number of politicians. Each one anxious to make speeches in German and English. Representatives of the press, newspapers, radio and TV constantly pursued us. Of course there were meetings with local citizens. The veterans and their families conducted themselves in an exemplary manner, like great ambassadors. Ida and I had a great time and are proud to have represented each one of you at this PR exercise.

Sometimes We Must Blow Our Own Horn

One of the traveling exhibits shown during our recent trip to Germany described the collapse of the German Wehrmacht under the Allies attack in Thuringia. The exhibit emphasized action by the 76th Division and the 6th Armored Division, but ignored the 80th Division. I spoke to the producer of the exhibit, who seemed amenable to correct the oversight if given the necessary information.

I have sent the following letter to the producer: Mr. Ulrich Koch / Athene TV 10409 Berlin, Germany

Dear Mr. Ulrich:

Your exhibit about the liberation of Thuringia by the US Forces was very interesting. It obviously concentrated on the actions of the 76th ID and the 6th AD. However there were many other key units fighting in Thuringia, such as the 80th ID. As a former member of the 80th, I was disappointed by the absence of any mention of my division.

To put the operational picture into perspective, the 80th ID saw more action than most other units in the European Theater as borne out by published casualty figures. Specifically, the 80th ID suffered 15,964 casualties, as compared to the 76th ID with 2,334 casualties, and the 6th AD with 4,656 casualties, Because of my division's significant involvement, I believe the 80th deserves a major part in your exhibit.

I have included 12 pages from the 80th Division Operational History "From Gotha to Erfurt to Chemnitz" I hope the enclosed data will help you to correct the oversight. If you need additional information, please contact me, or Robert T. Murrell, the Secretary of our Veterans Association, who compiled the enclosed data. Sincerely, Eric Relinger

From Burl Mansberger Co B 318-80th Div 343 Woodbridge Lane Jericho, NY 11753-2628

Dec 22 1944 I was assigned to be POINT (Naturally, I was the newest replacement) going up a hill above Ettelbruck. We reached the top of the hill and were pinned down. We got orders to attack Ettelbruck. Company B moved with such speed etc. while we were running down the freaking hill, many soldiers were hit then. We reached the end of town, a machine shop on the right and houses on the left. I was assigned with a Bazooka Man to set up a roadblock a few houses in on the left.

During the night German Tanks came up the block, (road). I had set up a dresser mirror so I could see without being in line of fire. The tanks treads were muffled as well as their exhaust. Soldiers were alongside the tanks.

When the lead tank reached the house we were in I took the Bazooka and stepped out on the stoop and fired. The tank was not destroyed but the column retreated.

We stayed there till Morning when I found I was wounded in the left wrist. My wristwatch was split in two pieces. I was evacuated to Etampes, a hospital Near Paris.

That is just a first hand story of my experience at the battle of the bulge. Sincerely, Burl Mansberger

...sorry, its difficult for me to write. Christopher J. Anderson has been a good friend of mine over the years. He is the editor of WW II Magazine. He told me several days before the article of Walter E. Barnes B-318 of the 80th was to appear and sent me a copy. He was kind enough to dedicate The Fall of Fortress Europe to me, which he wrote.

Dempsey J. Prappas of AT-319 1302 Harold Houston, TX 77006 writes:

As a World War II veteran I watched the news of the men and women being KIA in the Iraqi war by friendly fire, and it brought back vivid memories of 59 years ago in France, of a comrade from South Haven who died in a similar way.

The comrade was Melvin M. Beckwith whose death along with two other soldier buddies, have haunted me all these years. I was wounded on Sept 13, 1944 by two German machine guns bullets. How I survived only God knows. On the same day Lou Far was killed outside my foxhole and at the same time 2d Lt. Lou Perkins was also killed by shrapnel. I have lived with emotional scars of seeing three buddies killed on the battlefield.

It was the death of Beckwith that has lingered on because he was KIA under unusual circumstances, that the Army didn't want to talk about. We were in an open field and everyone dug in. Melvin dug his foxhole and placed a hay stack on top. My buddy Lou Far and I dug our foxhole next to Melvins. It was after 11PM while sleeping Melvin apparently rolled over.

Beckwith movements startled two soldiers on guard duty. Seeing the haystack move they closed to the foxhole Melvin was in and demanded, "Who's there?"

Melvin was sleeping and didn't hear them, and when Beckwith didn't hear them, the guards opened fire with their M-1 rifles, only to realize several moments later that they had shot one of their own. "You got me boys," saying from his foxhole.

We jumped out of our foxholes and removed the haystack. We called the Medic but seeing his bullet riddle body knew he could not do anything for him. This tragic event has been with me all my life.

In visiting the Grave of my former buddy, at St. James, France, I was provided with list of 80th Men buried there. I noted that after Beckwith's name there was no awards granted, including the Purple Heart.

Determined to find the reason, upon return home I contacted the American Battle Monuments Commission and was told that soldiers who died due to friendly fire were not awarded the Purple Heart Medals.

By 1999 the United States Armed Forces felt differently about men killed by their own comrades and began to issue Purple Heart Medals.

I found Beckwith could receive the medal, posthumously, but that a descendent would have to apply for the Medal. Dean Beckwith youngest brother, who then made contact with Melvin's only son, a Vietnam War Veteran who has now applied for the medal. Anyone wishing help, please contact me.

Here's some history fun for you that I hope you will enjoy. I'm sure you never learned this in school. Next time you are washing your hands, and complain because the water temperature isn't just as you would like it, Think about how things used to be. Here are some facts about the 1500s:

• Most people got married in June, because they took their yearly bath in May and still smelled good in June. However, as time passed they started to smell, so brides carried a bouquet of flower to hide the body odor.

• Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water; followed by his sons, and other men living under the same roof. Then came the women and finally the children. Last of all were the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could acutely lose someone in it, hence the saying "Don't throw the baby out with the bath water."

· Houses had thatched roofs-thick straw piled high-with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so the dogs, cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes he animals would slip and fall off the roof, thus the saying, "It's raining cats and dogs." · There was nothing to stop from falling from the house either. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could really mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence.

• The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than

dirt. The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they kept adding more thresh until when you opened the door it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entranceway creating a "thresh hold."

• In those old days, they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lighted the fire and added things to the pot. They ate mostly vegetables without much meat. They would eat stew for dinner, leaving the left overs in the pot to get cold overnight, then start over the next day. Often times the kettle contained the same stew for quite a while, hence the rhyme, "peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old.

• Families that could obtain pork consider themselves quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang their bacon to show off. It was an outward sign of wealth that a man could "bring home the bacon."

• Another indication was to cut off a sliver of bacon to share with guests and sit around to "chew the fat".

• Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and the guests got the top, or "upper crust.

And that's the truth folks. Who said History is boring.
